**PLAN ADMINISTRATIVO DEL PNUMA PARA LOS AÑOS 2008-2010**

Los documentos previos al período de sesiones del Comité Ejecutivo del Fondo Multilateral para la Aplicación del Protocolo de Montreal no van en perjuicio de cualquier decisión que el Comité Ejecutivo pudiera adoptar después de la emisión de los mismos.

Para economizar recursos, sólo se ha impreso un número limitado de ejemplares del presente documento. Se ruega a los delegados que lleven sus propios ejemplares a la reunión y eviten solicitar otros.

## COMENTARIOS Y RECOMENDACIONES DE LA SECRETARÍA DEL FONDO

1. Este documento presenta un resumen de las actividades planificadas por PNUMA para la eliminación de sustancias que agotan la capa de ozono (SAO) durante el trienio 2008-2010. También proporciona el plan administrativo del PNUMA, los indicadores de desempeño, los comentarios generales y recomendaciones para consideración por el Comité Ejecutivo. El plan administrativo del PNUMA para los años 2008-2010 está incluido en el Anexo 1.

### Actividades planificadas para 2008

2. En 2008, el valor total de los planes de proyectos a ser presentados por el PNUMA es de \$EUA 28,12 millones (incluyendo costos de apoyo). El plan administrativo incluye:

- a) En el presupuesto administrativo del PNUMA, \$EUA 9,64 millones están destinados para la entrega del Programa de Asistencia al Cumplimiento (CAP) que será puesto a consideración de la última reunión del Comité Ejecutivo en 2008;
- b) Tramos relacionados a veinte acuerdos multianuales existentes (MYAs) en base a resultados del sector y a la eliminación de sustancias, valorados en un total de \$EUA 1,58 millones, que conducirán a la eliminación de 32 toneladas PAO en 2008;
- c) Quince MYAs nuevos con un valor total de \$EUA 2,14 millones (\$EUA 4,21 millones en total para el trienio) en 2008, con una eliminación de SAO asociada de 53 toneladas PAO (93 toneladas PAO en total para el trienio) en 2008;
- d) Actividades de fortalecimiento institucional con un valor total de \$EUA 3,23 millones. Esto incluye nuevas solicitudes de fortalecimiento institucional para tres países (Armenia, Timor Oriental y la República de Iraq) con un valor total de \$EUA 460.000 y renovaciones para fortalecimiento institucional en 36 países, con un valor total de \$EUA 2,77 millones;
- e) Actividades para proyectos individuales valoradas en \$EUA 1,65 millones;
- f) Preparación del proyecto valorada en \$EUA 6,45 millones;
- g) Capacitación valorada en \$EUA 77.000;
- h) La ejecución de planes de gestión para refrigerantes (RMPs) con un valor total de \$EUA 226.000; y
- i) Asistencia técnica valorada en \$EUA 3,12 millones.

Actividades Planificadas para 2009

3. En 2009, el PNUMA está planificando presentar proyectos por un monto total de \$EUA 30,44 millones con una eliminación asociada de 159 toneladas PAO. Estos incluyen \$EUA 20 millones para actividades que requieren cumplimiento, en conformidad con el modelo orientado al cumplimiento y \$EUA 10,5 millones para actividades cuyo cumplimiento no es requerido.

Actividades planificadas para 2010

4. En 2010, el PNUMA está planificando presentar proyectos por un monto total de \$EUA 14,02 millones con una eliminación asociada de 56 toneladas PAO. Estos incluyen \$EUA 13,5 millones de actividades requeridas para cumplimiento y \$EUA 450.000 millones para actividades del plan de gestión para la eliminación (HPMP) de HCFC.

**Asignación de Recursos**

5. La Tabla 1 presenta un resumen de la asignación de recursos en el plan administrativo del PNUMA para 2008-2010.

6. El PNUMA está buscando financiación por un monto de \$EUA 28,12 millones para 2008. En el plan administrativo del PNUMA, \$EUA 17,5 están destinados a actividades requeridas para cumplimiento y \$EUA 10,6 millones están destinados a actividades no requeridas para cumplimiento. Esas actividades que no requieren cumplimiento incluyen actividades para países que se espera ratifiquen el Protocolo de Montreal (\$EUA 379.800), “Actividades Adicionales/Estudios” (\$EUA 70.000), actividades para la lucha contra el comercio ilegal (\$EUA 827.000), actividades para países que previamente eran financiados por el Fondo Mundial del Medio Ambiente (FMAM) (\$EUA 33.900), la preparación de HPMPs (\$EUA 6,2 millones), nuevas actividades de fortalecimiento institucional para países que en la actualidad no son elegibles (\$EUA 460.000), actividades para planes de eliminación acelerada de bromuro de metilo (\$EUA 90.400), actividades mundiales o regionales de asistencia técnica para el bromuro de metilo (\$EUA 1,81 millones y actividades estratégicas para los inhaladores de dosis medida (MDIs) (\$EUA 700.000).

7. El PNUMA ha asignado \$EUA 30,44 millones para 2009 y \$EUA 14,02 millones 2010. En 2009 y 2010 el organismo incluyó en su plan administrativo \$EUA 10,47 millones y \$EUA 450.000, respectivamente, para nuevas actividades que no requieren cumplimiento. El PNUMA especificó un monto de \$EUA 17,69 millones para actividades más allá de 2010, todas las cuales estarán dirigidas al fortalecimiento institucional y a actividades de HPMP.

### **Asistencia a la Ejecución y al Cumplimiento**

8. En su informe narrativo, el PNUMA proporciona 13 objetivos para su programa de 2008 y define su enfoque orientado al cumplimiento. El Anexo I del plan administrativo del organismo proporciona una lista detallada de actividades, por país, que serán ejecutadas por el personal del CAP en 2008. Muchas de estas actividades son fundamentales para los países con bajos niveles de consumo de halones, bromuro de metilo, CTC y TCA. Además, ha identificado esas actividades cuya aprobación se espera lograr el 2008, proyectos individuales en curso, misiones anticipadas del PNUMA y trabajo con otros organismos. El PNUMA ha evaluado tendencias de eliminación y necesidades de asistencia para las 18 Partes que fueron declaradas en incumplimiento en la 19ª Reunión de las Partes. Estas están identificadas en el Anexo IV de su plan administrativo para el 2008.

### **Comentarios Generales**

9. Estos comentarios generales abordan asuntos que no requieren cumplimiento en conformidad con el modelo orientado al cumplimiento, temas administrativos de costos e incluyen áreas de posibles superposiciones en el proyecto. Las actividades que no requieren cumplimiento están listadas en la Tabla 1 en conformidad con el monto de sus solicitudes para 2008, 2009 y 2010.

#### Actividades/Estudios Adicionales

10. El PNUMA propone un proyecto de no inversión en 2008, que se clasifica como “actividades/estudios adicionales”. El título de este proyecto es “el establecimiento de una red de asociaciones regionales en refrigeración en el Caribe Oriental” (\$EUA 70.000 en 2008) con fecha de conclusión en julio de 2009. El PNUMA ha indicado que debido al pequeño número de

técnicos en refrigeración en cada uno de los países del Caribe, este sector es demasiado pequeño para conformar asociaciones nacionales de refrigeración. Sin embargo, existe una asociación en Jamaica. Se discutió la propuesta para una asociación regional en un taller de cinco días organizado por el Gobierno de Jamaica y el PNUMA. El taller proporcionó capacitación industrial de clase mundial para los técnicos en refrigeración. El Comité Ejecutivo no ha financiado un taller de asociaciones regionales en refrigeración, no obstante, ha financiado RMPs y/o TPMPs para todos los países del Caribe. Los programas de capacitación en refrigeración se incluyen en estos proyectos. A la luz de lo anteriormente mencionado, el Comité Ejecutivo desearía que se considere si estas actividades debieran mantenerse en el plan administrativo del PNUMA, dado que no queda clara la forma cómo se contribuiría ya sea al cumplimiento o a la sostenibilidad del cumplimiento.

### Lucha contra el Comercio Ilegal

11. Se han planificado las siguientes actividades para 2008 en adición a las redes regionales de cumplimiento: un proyecto mundial para el cumplimiento integrado al amparo del Protocolo de Montreal, a través de la Iniciativa Aduanas Verdes (\$EUA 77.000) con una fecha de conclusión a diciembre de 2009, un proyecto de coordinación en fronteras en la región de Asia y el Pacífico (\$EUA 300.000) con fecha de conclusión a abril de 2008, el segundo año de la red regional de cumplimiento para el África (\$EUA 300.000) y el primer año de una red para Asia Occidental (\$EUA 150.000), ambos con fechas de conclusión a diciembre de 2008.

### *Redes de Cumplimiento de la Ley*

12. En su 53ª Reunión, el Comité Ejecutivo aprobó una red de cumplimiento de la ley para África, que será ejecutada por Francia y el PNUMA siempre que la aprobación no implique “perjudicar las futuras aprobaciones de financiación para el resto del año propuesto para estos proyectos; que el desembolso se lleve a cabo solamente cuando el PNUMA le proporcione a la Secretaría las cartas de 38 países indicando el interés y el compromiso de sus gobiernos y de los representantes de aduanas con esta red; y que el PNUMA y el Gobierno de Francia preparen un informe conjunto de los resultados del primer año de operaciones de la red, enfatizando que sus operaciones serán sostenibles en el futuro”. En vista que el informe de avance del primer año de operaciones podría ser tomado en cuenta en una solicitud de financiación y que no existiera ningún requerimiento para la inclusión en el plan administrativo, el Comité Ejecutivo podría considerar la posibilidad de mantener estas actividades en el plan administrativo pendiente de consideración al momento de su presentación.

