COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATION OF THE FUND SECRETARIAT

1. UNDP is requesting approval from the Executive Committee of US \$247,217 for its 2013 Work Programme, plus agency support costs of US \$17,305. The submission is attached to this document.

A1. Renewal of institutional strengthening projects

- (a) Chile (phase X): US \$186,550
- (b) Georgia (phase VIII): US \$60,667

Project description

3. UNDP submitted the requests for the renewal of the institutional strengthening (IS) projects for Chile and Georgia. The description for these countries is presented in Annex I to this document.

Secretariat's comments

4. The Fund Secretariat reviewed the IS terminal reports and action plans submitted by UNDP on behalf of the Governments of Chile and Georgia, which were provided using the revised format for IS renewals approved by decision 61/43, and noted that these countries are in compliance with the ozone depleting substances (ODS) phase-out targets and reporting requirements under the Montreal Protocol, and have also submitted their country programme implementation reports for 2011, due on 1 May 2012. The Secretariat took into account decisions 59/17, 59/47(a) and 61/43 in considering these IS requests, particularly decision 61/43 where the Executive Committee decided "to maintain funding for institutional strengthening (IS) support at current levels, and to renew IS projects for the full two-year period from the 61st meeting".

Secretariat's recommendations

5. The Fund Secretariat recommends blanket approval of the IS renewal requests for Chile and Georgia at the level of funding indicated in Table 1 of this document. The Executive Committee may wish to express to the Governments of Chile and Georgia the comments which appear in Annex II to this document.

Progress report

2. During the ninth phase of its institutional strengthening (IS) project the NOU coordinated the finalization of several activities related to maintaining the total phase-out of CFCs. These activities include the training in good practices of more than 569 technicians, the approval and publication of a norm covering good practices in servicing and the inclusion of 4 labour skill profiles in the certification system ("certification catalogue") for technicians in Chile Valora. Additionally, the NOU finished the implementation of conversion projects in the foam and commercial refrigeration manufacturing sectors and closely followed up with the banning of CFC imports to sustain compliance of the phase-out achieved. In addition, the NOU started the implementation of the HCFC phase-out management plan (HPMP), showing a clear commitment on the part of the Government to control HCFCs. The NOU also implemented awareness activities addressed to the general public, such as a successful educational contest among teachers.

Plan of action

3. During the next phase of the IS project, Chile aims at maintaining the total phase-out of CFC consumption and to achieve compliance with the first HCFC control measures in 2013. The NOU will continue the implementation of stage I of the HPMP, follow up the adjusted Decree to control HCFCs and work on a registry of HCFC products and equipment. The NOU will also continue working in the establishment of the certification program for technicians, conversions of additional CFC and HCFC equipment, training of custom officers in HCFC control, consultation with all steering committees and training on new technology and alternatives in several sectors including fumigation, foams and refrigeration. Finally, the NOU will continue undertaking public awareness activities to sustain the CFC and halon phase-out and to support the methyl bromide and HCFC phase-out.

Progress report

5. The NOU implements activities under the IS project in cooperation with the private sector and all stakeholders. During the seventh phase the NOU prepared the pilot demonstration project on ODS-waste management and disposal aimed at assisting the country in addressing the disposal of unwanted ODSs already collected and temporary stored in various storage facilities. The NOU also started the implementation of the HCFC phase-out management plan (HPMP), ensured the timely submission of the country programme implementation and Article 7 data and developed and distributed useful and innovative awareness materials.

Plan of action

6. During the next phase of the IS project the Government of Georgia will continue working to ensure compliance with the HCFC reduction targets. The NOU will ensure implementation of the approved HPMP activities and further develop supportive legislative measures to control HCFC consumption and decrease emissions, giving special attention to activities in the solvents sector in order to introduce new ODS free technologies. Public awareness activities on ozone layer protection and climate change will also continue.

Annex II

VIEWS EXPRESSED BY THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ON RENEWAL OF INSTITUTIONAL STRENGTHENING PROJECTS SUBMITTED TO THE 69th MEETING

Chile

1. The Executive Committee reviewed the report presented with the institutional strengthening project renewal request for Chile and noted with appreciation that the country reported 2011 country programme implementation and Article 7 data showing compliance with the Montreal Protocol targets. The Executive Committee acknowledged with appreciation that the Government of Chile continued its efforts to control the import and export of all ODS thus ensuring the sustained CFC phase-out and preparing to meet the HCFC consumption targets. The Executive Committee expressed the expectation that, in the next two years, Chile will continue the implementation of its planned activities with outstanding success in order to meet the HCFC and methyl bromide consumption targets.

Georgia

2. The Executive Committee reviewed the report submitted with the institutional strengthening project renewal request for Georgia and noted with appreciation that the country reported 2011 country programme implementation data to the Multilateral Fund Secretariat and 2011 Article 7 data to the Ozone Secretariat indicating that the country sustained the total phase-out of CFCs and was in compliance with the Montreal Protocol control measures. The Executive Committee also noted the approval and initiation of activities under the HCFC phase-out management plan. The Executive Committee expressed the expectation that, in the next two years, Georgia will sustain the phase-out of CFCs and continue successfully with the implementation of its HCFC phase-out management plan in order to meet the initial targets to freeze the consumption of HCFCs in 2013 and reduce them by 10 per cent in 2015.
