- 1. UNDP is requesting approval from the Executive Committee of US \$724,230 for its 2012 Work Programme, plus agency support costs of US \$54,317. The Work Programme is attached to this document.

# A1. Renewal of institutional strengthening projects

(a) Brazil (phase VII): US \$351,000

(b) India (phase IX): 373,230

# **Project description**

3. UNDP submitted the request for the renewal of the institutional strengthening (IS) projects for Brazil and India. The description for these countries is presented in Annex I to this document.

### **Secretariat's comments**

- 4. The Fund Secretariat reviewed the IS terminal reports and action plans submitted by UNDP on behalf of Brazil and India, which were provided using the revised format for IS renewals approved by decision 61/43. The Secretariat took into account decisions 59/17, 59/47(a) and 61/43 in considering this IS requests, particularly decision 61/43 where the Executive Committee decided "to maintain funding for institutional strengthening (IS) support at current levels, and to renew IS projects for the full two-year period from the 61<sup>st</sup> Meeting".
- 5. With regard to the request for Brazil, the Secretariat noted that the country's last IS renewal was approved at the 60<sup>th</sup> Meeting for less than the two year extension, up until 31 December 2011 in line with decision 59/47(a). In view of this, the current requested funding for the next phase was adjusted to commence from January 2012 up to December 2014 for a full two-year renewal period. This will allow Brazil's IS project to be consistent with the last renewal. The funding requested for this project is at the same level for which the country is eligible over a two-year IS renewal period.

# **Secretariat's recommendations**

6. The Fund Secretariat recommends blanket approval of the IS renewal requests for Brazil and India at the level of funding indicated in Table 1 of this document. The Executive Committee may wish to express to the Governments of Brazil and India the comments which appear in Annex II to this document.

# Progress report

2. The terminal report presents the actions executed under the responsibility of the Ozone Layer Protection Coordination of the Ministry of the Environment. Amongst the activities developed with resources from the Institutional Strengthening (IS) Project Phase-VI, it is worth highlighting the extensive coordination in the preparation of the Brazilian HCFC Phase-out Management Plan (HPMP), which was a broad process that allowed the participation of all public- and private-sector stakeholders and other interested parties. This process enriched the HPMP document and supported the definition of a national strategy in accordance with the Brazilian scenario. The IS project was also critical for the coordination and execution of terminal actions approved in the National CFC Phase-out Plan, for the preparation of the ODS Destruction Demo Project and for the implementation of the Market Transformation Project, co-funded by the GEF, that aims to promote the replacement of old-inefficient CFC-based chillers. Also, the IS project was essential for providing the conditions to control and report ODS consumption data, for the dissemination of information and for the participation of the Brazilian Delegation in the Montreal Protocol official meetings, including national and international seminars and fairs related to ozone-layer protection.

## Plan of action

3. The Plan of Action for the next phase of the IS (Phase-VII) focuses on the coordination of activities for the implementation of the Brazilian HPMP. The activities to be developed are the following: investment projects for technology conversion/transfer in the foam sector (to phase out HCFC-141b consumption); projects in the service sector for the management of HCFC-22 leakage in refrigeration and air conditioning systems (mainly for supermarkets) and the regulatory actions and measures for the control of HCFC consumption. The IS project will support the Ministry of the Environment to coordinate the necessary actions to implement and comply with obligations under the Montreal Protocol in a timely manner. That comprises activities related to the control of ODS consumption, support in the identification of specialized technical consultants, attendance at Montreal Protocol meetings and outreach and awareness-raising through essential technical material, all aiming at reducing consumption and fighting the illegal trade of ODSs.

## Progress report

5. India continued its diligent efforts towards implementation of the Montreal Protocol and ODS phase-out activities. As at January 2010, the phase-out of production and consumption of CFC, CTC and halons was completed in line with the Montreal Protocol schedule, except for pharmaceutical grade CFCs used in manufacture of metered dose inhalers (MDIs) under the Essential Use Nomination (EUN) of the Montreal Protocol. India successfully carried out conversion of most CFC-based MDI formulations to CFC-free formulations and has placed CFC-free MDIs in the market. India withdrew EUN for 2011. India's HPMP was submitted for the consideration of the 66<sup>th</sup> Executive Committee Meeting. The Ozone Cell, continued monitoring production, import and export of ODS for effective control of supply and consumption. The Ozone Cell participated and contributed significantly to Executive Committee, Open-ended Working Group, Meeting of the Parties meetings and Regional Network Meetings. As a member of the Steering Panel for review of the Financial Mechanism, the Ozone Cell also actively participated in these meetings. The Ozone Cell also conducted extensive public awareness and information dissemination activities to facilitate users and stakeholders to access information on ozone layer protection and related non-ODS technologies, in order to enable a smooth implementation of the phase-out programme.

# Plan of action

6. The objective of the Phase IX of the institutional strengthening project will be to (a) continue the effective management, monitor and enforcement on ODS phase-out activities to ensure sustainability of ODS phase-out, (b) monitor implementation of HCFC phase-out management plan (HPMP) including policies development and strengthening institutional networks for achieving the 2013 and 2015 compliance targets, (c) continue implementation and enforcement of the Ozone Depleting Substances (Regulation and Control) Rules, and initiatives for ODS production, trade and consumption control, with amendments and adaptations as may be needed specifically for phase-out of HCFCs, and (d) intensify implementation of information outreach activities for active involvement of all stakeholders in sustaining ODS phase-out and HPMP implementation.

# VIEWS EXPRESSED BY THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ON RENEWALS OF INSTITUTIONAL STRENGTHENING PROJECTS SUBMITTED TO THE 66th MEETING

### Brazil

1. The Executive Committee reviewed the terminal report presented along with the institutional strengthening project renewal request for Brazil and noted with appreciation the achievements made by Brazil's National Ozone Unit (NOU) during the implementation of its sixth phase. The Executive Committee congratulated the Government of Brazil for these achievements in particular noting the work done for the HPMP preparation and the structure put in place for the CFC phase-out plan. The Executive Committee also noted that Brazil has a well established and reliable ODS licensing system and that the Country is in compliance with the reporting and consumption obligations under the Montreal Protocol. The Executive Committee expressed its expectations that, in the next two years, Brazil will continue to implement its planned activities with outstanding progress.

## India

2. The Executive Committee reviewed the report presented with the institutional strengthening renewal request for India and noted with appreciation that India has successfully achieved and sustained complete phase-out of CFCs, CTC and halons. The Executive Committee also noted with appreciation that India has almost completely transitioned to non-CFC metered-dose inhaler (MDIs) manufacturing, resulting in its withdrawal of essential use nominations (EUN) for CFCs for MDIs for 2011 and that India completed its HPMP preparation in close consultation with the industry. The Committee expressed its expectation that India will continue close monitoring and control of production, consumption, imports and exports of ODS, particularly HCFCs, to ensure compliance with the 2013 and 2015 control targets for HCFCs.
