2006 BUSINESS PLANS

#### Introduction

1. This document considers business planning in the light of the approvals at the 48<sup>th</sup> and 49<sup>th</sup> Meetings, the submissions to the 50<sup>th</sup> Meeting and the allocations in the 2006 business plans. It highlights those projects in the business plans that have not been submitted. It specifies which of these projects are required for compliance as well as those activities that may be needed to assist those countries for whom decisions have been taken by the Meeting of the Parties on compliance. The document provides an assessment of the forward commitments approved to-date and the additional commitments submitted to the 50<sup>th</sup> Meeting for approval and concludes with observations and recommendations.

#### Approvals and the 2006 business plan

2. Table 1 shows the approvals at the  $48^{th}$  and  $49^{th}$  Meetings and the submissions to the  $50^{th}$  Meeting, as well as the extent to which these approvals exceed or are below the values indicated in the business plan.

- 3. Table 1 shows that if all projects were approved as submitted to the 50<sup>th</sup> Meeting, the level of approval would exceed the level for these activities indicated in the 2006 business plans.
- 4. As shown in Table 1, at its 48<sup>th</sup> Meeting, the Executive Committee approved projects amounting to US \$190,783 that were not in the business plan or did not have values in the business plans. However, even taking this into account, the Executive Committee approved in total US \$247,578 more than the amount included in the 2006 business plan for these projects.
- 5. At its 49<sup>th</sup> Meeting, the Executive Committee approved projects amounting to US \$82,275 that were not in the business plan or did not have values in the business plans. However, after taking this into account, the Executive Committee approved in total US \$1,823,255 less than the amount included in the 2006 business plan for these projects.

- 6. Submissions to the 50<sup>th</sup> Meeting also include project values amounting to US \$63,451,868<sup>1</sup> that are above the amount included for them in the 2006 business plans. Taking into account the approvals at the 48<sup>th</sup> and 49<sup>th</sup> Meetings, if all of the submissions to the 50<sup>th</sup> Meeting were approved at the amounts requested, the Executive Committee would have approved US \$8,926,890 more than the total amount included in the 2006 business plans for these projects. However, taking into account the withdrawn submissions of annual tranches, the Executive Committee would have considered US \$9,458,865 more than the total amount included in the 2006 business plans for these projects.
- 7. Table 2 presents the accounts value included by agency in the 2006 business plans, and the balance of funds from projects in the 2006 business plans that have not been submitted. An update of Table 2 will be presented in an addendum to the document. Table 2 also shows that only the World Bank has submitted projects to the 50<sup>th</sup> Meeting that exceed the value indicated for them in the business plans, while the bilateral agencies, UNDP, UNEP, and UNIDO had budget under runs.

9. Table 3 indicates that US \$13.45 million in activities required for compliance were not submitted to the 50<sup>th</sup> Meeting. The value required for compliance is defined as those activities required by the compliance oriented model, institutional strengthening, Secretariat/Executive Committee/Treasurer, CAP, core unit funds and activities maintained in the business plan by Executive Committee decisions. Those activities not required for compliance include all other new activities. Detailed listings of all of the remaining activities required for compliance and those not required for compliance are provided in Annexes I and II, respectively.

#### Countries subject to compliance decisions in the 2006 business plans

10. Table 4 presents a list of countries that have been subject to decisions on compliance and also had activities included in the 2006 business plans that have not yet been submitted.

#### **Forward commitments**

11. [The addendum to be issued prior to the 50<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the Executive Committee will also address the section on **Forward Commitments** based on draft agreements currently under preparation. The addendum will also address the extent to which forward commitments submitted for approval at the 50<sup>th</sup> Meeting exceed the amount for them in the 2006-2008 business plans.]

#### **Observations**

12. The budget allocated for 2006 is US \$164.6 million. Submissions to the 50<sup>th</sup> Meeting, including those concerning activities in the 2007 business plans, plus approvals at the 48<sup>th</sup> and 49<sup>th</sup> Meetings, are below the allocation for the 2006 budget.

13. Overall, the implementing agencies have not submitted for approval the planned activities at the values indicated in the 2006 business plans. They delivered US \$11.86 million less than planned despite the fact that the activities actually submitted to the 50<sup>th</sup> Meeting were worth around US \$9 million more than the values indicated for them in the business plans.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 14. The Executive Committee may wish to consider:
  - (a) Noting the Report on the status of the 2006 business plans as contained in UNEP/OzL.Pro/ExCom/50/5 and the fact that US \$13.45 million in activities that were required for compliance were not submitted to the 50<sup>th</sup> Meeting; and
  - (b) Requesting bilateral and multilateral implementing agencies with projects in the 2006 business plans that are required for compliance to consider including these activities in their 2007-2009 business plans.
