DRAFT MONITORING AND EVALUATION WORK PROGRAMME FOR THE YEAR 2007

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I. Status of Implementation of the Monitoring and Evaluation Work Programme 2006

- 1. The following evaluations were implemented in line with the Monitoring and Evaluation Work Programme 2006:
 - (a) The final report on the evaluation of Refrigerant Management Plan (RMP) in non-low-volume-consuming (non-LVC) countries was presented to the 48th Meeting of the Executive Committee (UNEP/Ozl.Pro/ExCom/48/12). The Executive Committee noted the report with appreciation and requested the Senior Monitoring and Evaluation Officer to develop a comprehensive and categorized compendium of recommendations relevant to that evaluation, distinguishing between new recommendations and those that had already been approved by the Executive Committee. This compendium was presented to the 49th Meeting of the Executive Committee (UNEP/Ozl.Pro/ExCom/49/7), which adopted a revised text of the compendium (decision 49/6).
 - (b) The report on the desk study on the evaluation of CTC process agent projects and phase-out agreements (UNEP/OzL.Pro/ExCom/48/15) was presented to the 48th Meeting of the Executive Committee. The study focused on CTC used as process agents and on CTC production. At the 48th Meeting, the Executive Committee decided to take note of the desk study, including the proposed evaluation issues and work plan for the second phase of the evaluation.
 - (c) The report on the desk study on the evaluation of the Compliance Assistance Programme (CAP) (UNEP/OzL.Pro/ExCom/49/8) was presented to the 49th Meeting of the Executive Committee. It provided an overview of CAP activities, mainly based on UNEP/DTIE documents, comments by the Fund Secretariat thereon and information contained in Fund Secretariat databases. The Executive Committee took note of the information provided in the desk study, including the proposed evaluation issues and work plan for the second phase of the evaluation.
 - (d) The synthesis report on the evaluation of cases of non-compliance with the freeze in consumption of CFCs, halons, methyl bromide and methyl chloroform is being presented to the 50th Meeting of the Executive Committee. It summarizes findings from 8 country case studies which have been or are still in non-compliance with the phase-out schedules for one or several ozone depleting substances.
 - (e) The consolidated project completion report (PCR) for 2006 is being presented to the 50th Meeting of the Executive Committee. The report provides the Executive Committee with an overview of the results reported in the project completion reports (PCR) received during the reporting period, i.e. since the 47th meeting in December 2005. It also reports on the follow-up to decision 47/6 with regard to establishing full consistency of data in PCRs, in the Inventory and in the Annual Progress Reports of the Implementing Agencies, and on their efforts to provide previously missing information and outstanding PCRs. For the first time, and in line with decision 48/12, lessons learned in the progress reports of annual implementation programmes are included.

II. Evaluation Studies Foreseen in the Year 2007

(a) Evaluations Underway and Proposed

- 2. When the CTC sector evaluation will be finalized, phase-out activities in practically all sectors funded by the Multilateral Fund, both as investment and non-investment projects, will have been evaluated (see Annex I-A and I-B for an overview). The evaluations are now related to compliance and modalities of assistance, such as CAP and multi-year agreements and to specific project types within sectors, such as incentive programmes or projects addressing low-volume consumption. They are designed to provide insights into lessons learned in the process of phasing out ODS in different countries, to analyze the reasons for problems faced, and to assess the prospects and risks for compliance with future intermediate and final reduction steps.
- 3. The following evaluations are underway and are proposed for the Monitoring and Evaluation Work Programme for 2007, (a) and (b) being a continuation of work started under the 2006 work programme and (c), (d), (e) and (f) as new activities:
 - (a) Evaluation of CTC phase-out projects and agreements: Case studies have been completed for Pakistan and India. Visits to DPR Korea and PR China are planned for November and December 2006 before the synthesis report will be prepared and presented to the 51st meeting of the Executive Committee.
 - (b) Evaluation of the CAP programme: Following the desk study, meetings of most regional networks have been attended by consultants to interview ozone officers and representatives of implementing and bilateral agencies. Case studies on CAP activities in these regions have been prepared or are being finalized, with another one on West Asia still to be started. The final synthesis report is scheduled for presentation in mid-2007.
 - (c) Evaluation of management and monitoring of National Phase-out Plans (NPPs) in non-low-volume-consuming (non-LVC) countries: This is to complement the evaluation of RMPs and NPPs in non-LVC countries which focused on the refrigeration sector. It seems appropriate to analyze the experiences made with various management forms, in particular with project management units, the flexibility clause, with interministerial coordination and stakeholder cooperation, with the role of lead agencies, coordination among agencies, and the country-driven approach. Moreover, the quality and reliability of monitoring, verification and reporting should be looked at, as they are the basis for continued funding.
 - (d) Evaluation of further cases of non-compliance by conducting field visits to a sample of Article 5 countries, and presenting a second synthesis report to the 54th meeting of the Executive Committee in early 2008. This would allow enlargement of the sample covered in the first synthesis report in order to give a more representative analysis. The first series of case studies was appreciated by the Ozone Units of the countries visited and gave an additional impetus to their ongoing efforts to bring back or keep their countries in compliance. The second report would also take into account the final 2005 Article 7 data for all countries,

