#### PROGRESS REPORT OF UNEP AS AT 31 DECEMBER 2017

1. This document presents the progress report of UNEP as of 31 December 2017.<sup>1</sup>

# Scope of the document

2. This document consists of the following parts:

Part I: Projects approved under the regular contributions to the Multilateral Fund. It

presents a summary of progress in implementation of projects for 2017 and cumulative since 1991; it contains a review on the status of implementation of each ongoing<sup>2</sup> project at the country level; and it identifies projects with implementation delays and the potential impact on the phase-out of controlled substances, and projects with outstanding issues for consideration by the Executive Committee.

# PART I: PROJECTS APPROVED UNDER THE REGULAR CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE MULTILATERAL FUND

# Summary of progress in implementation of projects for 2017 and cumulative

- 4. Implementation of projects and activities by UNEP for 2017 and cumulative since 1991 up to 31 December 2017 is summarized as follows:
  - (a) **Phase-out:** In 2017, zero ODP tonnes of consumption were phased out and 7.1 ODP tonnes of HCFC consumption were approved for phase-out. Since 1991, 1,551 ODP tonnes of consumption of ODS had been phased out, of an expected total of 2,058 ODP tonnes from projects approved (excluding cancelled and transferred projects);
  - (b) **Disbursements/approvals:** In 2017, US \$17.84 million was disbursed and US \$14.91 million was planned for disbursement based on the 2016 progress report representing a rate of disbursement of 120 per cent of that planned. Cumulatively, US \$249.04 million had been disbursed out of the total US \$294.6 million approved for disbursement (excluding agency support costs). This represents a rate of disbursement of 85 per cent. In 2017, US \$14.88 million was approved for implementation;
  - (c) **Number of projects completed:** In 2017, 197 projects were completed. Since 1991, 1,821 projects of the 2,130 projects approved (excluding closed or transferred projects) were completed. This represents a completion rate of 85 per cent;
  - (d) Speed of delivery non-investment projects: Projects that were completed in 2017 were completed on average 38 months after their approval. Since 1991, the average time for completion of non-investment projects has been 36 months after their approval. First disbursements under these projects occurred, on average, 10 months after they had been approved;
  - (e) **Project preparation:** Of the 193 project preparation activities approved by the end of 2017, 187 have been completed and six were ongoing. In 2017, six project preparation activities have been completed;
  - (f) **Implementation delays:** There were a total of 302 non-investment projects under implementation at the end of 2017. These projects, on average, are experiencing a delay of 14 months. However, there are no projects classified as "projects with implementation delays" that are subject to the procedures of project cancellation (as project preparation, multi-year agreements (MYAs) and institutional strengthening (IS) are not subject to those procedures); and
  - (g) MYAs: In 2017, UNEP was implementing one MYA for ODS, and 110 MYAs for HCFC phase-out management plans. Since 1991, 190 MYAs have been approved and 79 MYAs have been completed.

#### **Project implementation progress in 2017**

5. The Secretariat reviewed the status of project implementation on a country-by-country basis taking into account implementation delays that have occurred with respect to planned completion dates that had been reported in 2017, the potential impact of these delays on phase-out and the rate of planned disbursements.

- 6. Of the 174 ongoing projects, excluding IS and project preparation, 72 projects have extended planned dates of completion since the 2016 progress report.
- 7. During the review of the progress report, the Secretariat had several exchanges with UNEP, where a number of issues on ongoing projects were satisfactorily resolved. However, issues could not be resolved for those projects or tranches of MYAs for the phase-out of HCFCs and renewal of IS projects, as shown in Annex I to the present document. For each ongoing project, a brief description on the status of implementation and the outstanding issues are presented and a recommendation is proposed for consideration by the Executive Committee.
- 8. The issues identified with regard to the demonstration project for refrigerant quality, containment and introduction of low-global warming potential alternatives (Eastern Africa and Caribbean regions) (GLO/REF/76/DEM/334) are discussed under the relevant section of the reports on projects with specific reporting requirements.<sup>3</sup>

# PART II: PROJECTS APPROVED UNDER THE ADDITIONAL VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTIONS FOR HFC ACTIVITIES

9. In 2017, the Executive Committee had approved 31 HFC-related projects under the additional voluntary contributions amounting to US \$3,256,000 (excluding agency support costs). A summary of the status of these projects is presented in Table 1.

# PART I: PROJECTS APPROVED UNDER THE REGULAR CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE MULTILATERAL FUND

1. As of 31 December 2017, the Executive Committee had approved US \$319.39 million consisting of US \$294.6 million for the implementation of investment and non-investment projects and US \$24.79 million for agency support costs, as shown in Table 1. In 2017, 57 new projects and activities were approved. This level of funding is expected to result in the phase-out of 2,058 ODP tonnes of ODS consumption.

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#### INTRODUCTION

UN Environment (UNEP) is submitting this Annual Financial and Progress Report (APR) covering the period 1 January to 31 December 2017 for the consideration of the 82<sup>nd</sup> meeting of the Executive Committee of the Multilateral Fund.

UNEP followed the Multilateral Fund's *Revised Operational Guidelines for Progress and Financial Reporting*, as well as guidance received during the first Inter-Agency Coordination Meeting of 2018 (6-8 March) when developing this APR.