### *Iniciativa Aduanas Verdes*

13. El PNUMA está buscando financiación para el segundo año de la Iniciativa Aduanas Verdes. Ha indicado que este sería un elemento principal en el programa de trabajo del CAP en África Occidental en años venideros. La Oficina Regional para Asia y el Pacífico (ROAP) del PNUMA prevé planes para proceder con la Iniciativa Aduanas Verdes y la Región de Asia y el Pacífico proporcionará capacitación complementaria en escala nacional, lo que introduciría a las actividades del Protocolo de Montreal sinergia con otras MEAs. El Comité Ejecutivo aprobó el proyecto de la Iniciativa Aduanas Verdes siempre que “en la búsqueda de financiamiento futuro,

el PNUMA presente un compromiso por escrito de los asociados en Aduanas Verdes a quienes se les haya asegurado fondos de contrapartida para el resto del año, a cuyo objeto se busca financiación y que un plan de trabajo acordado con costos de contribución específicos para cada actividad sea proporcionado para la consideración del Comité Ejecutivo, cubriendo el avance de la ejecución para este primer año, incluyendo la total contabilización de los fondos usados únicamente para temas relacionados al comercio en SAO” (Decisión 52/28). A la luz de estas condiciones, el Comité Ejecutivo podría tomar en cuenta la posibilidad de mantener estas actividades en el plan administrativo pendiente de consideración al momento de su presentación.

*Actividades en países que previamente tenían financiación de la FMAM*

14. El PNUMA ha incluido dos actividades en la categoría general de “Actividades de FMAM” para Turkmenistán, que incluyen la preparación de un TPMP (\$EUA 33.900 en 2008), a ser concluidas hasta abril de 2009 y la ejecución del TPMP (\$EUA 350.000 en 2009), a ser concluida hasta abril de 2012.

15. El PNUMA ha enfatizado un tema de políticas que surgió con respecto a los cambios en las políticas del FMAM y el apoyo a los Países con Economías en Transición (CEITs) al amparo del Artículo 5. FMAM, en la actualidad está proporcionando asistencia financiera a los países CEIT para que logren la total eliminación a través de proyectos con fortalecimiento institucional continuo (IS), que incluye actividades tipo-RMP (capacitación en aduanas, capacitación en refrigeración) para la eliminación de los montos residuales de CFCs, funcionamiento en red (participación en la red ECA), actividades asociadas con HCFC y MB y apoyo a la Iniciativa Aduanas Verdes.

16. En el pasado, FMAM aprobó proyectos IS para los países CEIT de manera que logren la eliminación total de SAOs. En contraste con proyectos IS del Fondo, estos proyectos IS apoyados por FMAM incluían elementos RMP típicos, tales como capacitación de técnicos en refrigeración y funcionarios de aduanas y recuperación y reciclaje. Sin embargo, en ese momento éstos no incluían el apoyo para la eliminación de MB o HCFC. FMAM aprobó la renovación de los proyectos IS de FMAM para Azerbaiyán, Kazajistán, Tayikistán y Uzbekistán, incluyendo elementos RMP típicos para la eliminación de cantidades residuales de CFCs. Armenia y Turkmenistán, ambas reclasificadas como países al amparo del Artículo 5, no recibieron asistencia financiera similar para la eliminación de cantidades residuales de CFCs en el régimen del Fondo.

17. En su 46ª Reunión, el Comité Ejecutivo decidió “no proporcionar asistencia técnica del Fondo Multilateral en el futuro para actividades de eliminación de SAO en Turkmenistán, a menos que sea para fortalecimiento institucional (Decisión 46/21c)). En la misma reunión, el Comité Ejecutivo aprobó un proyecto IS para Turkmenistán. Este tema también es abordado en el plan administrativo de ONUDI (UNEP/OzL.Pro/ExCom/54/10).

18. El Comité Ejecutivo podría tomar en cuenta este cambio en las políticas de FMAM, particularmente cuando tome decisiones relativas a antiguos países CEIT que han sido reclasificados como países al amparo del Artículo 5.

## Actividades HCFC

19. En su Plan Administrativo de 2008, el PNUMA presentó solicitudes de financiación para preparar 57 HPMPs con un valor total (incluyendo costos de apoyo) de \$EUA 6.203.700. En el caso de 50 países, el PNUMA es el único organismo internacional para actividades de HCFC. El organismo hizo notar que los países involucrados están conscientes que no tendrían el derecho de un componente de inversión del HPMP, a menos que se encuentre otro organismo que proporcione el componente de inversión. Se ha indicado que, si durante la encuesta y el proceso de preparación se identifica la necesidad de un componente de inversión, el país debería encontrar otro organismo que se asocie con el PNUMA. En la medida de lo posible, el organismo reportó que ha seguido las directrices preliminares con respecto a los costos de preparación del HPMP. El PNUMA enfatizó que seguirá las directrices de todos los HPMPs una vez que hayan sido autorizados por el Comité Ejecutivo, pero, en vista que las directrices se encuentran actualmente en forma de versión preliminar y están siendo discutidas, no puede garantizar que todos los aspectos (incluyendo costos) de las propuestas HCFC que fueron presentadas, satisfagan las directrices futuras.

20. Para varios proyectos HCFC en el Plan Administrativo de 2008, el PNUMA no ha proporcionado una estimación del tonelaje. El PNUMA indica que en esta etapa es muy difícil proporcionar un tonelaje real, el cual formaría parte del ejercicio de preparación del proyecto y estaría vinculado a estimaciones de línea de base. Cualquier información acerca del tonelaje está actualmente disponible solamente a partir de los datos del Artículo 7 y de los organismos. No obstante, el PNUMA hizo notar que los equipos CAP regionales están en consultas con los países para proporcionar estimaciones del tonelaje de HCFC, después de lo cual prepararán un análisis de tendencia en consulta con los países y principales industrias, pero que esto tomará algún tiempo.

21. El PNUMA se enfocará en proporcionar asistencia a los países al amparo del Artículo 5 en el desarrollo y ejecución de HPMPs. Como parte de la asistencia en HCFCs, CAP se enfocará en una concientización focalizada, en compartir información, capacitación y fortalecimiento de la capacidad de partes interesadas relevantes, asistencia en encuesta e informe de datos, introducción de legislación en HCFC y asociaciones públicas/privadas.

22. En la región de Asia y el Pacífico, el PNUMA propuso trabajar con NOUs para seleccionar instituciones nacionales que realicen actividades de investigación y desarrollo (R&D), con respecto al desarrollo de alternativas a HCFCs. Se estimó que se necesitaría alrededor de \$EUA 500.000 en un período de dos años para realizar estas actividades de R&D, los cuales no estarían cubiertas por el presupuesto regional. Los sistemas alternativos deberían enfocarse acerca de la forma en que los hidrocarburos pueden ser utilizados en sistemas de aire acondicionado, adaptando tecnologías existentes de la Unión Europea que se acomoden a las condiciones de Asia y el Pacífico. En la etapa final de la evaluación y diseminación de tal tecnología, los otros organismos ejecutores serían invitados a involucrarse para facilitar la diseminación de la tecnología mediante sus proyectos. Aún cuando el PNUMA especificó un monto de \$EUA 500.000 en un período de dos años para esta actividad, este monto no fue incluido en las tablas de su plan administrativo. El Comité Ejecutivo desearía opinar acerca de esta actividad.

### Disposición de SAO

23. En conjunto con los Gobiernos de Japón y los Estados Unidos de América, el PNUMA propuso conducir una evaluación acerca de las prácticas adoptadas para una gestión sólida del medio ambiente de SAO no deseados y equipo de refrigeración y aire acondicionado (RAC) basados en SAO. Estas actividades no fueron incluidas en el Plan Administrativo de 2008 del PNUMA o en el Plan Administrativo de Japón, aún cuando Japón solicitó la preparación del proyecto (\$EUA 30.000) para diseñar un proyecto de demostración de disposición de SAO a ser presentado en 2009. Los Estados Unidos de América no presentaron un plan administrativo.

24. El PNUMA indicó que existe una creciente tendencia en la región para la producción, ventas y uso de este tipo de equipo obsoleto y que no existe un enfoque sistemático en muchos países para manejar el número creciente de equipo RAC obsoleto y SAO no deseado. El PNUMA hizo notar que si este problema no es abordado adecuadamente, además de resultar en niveles más elevados de emisiones de SAO, la disposición inapropiada de este equipo podría conducir a significativos problemas de contaminación local y mundial.