- the efforts made by countries in non-compliance with the 2005 phase-out targets and the results achieved through implementing action plans to return to compliance.
- (e) Extended desk study on incentive programmes for retrofits: This study aims to analyze experiences made during implementation in various regions. Commercial end-users in the refrigeration sector received subsidies to their cost of converting installations to non-CFCs. As this modality might be repeated in many countries within TPMPs, the review appears timely and of interest in terms of lessons learned. As a first step, available documents and reports will be analyzed, followed by visits to selected countries to enrich the desk study.
- (f) Extended desk study on low volume methyl bromide (MB) projects: Numerous technical assistance and some training projects have been approved to phase-out MB in many countries with low or no consumption of that ODS. The evaluation aims at establishing the usefulness of these measures and their impact in terms of enabling compliance with the 20% reduction step for MB consumption in 2005.
- 4. An overview of the evaluation studies and time schedule proposed for 2007 is presented in Table 1 below. For 2008, further evaluation studies will be suggested at the end of 2007.

(b) Implementation Modalities and Methodological Approach

5. The practice of preparing desk studies for consideration of the Executive Committee has proven to be useful for the identification of the main evaluation issues and the preparation of adequate terms of reference for field visits. This practice is therefore planned to be continued.

- 6. While specific evaluation methodologies are to be worked out for each study, the approach generally consists of preparing a detailed review of project documents, progress reports, project completion reports and other relevant information from the databases available in the Secretariat. This is followed by the elaboration of guidelines for structured interviews to be conducted with all relevant public and private stakeholders during visits to a selected sample of countries in all regions. The case studies resulting from such visits are then synthesized and the final recommendations presented to the Executive Committee.
- 7. All draft evaluation reports are extensively discussed with the Ozone Units of the countries visited and the implementing and bilateral agencies concerned, and the comments received are taken into account for the final versions. This facilitates the discussion in the Executive Committee and the acceptance of the recommendations.
- 8. In line with Decision 46/7(c), evaluation reports submitted to the Executive Committee are for general distribution. They are posted on the public website of the Secretariat (www.multilateralfund.org) at the time of dispatch, followed by the decisions taken by the Executive Committee after discussing them. The case studies are placed on the Intranet of the Secretariat.

(c) Budget

- 9. The main budget items for conducting the proposed evaluations consist of fees and travel costs for consultants. The use of individual consultants has generally given good results due to their technical expertise in specialized fields and is significantly less costly than hiring consulting companies. Therefore, it is planned to continue to hire individual consultants for the evaluations planned as much as possible from both non-Article 5 countries and Article 5 countries and with gender balance in mind.
- 10. Table 2 below provides best estimates of cost for the proposed evaluation activities in the year 2007. The cost for finalizing the evaluations of the CAP and of CTC phase-out projects and phase-out agreements are covered by the budget for 2006. Desk studies usually cost about US\$10,000 and more if some field visits are already involved. The country case studies cost about US\$ 10,000 on average per country for consultant's fees and travel cost, and the final reports about US\$ 10,000, depending on the number of consultants involved. As these estimates may vary for each particular study, depending on the approach developed in the desk study, some flexibility in expenses between the various studies proposed is assumed. The total budget proposed for the 2007 work programme is US\$361,000 compared to US\$ 346,000 in 2006.
