A1. Renewal of institutional strengthening projects

- (a) Colombia (phase IX): US \$275,600
- (b) Malaysia (phase X): US \$279,500

Project description

3. UNDP submitted the requests for the renewal of the institutional strengthening (IS) projects for Colombia and Malaysia. The description for these countries is presented in Annex I to this document.

Secretariat's comments

4. The Fund Secretariat reviewed the IS terminal reports and action plans submitted by UNDP on behalf of the Governments of Colombia and Malaysia, which were provided using the revised format for IS renewals approved by decision 61/43 and noted that these countries are in compliance with the ozone depleting substances (ODS) phase-out targets. The Secretariat took into account decisions 59/17, 59/47(a) and 61/43 in considering these IS requests, particularly decision 61/43 where the Executive Committee decided "to maintain funding for institutional strengthening (IS) support at current levels, and to renew IS projects for the full two-year period from the 61st meeting".

Secretariat's recommendations

5. The Fund Secretariat recommends blanket approval of the IS renewal requests for Colombia and Malaysia at the level of funding indicated in Table 1 of this document. The Executive Committee may wish to express to the Governments of Colombia and Malaysia the comments which appear in Annex II to this document.

Progress report

During Phase VIII of Colombia's institutional strengthening (IS) project, the National Ozone Unit 2. (UTO) actively continued working to maintain the achievement of compliance with the Montreal Protocol phase-out schedules. As a result, the country achieved in, and maintains since 2010, compliance with the 100 per cent reduction measure of CFC, halon and CTC. The UTO also participated and contributed actively to the different discussions taking place at regional meetings, Executive Committee meetings and Meetings of the Parties. During phase VIII the Government of Colombia continued successfully implementing the activities contained in the stage I of the HCFC phase-out management plan (HPMP), that includes the phase-out of HCFCs in the domestic refrigeration manufacturing sector and monitoring the results of the projects implemented in the CFC National Phase-Out Plan. The Government strengthened its legal framework with the approval of the legislation for the establishment of the HCFC quota system and the ban of production and imports of HCFC-based domestic refrigerators. Other activities coordinated by the UTO include the preparation of the completion reports for the investment project to convert the only metered dosed inhalers manufacturer in the country and for the project to substitute the use of CTC as a process agent; the implementation of demonstration projects on chillers, on supercritical CO_2 for the spray polyurethane foam and on ODS waste management and disposal. As traditionally done in previous phases, the UTO was very active with the implementation of public awareness activities through TV/radio, newspapers, public presentations and celebration of the International Ozone Day.

Plan of action

3. The Phase IX of the IS project for Colombia will have special importance as the country will continue with the preparation to achieve the freeze and 10 per cent reduction of the HCFC consumption and the maintenance of the total phase-out of CFCs, halon and CTC. During the next phase the Government of Colombia, through its UTO, will prepare the strategy for the second stage of its HPMP and will continue with the strengthening and ensuring sustainability of the activities being implemented in the last years in the servicing sector, through the first stage of the HPMP (including the establishment of 18 ODS collection centers), technical assistance to end-users in selection of low-global-warming-potential alternatives and strengthening the legal framework that supports the activities mentioned above. As in previous phases, the HPMP and other projects activities will continue being implemented through the regional focal points, to ensure their impact in all regions.

Progress report

5. Malaysia's HPMP was launched in August 2012 and most of the projects are being implemented. Close cooperation with industries and other agencies particularly on enforcement activities such as Customs Department, Fire and Rescue Department and Ministry of Industry and International Trade is very crucial in the phase-out programme to ensure that the projects will be completed on time. The enforcement and monitoring activities are given priority to ensure Malaysia is in full compliance with the Montreal Protocol. Awareness programmes conducted, including at state level and via mass media, have enhanced public awareness on ozone depletion and climate change issues.

Plan of action

6. The operational objective of the Phase X is to monitor the provision of financial and technical assistance to the Government of Malaysia in implementation of its HPMP and sustained compliance of ODS phase-out. The overall objective is to assist the National Ozone Unit and the industries in phasing out HCFCs effectively and more efficiently through the adoption of policies, strategies, controlled measures, technological and monitoring mechanisms in compliance with the provision of the Montreal Protocol.

Annex II

VIEWS EXPRESSED BY THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ON RENEWAL OF INSTITUTIONAL STRENGTHENING PROJECTS SUBMITTED TO THE 70th MEETING

Colombia

1. The Executive Committee reviewed the report presented with the institutional strengthening (IS) project renewal request for Colombia and noted with appreciation that the country is taking the necessary steps to sustain the CFC phase-out and to meet the targets of the Montreal Protocol related to HCFCs. The Executive Committee commends the Government of Colombia for strengthening its legal framework to control ODS import/export; implementing quota systems for HCFCs and banning some of their uses which will ensure their phase-out. The Executive Committee highlights the work made by the Government of Colombia in the promotion of low-global warming potential alternatives to HCFCs within the national industry as well as the close coordination between the Government and private entities to assist the country in complying with its commitments with the Montreal Protocol. The Executive Committee is also pleased by the level of public awareness in Colombia related to HCFC phase-out challenges and is hopeful that Colombia will continue the implementation of its planned activities with outstanding success in order to achieve the HCFC consumption freeze in 2013 and 10 per cent reduction in 2015.

Malaysia

2. The Executive Committee reviewed the report presented with the institutional strengthening project renewal request for Malaysia and noted with appreciation the continued success in implementing its ODS phase-out activities and sustaining the ODS phase-out process. The Executive Committee also noted that the Government of Malaysia has demonstrated successful coordination with other national agencies and stakeholders in managing and monitoring implementation of ODS phase-out programmes which will assist the country in complying with HCFC phase-out targets. The Executive Committee greatly supports the efforts of the Government of Malaysia to reduce ODS consumption and is hopeful that the country will continue to build upon the progress achieved and the experience of implementing ODS phase-out activities, particularly to achieve compliance with the 2013 and 2015 HCFC control targets.