25. El objetivo principal del estudio sería revisar la situación actual de manejo de equipo RAC obsoleto y SAO no deseado, desde su recolección hasta su disposición. El estudio también revisaría intervenciones políticas que incluyen incentivos y desincentivos económicos necesarios para promover la disposición apropiada del equipo obsoleto. También exploraría opciones de financiación, como factibles, de fondos del carbono la Bolsa de Carbón de Chicago, para establecer un sistema basado en el mercado, auto sostenible, que estime, supervise y verifique los créditos del carbono desde la disposición apropiada de equipo RAC basado en SAO. Se espera que el estudio genere un informe de factibilidad con relación a la sostenibilidad de la destrucción de SAO de manera comercial.

26. El Comité Ejecutivo desearía considerar la necesidad de financiar este estudio anticipadamente a la consideración de las Partes acerca del estudio de disposición de SAO ejecutado por ICF.

### Bromuro de Metilo

27. El PNUMA ha incluido actividades relacionadas a BM en su Plan Administrativo para 2008. Estas incluyen un proyecto mundial acerca de agricultura sostenible para la prevención de nuevo uso de bromuro de metilo (\$EUA 1,6 millones), un proyecto regional en sensibilización pública y fortalecimiento de la capacidad en alternativas al bromuro de metilo (\$EUA 150.000), y una encuesta en bromuro de metilo en la región de Asia y el Pacífico para fortalecer los sistemas de supervisión y reportes (EUA\$ 60.000).

28. El PNUMA indicó que el Proyecto Mundial acerca de agricultura sostenible, propuesto para la financiación por un valor de \$EUA 1,6 millones se basaría en lecciones aprendidas de los proyectos de la Escuelas de Campo de Agricultores y otras experiencias obtenidas en la colaboración con la Organización de las Naciones Unidas para la Agricultura y la Alimentación (FAO) en la ejecución del intercambio de información y en proyectos de capacitación. El proyecto proporcionaría co-financiación a través del uso de los trabajadores de extensión de la FAO y éste se ejecutaría en los principales países consumidores de bromuro de metilo. El



PNUMA no especificó los países. El Comité Ejecutivo ha financiado proyectos en base a país para proporcionar asistencia para un compromiso que logre la total eliminación de bromuro de metilo. El Comité Ejecutivo desearía tomar en cuenta si el financiamiento adicional para este tipo de actividad debería mantenerse en el plan administrativo.

29. El PNUMA también incluyó un proyecto de concientización pública regional para alternativas al bromuro de metilo en la región de Asia y el Pacífico (\$EUA 150.000). El Comité desearía considerar si tales actividades deberían estar cubiertas, si fuera necesario, por el componente de concientización pública regional de CAP.

30. En la Región de Asia y el Pacífico, el PNUMA ha propuesto otra área de actividad con respecto al control y supervisión del uso de bromuro de metilo. Una evaluación en las tendencias de uso de bromuro de metilo en la región indica que se ha producido un incremento en el uso de bromuro de metilo en la región por encima de 20 por ciento por año en los últimos años. El PNUMA propuso un taller regional (\$EUA 60.000) en fortalecimiento de los sistemas de supervisión y reporte del uso de bromuro de metilo a pesar del hecho que se realizó en la región un taller MB/QPS el año pasado.

31. El PNUMA hizo notar que durante un estudio sobre el uso de bromuro de metilo recientemente llevado a cabo, demostró que existe la posibilidad de un reporte incorrecto en el uso de bromuro de metilo en QPS debido a la descripción incorrecta de la definición de QPS que, según cree el PNUMA, debería ser abordada. A este respecto, el PNUMA planifica una visita a India para entender los controles de consumo de bromuro de metilo en aplicaciones QPS. El PNUMA ha hecho notar que la Misión en India debería facilitar el fortalecimiento de la supervisión y reporte de uso de bromuro de metilo por parte del Gobierno de India. El Gobierno también busca asesoramiento acerca tecnologías libres de bromuro de metilo, de manera que éstas puedan facilitar la transferencia de tecnología a los fumigadores en el país. El Gobierno de India ha solicitado oficialmente que el PNUMA brinde apoyo para una encuesta QPS la cual promovería la transferencia de tecnología en usos de QPS y la mejora en supervisión y reporte de usos de bromuro de metilo en aplicaciones QPS.

32. En la Región de África, el equipo CAP planifica trabajar conjuntamente con el PNUMA y ONUDI para evaluar la situación de la eliminación de bromuro de metilo en la región y desarrollar una estrategia para asegurar que no se introduzcan nuevos usos de bromuro de metilo y que los países con bajo consumo alcancen la eliminación total antes de la fecha establecida por el Protocolo de Montreal. Se pondrá énfasis en 2008, en la diseminación de información acerca de alternativas al bromuro de metilo a través de medios electrónicos. La financiación para esta actividad no fue incluida en las tablas del plan administrativo. El Comité Ejecutivo desearía opinar acerca de la futura financiación para este tipo de actividad. El Comité Ejecutivo ha financiado talleres regionales para ese propósito, a saber, el Taller Regional sobre bromuro de metilo para países africanos anglófonos (AFR/FUM/16/TRA/01), aprobado en marzo de 1995 y una encuesta regional y un taller para países africanos francófonos (ARF/FUM/21/TRA/18), aprobado en febrero de 1997.

33. El PNUMA ofrecerá iniciativas CAP Especiales para abordar el consumo de bromuro de metilo en: Argelia, Bahamas, Barbados, Guyana, Mozambique, Sudán, Trinidad y Tobago (en cooperación con el Gobierno de Canadá), Túnez y Vanuatu.

### CTC

34. El PNUMA indicó que ofrecerá iniciativas CAP especiales a los siguientes países para que aborden su consumo de CTC: Bahamas, ex República Yugoslava de Macedonia (si fueran solicitadas), Ecuador, Kenia, Liberia, Perú, República Dominicana (en cooperación con el PNUD), Serbia (si fueran solicitadas), Sierra Leona, Uganda y Vietnam (si fueran solicitadas).

### TCA

35. El PNUMA indicó que ofrecerá iniciativas CAP especiales a los siguientes países para que aborden su consumo de TCA: Brasil, Camboya, Colombia, Ecuador, Haití, India, Kenia, México, Paquistán, República Dominicana, República Popular Democrática de Corea, Trinidad y Tobago y Vietnam.

### Halones

36. En el Plan Administrativo de 2008, el PNUMA indicó que llevaría a cabo una misión de “alto nivel” en la República de Corea para recoger información de datos de halones en el país. Esta misión de “alto nivel” facilitaría la sensibilización de las autoridades de mayor categoría del Gobierno en relación a supervisión y gestión del consumo de halones, para alcanzar el cumplimiento con las metas para halones. El PNUMA reportó que, en base a consultas en el país y con la Secretaría del Ozono, cree que esta iniciativa sería necesaria y útil para los halones y otras instalaciones de producción. La República de Corea no busca ayuda del Fondo Multilateral.

### Estrategias para Inhaladores de Dosis Medida

37. El PNUMA propuso dos proyectos estratégicos en 2008, uno en Bangladesh (\$EUA 400.000) y uno en Sri Lanka (\$EUA 300.000). En el caso de Bangladesh, el Comité Ejecutivo aprobó la preparación del proyecto en su 50ª Reunión.

38. Los proyectos del Plan de Acción Nacional para Cumplimiento fueron aprobados en la 43ª Reunión para Japón y el PNUMA abordó todo el consumo remanente de CFC para Sri Lanka. Más aún, se aprobó un proyecto de asistencia técnica para una estrategia MDI en Sri Lanka en la 52ª Reunión para el PNUMA y el PNUD: El ingreso de datos para Sri Lanka parece estar equivocado.

### TPMPs

39. En su Plan Administrativo de 2008, el PNUMA indicó que continuará brindando asistencia técnica en la ejecución de 20 TPMPs aprobados. El PNUMA planifica presentar nuevos TPMPs para 21 países en 2008.

40. En la Región de África, se pondrá énfasis para apoyar a los países africanos en la ejecución de actividades TPMP. A fines de 2007, 15 proyectos fueron aprobados y se espera que 12 más serán aprobados a mediados de 2008. Los temas principales para las reuniones de la Red en 2008 en la región tratarán la ejecución de TPMPs.

### Cuestiones en temas administrativos

41. En su Plan Administrativo de 2008, el PNUMA reportó que está experimentando incrementos en los costos de salarios superiores al 3 por ciento de incremento aprobado por el Comité Ejecutivo para los presupuestos CAP en los últimos años. Esto se debe principalmente a los costos del componente de asignación posterior al ajuste, que constituye 30 a 35 por ciento del salario y sufre ajustes ascendentes debido a la depreciación del dólar con relación a la moneda local. El estudio de Costos Administrativos está actualmente en vías de ejecución y se presentará un informe de avance dentro del Ítem 13 de la Orden del Día, denominado “Evaluación de los costos administrativos requeridos para el trienio 2009-2011 (seguimiento a la decisión 53/37 i)”. El Comité Ejecutivo desearía solicitar al Consultor que tome en consideración en su evaluación, la asignación posterior al ajuste de CAP y que cualquier recomendación para el cambio de financiación debería ser considerada en el contexto de los resultados del estudio.

