Addendum

2012-2014 BUSINESS PLANS AND TRANCHE SUBMISSION DELAYS

This addendum is provided to update the recommended/reviewed funding values compared to the values in the business plans following the completion of project review and the associated draft agreements for the HCFC phase-out management plans (HPMPs).

• **Replace** Table 3 **and** paragraph 11 **with** the following:

11. Submissions after review to the 68th meeting include project values amounting to US \$161,759,918 (including US \$1,749,836 that were not in the business plans), which is above the amount included for them in the 2012 business plans by US \$47.3 million. The main reasons for

exceeding the 2012 allocation are: the HCFC production phase-out management plan (HPPMP) for China (US \$48.7 million) and the HPMPs for Cuba (US \$577,842) and Turkey (US \$409,276).

- **Replace** paragraph 13 **and** Table 4 **with** the following:
- 13. Table 4 presents, by agency, the value of accounts included in the 2012 business plans and the balance of funds from projects in the 2012 business plans, which have not been submitted. Table 4 is updated based on the Secretariat's recommendations to the 68th meeting.

Submissions after review to the 68th meeting include project values amounting to US \$421,115,924 which is above the funding level included for them in the 2012-2014 business plans by US \$127.7 million. This is largely due to the production sector: the HPPMP in China was submitted with a request of US \$280 million of which US \$210 million is requested for the 2012-2014 triennium, excluding agency fees, and exceeds the business plan allocation of US \$79.5 million for the current triennium by US \$130.5 million. This means that while HPMP activities submitted to the 68th meeting

overall exceed their values in the business plans for the year 2012, they are overall below the total levels in the business plans for the period 2012-2014.

• Add paragraphs 24 (bis) and 24 (ter) and Table 6a under the section on Forward commitments as follows:

24 (bis). Forward commitments *inter alia* consist of funding for multi-year agreements (MYAs) and "other standard activities" such as institutional strengthening (IS), budget of the Fund Secretariat, Treasurer and Executive Committee meeting costs, UNEP's Compliance Assistance Programme (CAP), and the core unit costs for UNDP, UNIDO and the World Bank. Funding for "other standard activities" is based on 2012-2014 business plans taking into consideration the decisions from the 66th and 67th meetings of the Executive Committee.

24 (ter). Table 6a presents the total amount of forward commitments assuming that the requests submitted to the 68th meeting are approved at the levels recommended following review by the Secretariat (e.g., this does not contain the production sector request from China since there is no recommendation). If the requests are approved at the levels as recommended after review to the 68th meeting, an additional US \$20.7 million (excluding the production sector in China) would be needed to cover forward commitments. The total amount of existing commitments for the period 2012 to 2031 is US \$426.9 million.

• **Replace** paragraph 35, 38 and 39 as follows:

35. If projects submitted to the 68th meeting are approved as reviewed by the Executive Committee, the level of commitments would exceed the allocations in the 2012-2014 business plans for the year 2012 by US \$46,750,192 (see Table 3) and the 2012-2014 triennium by US \$127,739,973 (see Table 6).

This roughly amounts to the level at which the request for the HPPMP in China exceeds that allocated for it in the business plans (US \$130.5 million) as the requests to the 68th meeting for HPMPs are within their allocation for the triennium.

- 38. All but US \$6,946,630 of the budget of US \$165 million for activities in the 2012 business plans was submitted as planned. US \$5,038,331 in activities required for compliance (HPMPs and IS) was not submitted and should be addressed in the 2013-2015 business plans. It should be noted that the 2012-2014 business plans do not include a budget for CAP, core unit and IS after 2014. IS was not included in the business plan for after 2014 pending a decision of the Executive Committee.
- 39. If requests at the 68th meeting are approved for the years as submitted and including the HPMPs for which funding has already been committed for 2015, and US \$150 million per year is available for the 2015-2017 triennium as has been the case for the 2012-2014 triennium, the commitments for MYAs alone could be below the 2015 budget by US \$1.7 million. The MYA commitments plus taking into account budget for the CAP, core unit and IS (amounting to US \$22.4 million) would exceed a budget of US \$150 million by over US \$20 million. This should be taken into account in developing the 2013-2015 business plans and in the Committee's consideration of approvals at the current meeting.