This APR details project implementation assistance provided by UNEP to developing countries operating under Article 5 of the Montreal Protocol ("Article 5 countries") in accordance with UNEP's 2017 - 2019 Business Plan, which was endorsed by the 77<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Executive Committee.<sup>2</sup>

The focus and orientation of UNEP's work under this Business Plan continues is defined by the evolving needs of countries operating under Article 5 of the Protocol ("Article 5 countries") as they progress in their implementation of the Montreal Protocol, to meet and sustain compliance with specific obligations. Through the activities that were identified in this Business Plan, UNEP assisted the countries with implementing their HCFC phase-out responsibilities including preparing for the 2020 target and subsequent reduction steps, strengthening the government institutions in Article 5 countries responsible for implementing and reporting on their national strategies to comply with the Montreal Protocol, and sustaining Article 5 countries' compliance with ozone depleting substance (ODS) phase out targets already met.

UNEP achieved its Business Plan objectives by a combination of compliance assistance services delivered through the 2017 Compliance Assistance Programme (CAP), as well as the ongoing and planned national, regional and global projects. The project services included preparation and implementation of HCFC Phase out Management Plans (HPMPs) for both Stages I and II, Institutional Strengthening projects, and technical assistance – Enabling Activities projects. In addition to the anticipated Business Plan activities, UNEP implemented HPMP verification projects as and when requested by the Executive Committee during the course of 2017-2019.

UNEP offered assistance to a majority of Article 5 countries to achieve sustained compliance. UNEP prioritize and delivered assistance on the basis of countries' differentiated needs and priorities. In conformity with its mandate, UNEP dedicated most of its resources to addressing specific problems of low volume consuming countries (LVCs) and very low volume consuming countries (VLVCs). UNEP complemented, supported and backstopped the work of the other Implementing and bilateral Agencies in areas of its comparative advantage and expertise whenever opportune and agreed upon with the agencies concerned.

In 2017, UNEP in cooperation with the other Implementing and Bilateral Agencies provided significant advisory and project implementation support to Article 5 countries that resulted in an overall high note of compliance with the Montreal Protocol and its Amendments by those countries.

UNEP has previously presented to the 80th meeting of the Executive Committee a partial CAP Progress Report for the period October 2016 - July 2017 as part of its 2018 Compliance Assistance Programme (CAP) budget request.<sup>3</sup> UNEP will present the details of the balance support provided by CAP in 2017 (i.e. August-December) to the 82nd Meeting of the Executive Committee as part of UNEP's 2019 CAP Work Programme and Budget request.

## I. PROJECT APPROVALS AND DISBURSEMENTS

## A. Annual Summary Data

From June 1991 until the end of December 2017, the Executive Committee approved 2176 projects for implementation by UNEP. The total funding approved for UNEP was US\$ 322,647,123 including programme support costs (PSC), which represents about 9% of the total funding allocation to date approved by the Multilateral Fund for all Implementing Agencies and bilateral agencies. Of these projects, 781 were time-sensitive Institutional Strengthening (IS) projects and 1395 were objective-sensitive projects.

During 2017, the Executive Committee approved 88 new projects for UNEP to implement, including the 2017 CAP budget. The total value of those approvals was US\$ 18,120,529 plus PSC of US\$ 1,202,505.

## (b) Implementing Agency and Other Co-operation

UNEP's work under the Multilateral Fund is performed in close cooperation and coordination with the Multilateral Fund Secretariat, Ozone Secretariat, the other Implementing Agencies (UNDP, UNIDO, World Bank), bilateral agencies, and other partners at the international, regional and national levels.

<u>Regional Network meetings</u>. UNEP invited the Multilateral Fund Secretariat, Ozone Secretariat, and other Implementing Agencies to all of the main meetings of the Regional Networks of Ozone Officers. This action facilitated the work of the Secretariats and agencies by providing a convenient

platform for conveying their key messages to Article 5 countries in a given region, easy access to Ozone Officers and partners for bilateral discussions on compliance issues, and opportunities to discuss and advance their agency's project preparation and implementation activities.

<u>HPMP implementation</u>. UNEP implements many of its projects on the ground in countries jointly with other Implementing Agencies, where each agency co-implements complementary parts of a single project. For example, in 2017 UNEP was the Lead Agency for the HPMP implementation for 72 Article 5 countries, and the Cooperating Agency for the HPMPs of 30 countries. UNEP cooperated with UNIDO 53 countries, UNDP 27 countries, Germany 1 country, and Japan 1 country for HPMP implementation and Italy 3 countries for enabling activities.

- <u>HPMP Lead Agency</u>. In its role as Lead Agency for HPMPs, UNEP coordinated with and supported the activities of the Cooperating Agencies for project preparation, reporting and liaison with the National Ozone Unit and Multilateral Fund Secretariat.
- <u>Joint missions to Article 5 countries.</u> UNEP undertook a number of joint field missions with sister agencies UNDP and UNIDO for HPMPs implementation activities and addressing specific compliance issues. Such missions resulted in enhanced and coordinated delivery of services at the national level.
- <u>Non-investment support in Article 5 countries where UNEP is not the Lead Agency:</u> Upon request of the NOU or Implementing Agency, UNEP provided substantive non-investment services in several countries even though it does not have a project or Lead Agency role in that country.