### Posibles superposiciones

42. En la Reunión de Coordinación en enero de 2008, la Secretaría solicitó que todos los organismos ejecutores presenten cartas para informar acerca de actividades en las que podrían existir posibles superposiciones. El PNUMA proporcionó cartas relevantes, con excepción de Yemen. El PNUMA reportó que recibió una carta relevante y que proporcionará una copia a la Secretaría. Al momento de escribir el presente documento, la Secretaría del Fondo no había recibido tal carta.

### **Indicadores de Desempeño**

43. En la Tabla 2 se presenta un resumen de las metas para 2008 del PNUMA para los indicadores de desempeño, en conformidad con las decisiones 41/93, 47/51 y 49/4(d) que se aplican a todos los organismos ejecutores.

44. La meta del PNUMA para nuevos MYAs es 23. Sin embargo, la base de datos del Plan Administrativo de 2008 indica que se aprobaron 20 MYAs y 15 MYAs nuevos. Para tener consistencia con otros organismos, las metas del PNUMA en relación al número de programas anuales aprobados debería ser 35.

45. El PNUMA especificó en la hoja de cálculo de su Plan Administrativo que varios proyectos eran plurianuales, aun cuando la Secretaría no los considera MYAs debido a que están totalmente financiados en una sola aprobación en vez de ser en múltiples tramos plurianuales. Por esta razón, la base de datos del Plan Administrativo ha sido modificada con objeto de tener consistencia con otros organismos, antes de ser incluidos en el Plan Administrativo Consolidado.

46. La meta del PNUMA con relación al número de proyectos individuales aprobados versus los planificados es 10. Sin embargo, la base de datos del Plan Administrativo indica 58 proyectos individuales a ser presentados en 2008, incluyendo 39 de fortalecimiento institucional, 9 de asistencia técnica, 1 de capacitación, 1 de plan de gestión de refrigerantes y 8 planes de eliminación. Con objeto de tener consistencia con otros organismos, la meta del PNUMA con relación al número de proyectos individuales aprobados debería ser 58.

47. La meta del PNUMA para el número de actividades destacadas concluidas versus niveles de SAO alcanzados en tramos plurianuales es cinco. En vista que el indicador se aplica solamente a MYAs aprobados, la meta del PNUMA para actividades destacadas concluidas debería ser 20.

48. La Tabla 3 presenta los indicadores de desempeño del PNUMA para su CAP, los cuales fueron adoptados en conformidad con la decisión 48/7(e).

## RECOMENDACIONES

49. El Comité Ejecutivo desearía considerar:

- a) Avalar el Plan Administrativo 2008-2010 del PNUMA, incluido en UNEP/OzL.Pro/ExCom/54/9, sin perjuicio a la decisión de las Partes, en relación al reabastecimiento para el año 2010 y de ahí en adelante, haciendo notar que el aval no denota aprobación de los proyectos identificados en dicho Plan, ni de sus niveles de financiación y que dicho aval está relacionado con cualquier modificación de las siguientes actividades:
  - i) Establecimiento de una red de asociación de refrigeración regional en el Caribe Oriental;

  - viii) Taller regional de fortalecimiento de los sistemas de supervisión y reporte acerca del uso de bromuro de metilo;
  - ix) Taller regional en África para prevenir nuevos usos del bromuro de metilo;
  - x) Actividades MDI adicionales en Sri Lanka;
  - xi) Fondos adicionales para cubrir la asignación posterior al ajuste de CAP en el contexto de los resultados de la consideración por parte del Comité Ejecutivo de la “Evaluación de los costos administrativos requeridos para el trienio 2009-2011”.
- b) Solicitar que el PNUMA informe a la 54<sup>a</sup> Reunión acerca de áreas de posible superposición con actividades planes administrativos de otros organismos y hacer notar que la información proporcionada es apropiada; y
- c) Aprobar los indicadores de desempeño y las metas del PNUMA propuestas en las Tablas 2 y 3, en los comentarios de la Secretaría incluidos en UNEP/OzL.Pro/ExCom/54/9, al mismo tiempo que establecer una meta de 35 para el número de programas anuales de acuerdo plurianuales a ser aprobados, una meta de 58 para el número de proyectos individuales aprobados y una meta de 20 para actividades destacadas/concluidas versus niveles de sustancias que agotan la capa de ozono logradas mediante acuerdos plurianuales aprobados.

## A. INTRODUCTION

1. This document, as submitted for consideration to the 54<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Executive Committee of the Multilateral Fund for the Implementation of the Montreal Protocol, represents a Three-year Rolling Business Plan of the Montreal Protocol related activities of the United Nations Environment Programme. It comprises the UNEP Business Plan for 2008 and a forecast for the years 2009 and 2010.

2. In 2008 UNEP is planning to prepare and submit for approval of the Executive Committee **139** new projects with the total value of **US\$ 26,630,304** including an annual budget of the Compliance Assistance Programme (CAP) for the year 2009 and programme support costs. It is also planning to submit **19** annual tranches of approved multi-year agreements with the total value of **US\$ 1,484,710**. An estimated total value of all 2008 submissions is **US\$ 28,115,014**.

3. The 53<sup>rd</sup> meeting of the Executive Committee in its decision 53/21 approved an annual budget of the CAP for the year 2008 amounting to **US\$ 8,902,447** including programme support costs. The details of global, regional and national activities to be funded from the CAP budget in 2008 can be found in the Business Plan narrative and Annexes.

4. A current forecast for the next two years is as follows: **179** projects including **16** annual tranches for approved multi-year agreements with the total value of **US\$ 30,442,275** are planned for submission in 2009; **50** projects with the total value of **US\$ 14,020,240** are planned for submission in 2010. These amounts include respective annual budgets of the CAP, tranches of approved multi-year agreements and programme support costs.

5. A database of projects planned for submission in 2008-2010 is contained in Annex III.

## B. METHODOLOGY USED FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE UNEP BUSINESS PLAN 2008-2010

6. In developing the UNEP Business Plan 2008-2010 the following methodology has been used:

- The Business Plan 2008-2010 has been prepared on the basis the previous endorsed three-year rolling Business Plan taking into account approvals and experiences of the last year as well as new trends and developments.
- The 2008-2010 Model Rolling Three-year Phase-out Plan adopted by the 53<sup>rd</sup> meeting of the Executive Committee has been used as a guidance document for resource planning for the triennium and identification of countries requiring immediate assistance.
- Consultations on business planning with National Ozone Units (NOUs) were held during country visits and meetings of Regional Networks of Ozone Officers to identify regional priorities and needs for country-specific compliance services.
- The following decisions of the Executive Committee were used as guidance: 51/8 on endorsement of UNEP's Business Plan 2007-2009; 48/4, 45/54 and 38/64 on Terminal Phase-out Management Plans (TPMPs); 46/5 on methyl bromide activities; 50/3, 50/5 and 50/6 on Business Plans; 53/5 on the model three-year phase-out plan; 47/10 on assistance to countries with a baseline consumption of zero; 53/21 on approval of the CAP budget for 2008; 49/32, 47/49 and 43/37 on funding level for institutional strengthening projects; 47/51, 48/7 and 49/4 on performance indicators; 49/7 on reporting on ODS phase-out achieved within Refrigerant Management Plans (RMP), 44/8 on assistance in halon management; 42/7 on assistance in data reporting.
- Due account was taken of the following decisions of the 19<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the Parties to the Montreal Protocol: XVIII/16 on metered-dose inhalers; XVIII/17 on treatment of stockpiled ozone-depleting substances, XVIII/18 on illegal trade; XVIII/33 on non-compliance with data reporting requirements; XVIII/35 on establishment of licensing systems; XIX/6 on accelerated phase-out schedule for HCFCs,



XIX/9 on critical use exemptions for Methyl Bromide for 2008 and 2009, and XIX/12 on preventing illegal trade in ODS.

- Consultations were held with the other Implementing and Bilateral Agencies to avoid duplication of effort and increase collaborative and mutually supportive initiatives. In compliance with the Executive Committee decision 43/4(a), Annex I of country-specific UNEP activities was circulated to Implementing and Bilateral Agencies for their comments and input. Comments were provided by UNDP, UNIDO, World Bank, and Canada.
- Guidance provided by the CAP Advisory Group meeting (Montreal, 22 September 2007) and views expressed by National Ozone Officers in relation to CAP services were used as reference during the preparation of this Business Plan.

## C. MULTILATERAL FUND TARGETS

### I. OBJECTIVES OF THE THREE-YEAR BUSINESS PLAN

7. The focus and orientation of UNEP's work has always been defined by evolving needs of client countries, as they move further along in their implementation of the Montreal Protocol. With reaching the 2007 phase-out milestone and the 2010 phase-out milestone looming on the horizon and Article 5 countries approaching final stages of implementation of their commitments under the Protocol, **the overall objective** of UNEP's operation during the triennium will be as follows:

- To address immediate needs of Parties operating under para (1) of Article 5 of the Montreal Protocol and support their efforts to comply with 2007 and 2010 control measures;
- To further build and strengthen capacity of Parties to ensure long-term sustainability of compliance;

8. Consistent with the targets set by the Multilateral Fund Phase-Out Plan, **the immediate objectives** of the UNEP Business Plan 2008-2010 will be:

- Objective 1** To continue strengthening capacity of National Ozone Units and relevant institutions through training and knowledge transfer;
- Objective 2** To leverage and improve existing national/regional/sub-regional institutional and legislative frameworks and support the development of new policies and legal instruments to enable the implementation of ODS phase-out strategies;
- Objective 3** To raise the political profile of the Montreal Protocol and thereby increase high-level support for its implementation;
- Objective 4** To improve the access of client countries to specific expertise and knowledge; and to disseminate and publicize good practices, innovative approaches and experiences in phase-out of controlled substances;
- Objective 5** To promote and enhance the inter-regional and intra-region information exchange and cooperation in the implementation of the Montreal Protocol;
- Objective 6** To enhance direct country-to-country assistance, especially to those countries facing immediate and long-term compliance challenges;
- Objective 7** To support the development of regional/sub-regional approaches to tackling problems of common concern;
- Objective 8** To support regional/sub-regional initiatives to combat illegal trade in ODS;

- Objective 9** To pursue universal ratification of the Vienna Convention, the Montreal Protocol and its Amendments;
- Objective 10** To enhance public awareness of the impact of the ozone layer depletion on human health and the environment and encourage civil society action;
- Objective 11** To encourage countries that have recently ratified the Vienna Convention, the Montreal Protocol and its Amendments to put in place and implement appropriate national policies, strategies and programmes to control and reduce the use of ODS in refrigeration and air-conditioning servicing, agricultural, fire-fighting and other relevant sectors;
- Objective 12** To provide policy and technical assistance in addressing issues related to HCFC phase-out management plans;
- Objective 13** To enhance working arrangement with other Implementing Agencies thereby allowing for the provision of a coordinated and holistic service to client countries.

9. The following **compliance-oriented approach** will continue to be used for UNEP operations:

- Prioritized assistance will be provided to those countries declared in non-compliance by the 19<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the Parties to the Montreal Protocol as well as those countries formulating and implementing their national action plans to return to compliance;
- Countries at risk of non-compliance according to their reported Article 7 data will be consulted to identify problems and appropriate solutions, and to deliver required urgent assistance;
- Analysis of trends in reported data conducted by the Multilateral Fund Secretariat will be used as an early-warning tool to help detect potential difficulties long in advance and to offer necessary advice;
- Continuous support will be provided to those countries that have recently come back to compliance to help maintain the achieved status;
- Technical and policy assistance will be offered to countries in good standing to help keep up a steady phase-out pace;
- Support will be offered to countries with zero consumption levels and/or zero baselines to help prevent consumption growth if relevant;
- Close coordination and collaboration will be promoted with the Implementing and Bilateral Agencies and the Ozone Secretariat to avoid duplication and maximize impact of assistance.

10. Applying this approach, UNEP will offer assistance to a majority of Article 5 countries to achieve sustained compliance. Assistance will be prioritised and delivered on the basis of countries' differentiated needs and priorities. In conformity with its mandate, UNEP will dedicate most of its resources to addressing specific problems of Low Volume Consuming (LVCs) countries.

11. UNEP will complement, support and backstop the work of the other Implementing and Bilateral Agencies in areas of its comparative advantage and expertise whenever opportune and agreed upon with the agencies concerned.

12. While the objectives of the UNEP Business Plan 2008-2010 will be maintained throughout the triennium, activities to achieve these objectives may vary from year to year depending on evolving countries' needs for assistance and a compliance situation.

13. In 2008, the objectives of the three-year Business Plan are to be accomplished through the combination of activities and projects at the national, regional and global levels as described below.

## II. PLANNED 2008 ACTIVITIES AT THE NATIONAL LEVEL

### Country-specific services

14. Consistent with the Multilateral Fund emphasis on compliance and implementation in 2008, UNEP plans to deliver the following services at the national level (reference to relevant Business Plan Objectives is given against each type of service):

- Assistance for extension and implementation of Institutional Strengthening projects in 107 countries, including 87 LVCs (*re: Objectives 1, 2, and 10*);
- Support to complete activities of approved Refrigerant Management Plans (RMPs) and National Phase-out Plans (NPP) in 44 countries, including 41 LVCs. This includes the organization of training in good practices in refrigeration, training of customs officers and monitoring of RMP implementation. Extra effort will be made to expedite the implementation of delayed projects (*re: Objectives 1 and 2*);
- Assistance for preparation and/or implementation of TPMPs in 60 countries;
- Policy assistance to develop, improve, adopt and enforce national ODS licensing systems and other legislation/policies in 53 countries (*re: Objectives 2 and 8*);
- Support to public information, education and communication activities, including advice on the organization of celebrations of the International Day for the Preservation of the Ozone Layer in 19 countries (*re: Objectives 3, 5 and 10*);
- Assistance in identification of alternatives to methyl bromide and advice on policy issues related to the methyl bromide phase-out in 19 countries (*re: Objective 4*);
- Assistance and advice on the phase-out of CTC/TCA to 9 countries (*re: Objective 4*);
- Expert and policy support on halon management issues to 4 countries (*re: Objective 4*);
- Advice on the ratification of pending Amendments to the Montreal Protocol to 29 countries (*re: Objectives 3 and 9*);
- Assistance with Article 7 data reporting to 31 countries (*re: Objective 1*);
- Assistance in clarification of non-compliance procedures, implementation of MOP-18 decisions and follow up on national action plans on compliance in 53 countries (*re: Overall Objective*);
- Policy support to national efforts to prevent illegal trade in ODS in 53 countries (*re: Objectives 7 and 8*);
- About 190 country visits to provide technical and policy advice, especially to countries in non-compliance, at risk of non-compliance or implementing their agreed national compliance action plans. Whenever possible and appropriate such visits will be jointly arranged with other Implementing and Bilateral Agencies (*re: Overall Objective; Objectives 6 and 13*).

15. The above services will be provided by staff of the regional CAP teams (7 Regional Network Coordinators, 3 Policy and Enforcement Officers, 4 RMP Officers; 3 Methyl Bromide Officers and 1 Halon Officer). Expertise of Paris CAP staff will be drawn as necessary. A detailed list of country-specific services to be provided by the CAP staff in 2008 is contained in Annex I.

### Terminal Phase-out Management Plans for CFCs

16. In conformity with decisions 38/64 and 45/54 of the Executive Committee and the Model Three-year Phase-out Plan of the Multilateral Fund, UNEP will continue a transition from Refrigerant Management Plans to Terminal Phase-out Management Plans.

17. UNEP will continue providing assistance in the implementation of **34** approved Terminal Phase-out Management Plans in close collaboration with respective Implementing Agencies.

18. A list of **27** TPMPs planned to be prepared and/or implemented with involvement of UNEP is presented in Table 1. This list has resulted from consultations with interested countries, Implementing and Bilateral Agencies.

19. While designing non-investment components of TPMPs, UNEP will strive to ensure that these projects will help Article 5 countries not only meet their commitments of total phase-out of CFC consumption, but also build foundation for long-term sustainability of achieved compliance. As directed by decision 47/10 of the Executive Committee, TPMPs will include support to maintain a zero level of consumption of methyl bromide, CTC and TCA whenever relevant.

#### **Support to HCFC phase-out**

20. Following guidance by the Executive Committee, UNEP will focus on providing assistance to Article 5 countries in the development and implementation of HCFC Phase-out Management Plans. UNEP will be cooperating with other Implementing Agencies. As part of the assistance in HCFCs CAP will focus on targeted awareness raising, information sharing, training and capacity building of relevant stakeholders, assistance in data survey and reporting, introduction of HCFC legislation.

21. During 2008, **57** Article 5 countries will receive assistance by CAP in development of HCFC Phase-out Management Plans (PMP).

#### **Support to methyl bromide phase-out**

22. Following guidance of the CAP Advisory Group, the CAP Methyl Bromide Officers will focus on achieving sustained results, on awareness raising, information sharing, continuous training and capacity building of farmers, assistance in data reporting, introduction of methyl bromide in ODS import-export licensing systems. For 2008 UNEP included a **Global project on sustainable agriculture** for preventing of new uses of methyl bromide. Based on the assessment and lessons learnt from Field Farmers School (FFS) projects carried out in Pilot countries under the Multilateral Fund and the GEF and based on the useful experience that UNEP gathered in collaboration with FAO in implementing information exchange and training projects over last 10 years, UNEP is proposing this activity with following objectives:

- Getting the benefit of the on going activities and expertise in FAO- Plant Protection Division, for the cost effective implementation of the methyl bromide phase out under the Montreal Protocol.
- Sustaining the compliance under the methyl bromide phase out by incorporating the methyl bromide phase out issues in the training curricula of FFS
- Promote the bottom up approach to prevent use of methyl bromide by providing the IPM training for the sustainable agriculture through on going programmes of FAO.

The project would provide in-kind co financing by way of using the extension workers and on going country level programmes of FAO. It would be implemented in all the major countries consuming methyl bromide based on the requests from countries. It would be implemented in all the major countries consuming methyl bromide based on the requests from countries.

23. A new methyl bromide non-investment project will be submitted in 2008 for **Trinidad and Tobago** as required by the MLF Model Phase-out Plan. This project will aim at phasing-out all non-QPS consumption of methyl bromide and include such activities as training in the application of alternative fumigants, Integrated Pest Management / Integrated Commodity Management (IPM/ICM) as well as introduction of policy and regulatory measures.

24. Additional related services will be provided by CAP upon requests from the Parties.

#### **Assistance to countries in non-compliance**

25. Placing compliance support at the core of the CAP operation, UNEP has assessed phase-out trends and needs for assistance of the **30** Parties declared to be in non-compliance by the 19<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the Parties to the Montreal Protocol and/or have potential non-compliance issues. A resulting list of services to the non-compliant countries is contained in Annex IV.

### III. PLANNED 2008 ACTIVITIES AT THE REGIONAL LEVEL

#### **Regional Networking**

26. Being a flagship activity of UNEP, Regional Networking continues to offer a forum for experience exchange and knowledge transfer between NOUs of Article 5 countries, while adopting innovative approaches and shifting to new thematic areas (*re: Objectives 1-13*).

27. UNEP currently facilitates the operation of 10 Regional/Sub-regional Networks involving 148 members from developing countries and countries with economies in transition as well as 14 developed countries and the European Commission. These include:

- Latin America-South (10 countries, with participation of USA and Canada);
- Latin America-Central (10 countries, with participation of USA and Canada);
- Caribbean (13 countries, with participation of USA and Canada);
- English-speaking Africa (27 countries, with participation of Germany);
- French-speaking Africa (27 countries, with participation of France and Switzerland);
- West Asia (12 countries, with participation of France and Germany);
- South Asia (11 countries, with participation of United Kingdom and Japan);
- Southeast Asia and the Pacific (11 countries, with participation of Australia, New Zealand and Sweden. This Network is funded by the Government of Sweden);
- Pacific Island Countries (14 countries, with participation of Australia, New Zealand and Sweden. This Network is funded through an individual project);
- Europe and Central Asia (12 countries, with participation of Austria, Czech Republic, Hungary, Slovak Republic, Sweden and the European Commission).

28. Main activities of the Regional Networks include:

- Main Network Meetings (*re: Objectives 1, 5 and 7*);
- Thematic workshops (*re: Objectives 1 and 5*);
- Small Group meetings (*re: Objectives 1, 4, 5 and 7*);
- Contact Group meetings (*re: Objectives 1, 4, 5 and 7*);
- Direct country-specific assistance or South-South/North-South cooperation (*re: Objectives 2, 6 and 11*);
- Electronic discussion groups (e-fora) (*re: Objectives 4 and 5*);
- Cooperation with relevant regional Ministerial/intergovernmental processes and economic/trade fora on the ozone layer protection issues (*re: Objective 3*);
- Support for regional information, education and communication initiatives (*re: Objective 10*);
- Regional and sub-regional initiatives and mechanisms to prevent illegal trade in ODS (*re: Objective 8*);

29. The above activities will be provided by staff of the Regional CAP teams (7 Regional Network Coordinators, 3 Policy and Enforcement Officers, 4 RMP Officers; 3 Methyl Bromide Officers and 1 Halon Officer) under the overall coordination of Network and Policy Manager. Relevant Paris CAP staff will be involved as necessary. The UNEP Regional Directors will provide overall guidance and political support.

30. Region-specific priorities, challenges, initiatives and selected planned activities are described below.

#### **Africa: regional priorities and challenges**

31. In 2008 the CAP team in Africa will focus on assisting African countries in the implementation of terminal phase-out activities that will enable them to ensure complete phase-out of their residual consumption of major ODS

by the year 2010. By end of the year 2007, 15 were approved for countries where UNEP is the lead agency and 12 more are expected to be approved by mid 2008. Technical and policy support will also be given by the CAP team to those countries who seek such guidance for TPMP while UNEP is not directly involved in the implementation. To that effect, the main theme for 2007 Network meetings in the region will be the implementation of Terminal Phase out Plans.

32. As the success and sustainability of past and present phase-out activities will depend on policy measures being taken by countries, the CAP team in Africa will put an emphasis on advising countries on ways and means to effectively enforce regulations that are in place at both national and sub-regional levels. For the few countries that are still in the process of setting up their policies and control measures, UNEP will facilitate enactment and enforcement of ODS regulations through country visits and South-South cooperation as well as collaboration with sub-regional economic and customs organizations. The CAP team will also assist a few countries in the region in publishing their case studies on successful enforcement of ODS regulations and licensing systems in view sharing experience with other countries in the region.

33. The Africa CAP team will work towards strengthening the collaboration between customs authorities and ozone officers in the regional trade blocks on exchange of information related to the Montreal Protocol and in control of illegal ODS trade through harmonization of regulations. Sustainable working relations will be developed with the Secretariat of majors trade blocks such as the Central African Economic and Monetary Commission (CEMAC), the Western African Economic and Monetary Union (UEMOA), the Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA), the Southern Africa Customs Union (SACU) and the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS), as well as the World Customs Organization's Regional Intelligence Liaison Office for Eastern and Southern Africa (WCO-RILO). Customs enforcement networks will be established and facilitated in cooperation with the above sub-regional organizations.

34. In response to challenges of methyl bromide phase-out, the CAP team is planning to work, jointly with UNDP and UNIDO to assess the status of MeBr phase out in the region and develop a strategy to ensure no new uses of MeBr are introduced and countries with low consumption achieve total phase-out prior to the schedule set by the Montreal Protocol. Emphasis will be put in 2008 in dissemination of information on methyl bromide alternatives through electronic means (fact sheets and country specific information on the ROA CAP website)

35. As regards other ODS with small consumption in Africa such as Halons, CTC and TCA, the regional CAP team will continue on encouraging all NOUs in the region conduct comprehensive survey on possible consumption of these substances. Countries will then be advised on action to ensure total and sustainable phase-out. This will be built upon the national studies and surveys on minor uses of carbon tetrachloride and methyl chloroform being conducted in Cameroon Niger Sierra Leone and Uganda with the purpose of assessing current imports, applications and use of these substances; reviewing existing national legal instruments; and identifying strategies and activities required to achieve compliance with the Montreal Protocol.

36. The CAP team will continue working with the Ozone Secretariat and the Multilateral Fund Secretariat to ensure that new reporting formats are will understood and adhered to by NOUs in the region. The team will ensure data and progress report for 2007 are compiled and reported earlier in the year since these data will be required for assessing countries compliance status.

#### **Asia and the Pacific: regional priorities and challenges**

37. The period 2008-2010 is very critical for the countries in the ROAP region both in terms of maintaining the momentum of ODS phaseout, achieving compliance with CFC, CTC and halon phaseout targets as well as estimation of HCFC baseline and preparing for HCFC freeze in 2013. It must be noted that HCFC production and consumption in the ROAP region constitutes about 97% and 67% of the total production and consumption of HCFCs for Article-5 countries in 2006. It is also anticipated that last minute compliance challenges are likely to emerge in some of the countries and these have to be addressed through timely and effective remedial actions by the Compliance Assistance Programme in coordination with the Secretariats, Implementing Agencies and Bilaterals.

38. In view of the above, the following are the priorities for **the ROAP CAP team in 2008**.



Enhancing National Capacity Building for compliance. Assist countries in actual or potential non-compliance as per the 19<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the Parties decisions and 39<sup>th</sup> Implementation Committee recommendations. The priority countries will be:

i) Compliance Decisions from 19<sup>th</sup> MOP:

- a. **Iran (MOP decision XIX/27)** to implement the approved plan of action wherein Iran commits:
  - (a) To reducing their CTC consumption to no greater than:
    - (i) 11.6 ODP-tonnes in 2007;
    - (ii) Zero ODP-tonnes in 2008, save for essential uses that may be authorized by the Parties;
  - (b) To monitoring its existing system for licensing imports and exports of ozone-depleting substances, including import quotas;

ii) Follow up on Plans of Action:

- b. **Bangladesh** to implement the MDI transition strategy to phase out CFC use from the MDI sub sector (**MOP decision XVIII/16 and Implementation Committee recommendation 39/4**) and **Bangladesh** for non-compliance with freeze in consumption of TCA (**MOP decision XVII/27**);
- c. **Pakistan (MOP decision XVIII/31 and Implementation Committee recommendation 39/27)** for non compliance with control measures for CTC
- d. **Fiji** for non compliance with control measures for MB (**MOP decision XVII/33 and Implementation Committee recommendation 39/15**);
- e. **Federated States of Micronesia** for non compliance with control measures for CFC (**MOP decision XVII/32 and Implementation Committee recommendation 39/14**);
- f. **Maldives** for non compliance with control measures relating to CFCs (**MOP decision XV/37 and Implementation Committee recommendation 39/23**);
- g. **Nepal** for non compliance with control measures relating to CFCs (**MOP decision XVI/27 and Implementation Committee recommendation 39/25**)

In addition to the above, to facilitate compliance the following activities are proposed to be undertaken.

- h. CAP 's high-level mission to Republic of Korea to understand Halon supply and demand scenario and provide official report on halon phaseout in Republic of Korea.
- i. Visit to DPR Korea for the verification of ODS production and consumption in coordination with UNIDO.
- j. Visit to India to understand the Methyl Bromide consumption controls in QPS applications.

39. The regional CAP team will also be providing assistance as follows:

- Assist Brunei and Nepal to ratify London and other Amendments and all other countries to ratify the remaining Amendments;
- Assist **Timor Leste** to ratify the Protocol and its Amendments. Currently, the country has sent a communication on their intent to ratify the Protocol;
- Assist Ozone Officers to **mainstream ozone issues** in the priorities of other Line Ministries at the national level through network meetings (like through thematic meeting on MB with national agriculture officers or the 2008 regional MDI thematic meeting with national health officials), workshops and country missions, as well as through encouraging national synergies/policies for chemical based MEAs;
- Assist LVCs and Sri Lanka to develop transition strategies for **phase out of CFC MDIs**. In addition, implement **transition strategies for CFC MDI phaseout for Bangladesh and Iran** as part of approved project with UNDP and UNIDO respectively. CAP has also received a request from India and Pakistan to assist with the implementation of the non-investment component of their transition strategy where UNDP is the Lead Agency.
- Implement an "early warning system" to inform the Parties of potential non-compliance situations to enable them to take corrective actions to gear up for 2010 control measures;

- Strengthen the regional informal advisory group on compliance comprising of Implementing Agencies, Secretariats and bilaterals to provide coordinated compliance advise and assistance to countries;
- Assist countries to fully implement the reporting requirement under Decision VII/16 for destinations for all exports of all ODS and implementation of informal Prior Informed Consent (iPIC) in 2008 with the inclusion of HCFCs also;
- Address issues of illegal trade through awareness, information exchange, regional and sub regional cooperation between countries and enforcement organisations and integrated (covering several MEAs) training. Strengthen the operation of the “Sky Hole Patching” and formal structure for the Regional Partner’s Forum to strengthen MOP Decision XVII/16, sub para 7 and MOP Decision XIX/12. 2008 will also be a critical year to implement the new Regional Enforcement Networking project funded by SIDA and integration of ODS enforcement work with UNODC Border Liaison project. The PEO will also develop an overall framework and strategy for enforcement for the Asia and Pacific region during 2008. This will complement the current workplan on issues related to enforcement.
- Increase regional awareness for compliance through implementation of the regional awareness action plan. During 2008, the action plan 2003-2007 will be critically evaluated and an action plan for the critical period 2008-2010 will be developed with assistance from the Regional information Officer and a few media experts.
- Assist A5 Parties on prompt data reporting as per the 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the Parties decision XV/14 (4), XV/15 (1) and Executive Committee Decision 40/11 (b). The Decision XV/15 is further reiterated in **MOP Decision XVI/17 (8-9)**;

*Programmatic:*

40. CAP team in ROAP will provide **permanent capacity to backstop** the operational activities to be conducted by countries and other IAs and help strengthen the expertise of local experts in each of the sectors. The team will take steps to improve North-South and South-South cooperation to add value to the work already going on in the region. The team will provide complementarity to the work of other agencies. The programmatic priorities will be:

- Assist countries to strengthen policies, legislation (licensing system to include all ODS, including HCFCs and higher penalties) regulations and enforcement strategies needed to comply with the control measures. Priority countries will be Myanmar for setting up licensing system.
- Assist Pacific Island Countries (Cook Islands, Kiribati, Marshall Islands, Micronesia, Nauru, Niue, Palau, Solomon Islands, Tonga, Tuvalu and Vanuatu) on the establishment of the licensing system and support customs training project in coordination with SPREP and Australia. Explore possibilities of starting a network for PICs. CAP would also provide technical assistance to PICs on the implementation of IS.
- Raise and maintain high-level commitment in all Parties through awareness/information/media, high-level missions and personal contacts. Priority countries will be **Bangladesh, Brunei Darussalam, Republic of Korea, and Myanmar**.
- Assist **Brunei and Myanmar** to implement approved refrigerant management plans.
- Assist **Afghanistan, Bhutan, Bangladesh, Cambodia, DPR Korea, Iran, Fiji, Maldives, Mongolia, Nepal, Samoa and Sri Lanka**, to implement their National Phase out Plans and TPMPs. In case of **Fiji**, assist in implementing the MB action plan to bring it back into compliance;
- Assist **China and India** to implement policy, training and awareness components of their servicing and methyl bromide sector strategies in collaboration with other lead agencies (UNIDO, World Bank, UNDP, Germany, and Switzerland). Assist **India** in managing the technical assistance component of the CFC production sector project and synergise the Technical Assistance (TA) strategy with the consumption side sector strategies.
- Use networks to review progress, identify and remove bottlenecks and learn from each other. Assist countries with zero-baseline consumption to formulate strategies for addressing CTC/TCA and Methyl Bromide. It could include activities like analysis of other ODS, identification of assistance needed, and preparation of a policy document. Also initiate work with Japan on addressing destruction and disposal issues in the region through disseminating Japan’s policies on destruction and disposal to the network countries as the first step.

- Facilitate the interface between MLF and Implementing Agencies with countries through the forum of network to promote their mutual understanding regarding the need for and problems of the investment projects.

41. In addition to the above, the CAP team would work closely in identification of meetings relating to trade and environment at regional level (e.g., ASEAN, SAARC meetings) and promoting inclusion of Ozone Depletion and Montreal Protocol on implementation of ODS phaseout in such meeting agenda. Besides working on regional level dialogues on illegal ODS trade, the team would also consult regional trade bodies and councils on harmonising ODS trade related regulations and regulatory controls.

42. CAP will need to play an important role in HCFC phase out especially in regard to gearing up the countries for this new challenge. CAP's involvement will be at two levels:

#### Regional Level

- Distribution of the alternative/policy information through its network meeting of Ozone officers and thematic workshops;
- Collect and share information among the countries on the regional resource persons, alternative chemical/equipment supplies, etc as regional HCFCs database.
- Develop Regional Centres of Excellence for assisting countries in implementation of HCFC phaseout – technology and policy related.

#### National Level

ROAP CAP team would focus its work in the LVC countries, where HCFC is most used in the refrigeration and AC servicing sector in the following areas:

- Assist the NOU to conduct survey of HCFCs consumption and formulate its phase-out management strategy/country programme. CAP team has been requested to carry out such surveys in Afghanistan, Bhutan, Brunei Darussalam, Cambodia, Lao PDR, Maldives, Nepal, Mongolia, DPR Korea;
- Assist the NOU in preparation of Phase-out Management Plan for India and Sri Lanka;
- Provide technical assistance for the HCFC free alternative selection and application;
- Provide technical assistance for development of HCFC control regulation and policies;
- Provide good practices training in the refrigeration/AC servicing sector for servicing HCFC based equipment and HCFC free alternatives;
- Advice and technical assistance for the sound management of HCFCs in the R/AC servicing sector

For the big countries with HCFCs used in other sectors than servicing, UNEP would also explore the possibility to work with other IAs with focusing on the providing policy development assistance.

Emerging challenges that would be addressed in 2008-2010:

43. ODS destruction project: Based on the results of the ODS destruction study being undertaken by the Multilateral Fund Secretariat, UNEP, in close cooperation with the Government of Japan and US-EPA, is proposing to conduct an assessment on practices adopted for environmentally sound management of unwanted ODS and obsolete ODS-based refrigeration and air-conditioning (RAC) equipment. During the past decade, high economic growth, improve living standards and lower cost of RAC equipment in many countries in Asia and the Pacific have resulted in significant rise in production, sales and use of these equipments. This rising trend is expected to continue far in the future. At present, there is no systematic approach to manage the growing number of obsolete RAC equipment and unwanted ODS in many countries. If this problem is not adequately addressed, beside resulting higher levels of emission of ODSs, improper disposal of these equipments could lead to significant pollution problems both locally and globally.

44. The primary objective of the study is to review current situation of management of obsolete RAC equipment and unwanted ODS from collection to disposal. This will include studying the existing infrastructure to collect and dispose them along with estimate of wastes being generated from the overall process. The study will then examine various options to manage the disposal of these chemicals and equipment in an environmentally sound manner starting from equipment collection, transportation, storage, dismantling, recycling and disposal of ODS refrigerants,

components and other hazardous waste. The study will review policy interventions including economic incentives and disincentives required to promote proper disposal of the obsolete equipment.

45. Considering potential benefit from reducing emission of GHG from recovery and destruction of ODS refrigerants, the study will explore funding options, as found feasible, from carbon fund such as Chicago Carbon Exchange to establish a market-based, self-sustaining system to estimate, monitor and verify carbon credits from proper disposal of ODS-based RAC equipment.

**46. Facilitating Research and Development of Alternatives to HCFCs:** In the Refrigeration and Air conditioning sector, most commercially available alternatives to HCFCs are either HFCs with high GWP, or HCs with flammability issues, or others such as ammonia which has a toxic problem. The industry in the developing countries will face a challenging job to screen and select the most appropriate alternative with consideration of the supply, operation costs, energy efficiency, etc.

47. As per Montreal Protocol's Indicative List of the Categories of Incremental Cost, "cost of research and development"<sup>1</sup> of alternative use in manufacturing as an intermediate good is eligible, even though there are not many guidelines under the current Excom rules.

48. UNEP ROAP proposes to work with NOUs on selecting national institutions of repute in the countries (one or two) for conducting research and development activities, coordinate with the institutions for development and testing HCFC free options in different applications and assist in coordinating and disseminating information on the research findings at a regional and global level after evaluation.

**49. Controlling and Monitoring Methyl Bromide use:** Assessment of Methyl Bromide use trends in the region indicates that there is a growth in Methyl Bromide use in the region by more 20% per annum over the last few years. This necessitates focus on monitoring and reporting strengthening at the country level. For this, it is proposed that one regional workshop involving representatives from IPPC, regional centres of excellence such as AQIS, quarantine authorities of the countries and subject specialist experts could be held for consultations on strengthening monitoring and reporting systems on MB use. Further, to strengthen parties' involvement on guidance given under Decision XI/13, technical information on MB alternatives and MB emission reduction is also proposed to be shared in this workshop through subject specialist experts. Regional experiences on MB use reduction in storage fumigation applications would also be shared during this workshop.

#### **PIC Network**

50. UNEP proposes to establish a sub-regional network for 14 Pacific Island Countries. Like other networks, this network would help in implementation of Montreal Protocol through closer one-to-one coordination with the countries. It is proposed to hold one annual network meeting with the PIC countries. For implementation of this project, UNEP will closely collaborate with SPREP and Government of Australia.

#### **New initiatives undertaken in ROAP region**

##### **Activities to prevent illegal trade in ODS**

51. UNEP ROAP will continue to implement Green Customs Initiative with national-level complementary training, which will introduce Montreal Protocol activities in synergy with other MEAs. During the year 2007, the first workshop of Enforcement Networks for South Asia and Southeast Asia and the Pacific countries was held. UNEP ROAP will continue to synergistically work with other MEAs to integrate ODS phase-out illegal trade issues under Enforcement Networks and facilitate learning of these networks from Montreal Protocol experiences.

##### **Regional workshops on alternative metered-dose inhalers (MDI)**

52. As a follow-up from the Colombo Thematic Meeting on CFC MDI phaseout for South Asia countries, UNEP ROAP will be conducting CFC MDI phaseout Thematic Meeting for South Asia and Southeast Asia and the Pacific network countries in Malaysia in March 2008. This meeting would be organised back-to-back with the Network Meeting for South Asia and Southeast Asia and the Pacific Network countries and would address issues faced by CFC MDI manufacturing countries and import dependant countries in the region. This workshop would cover National Ozone Units, Representatives from Ministries of Health, MTOC members, Representatives from specialized centres for respiratory disease treatment, Implementing and bilateral agencies, industries in developed and developing countries manufacturing CFC MDIs etc.

### **Regional awareness strategy**

53. Regional awareness strategy under implementation was reviewed and a brain-storming session was held in UNEP ROAP office in January 2008. This brainstorming session provided inputs for 2008-10 awareness activities implementation in terms of activities, priorities, potential partners and timelines. The findings of the brain-storming session and the awareness strategy would be consulted with the network countries and implemented beginning 2008.

### **Latin America and the Caribbean: regional priorities and challenges**

54. The LAC region comprises countries that are producers, high volume consumers, low volume consumers and very low volume consumers of ODS. Further, the regional has five major languages (Spanish, Portuguese, French, English, and Dutch). Additionally compliance approaches and commitments to the Montreal Protocol are not regionally uniformed. Effective provision of compliance assistance therefore had to be tailored to meet these variations.

55. The ROLAC/CAP will employ multi-stranded approaches to bring all stakeholders and interested groups at regional, sub-regional and national levels into the folds of Ozone Layer Protection and the Montreal Protocol on the phase-out of ODS.

Some of the principal actions are as follows:

- Raising Montreal Protocol to the highest level authorities at the Ministries
- National Capacity Building and Promotion of South/South Cooperation Activities
- Networking and regional public awareness activities
- Country awareness on the needs of ODS illegal travel prevention
- Streamlining UNEP Administrative Procedures to Implement Multilateral Fund projects

56. In 2008 and next years, the highest priority for the CAP team in LAC will be to facilitate the preparation and implementation of national and regional projects as well as helping countries to strength the enforcement of its respective ODS license system, particularly oriented to establish an accurate HCFC base line. Greater emphasis will be place on completing delayed projects and assisting countries with specific compliance difficulties.

57. Therefore, the regional CAP team will focus on the following implementation issues:

- Continuing with strengthening national institutional arrangements to prepare countries for new projects/activities and for the challenges ahead.
- Fostering intra-regional technical cooperation particularly in VLVC countries.
- Arranging intensive project-management training and technology alternatives to new ozone officers and their assistants.
- Using occasions of country visits and Ministerial Forum for thorough evaluation of the Montreal Protocol activities at the national level and to actively seek cooperation of high level ministerial officials.
- Improving internal funds disbursement mechanisms and monitoring of resource allocation at the national level.
- Guiding NOUs on adjusting and streamlining work plans for each project to respond to the current country situation and demands.
- Promoting the ODS licensing system review and strengthening enforcement mechanisms.

- Establishing the ODS Custom Enforcement Network to prevent illegal trade in Latin American countries and the Eastern Caribbean countries.

### **West Asia: regional priorities and challenges**

CAP/ROWA will adjust its strategy trying to bring back the attention about the remaining incomplete mission of CFC phase-out and to make sure that ongoing terminal/national phase-out projects are kept on track. More attention will be given to expediting the implementation of ongoing TPMPs/NPPs and to ensure timely submission and reporting. This is due to the new challenges brought by the historical Montreal Adjustment to accelerate the phase out of HCFC which generated high attention and concern of many countries in West Asia on how to meet the new control measures noting the increase in demand on HCFC due to high dependency on air-conditioning and the urban development booming in the region. The new adjustment triggered high-level attention in WA countries and has become one of the major environmental priorities in the region for the coming years.

CAP/ROWA will continue its work in supporting countries to update and enforce their existing national ODS legislations/regulations. Strengthening the role of related regional groups such as GCC Ozone Group, Arab Team of Chemicals MEAs and ASHRAE will be another important goal of CAP/ROWA to institutionalize Montreal Protocol on the regional level.

Introducing quick, timely and comprehensive assistance to Iraq, as new party, will be also of high attention by CAP/ROWA. Establishing NOU, preparing CP and assessing consuming sectors need to be addressed as a matter of urgency to enable Iraq to catch the international efforts to phase-out ODS. All regional possible resources such S-S cooperation and network activities will contribute in this goal.

Addressing technical regional concerns is another major goal for CAP/ROWA that will continue introducing technical support to areas of updating relevant technical curricula, MeBr use in dates sector, MDIs use, disposal of ODS and, of course, starting up regional strategy for HCFC.

Curbing illegal trade in ODS will continue to be in focus as vital element to secure compliance. CAP/ROWA plan to examine establishment of Informal PIC system, even partially, and creating regional Customs Enforcement Network benefiting of other regional initiatives and existing strong channels with regional gatherings such as GCC & League of Arab States. Promoting the Green Customs Initiative in depth on national levels started in 2007 and will continue in 2008/2009 to secure building national capacities and procedural frameworks.

Compliance is the core target of CAP business, therefore ensuring the timely introduction of policy and technical support to countries in potential non-compliance situation is the main driving force behind all regional and national activities within CAP's plan. Such target will not be limited to clear cases but will also cover countries with zero-baseline levels of some ODS mainly CTC, TCA & MeBr.

Additionally, CAP/ROWA will consult with countries in West Asia about developing regional awareness strategy addressing forthcoming challenging compliance targets and benefiting of Qatar's hosting the 20<sup>th</sup> MOP as first MOP in West Asia region.

### **West Asia: special initiatives**

As part of CAP/ROWA objective to introduce sustainability dimension to Ozone Layer Protection business in West Asia, CAP/ROWA, the American University in Beirut (AUB) and Kuwait University (KU) prepared and tested special ODS Management course for engineering under-graduates studies. The course achieved noticeable success and attracted wide attention in both institutes when introduced in 2007. CAP/ROWA will work closely with both institutes in putting the course in a format usable by other regional universities and institutions and will include in its 2008 program special activities for ensuring the appropriate dissemination of this effort.

### **Europe & Central Asia: regional priorities and challenges**

64. Overall, the ECA network countries demonstrated high commitment to achieve the phase-out targets and the National Ozone Units (NOUs) have the political support of the Governments. Most Ozone Officers occupy senior positions and have access to their respective Ministers. The fluctuation of Ozone Officers is reasonably low and potential replacements are integrated into the network activities at an early stage. There is a high level of mutual support and more advanced countries share their experiences with their colleagues from other countries. The artificial distinction between CEIT and Article 5 countries is gradually fading through joint activities as is the language barrier between English- and Russian-speaking countries.

65. Few countries face compliance issues and usually return quickly to compliance or develop plans of action. Nevertheless, several countries have to double their efforts to comply with the 2007 and 2010 phase-out targets. Turkmenistan has revised its MeBr baseline and expressed the need for TPMP-type activities to achieve complete CFC phase-out. The eligibility would need to be addressed by the Executive Committee.

66. Priorities for the year 2008 will be to enhance regional cooperation and to attract new partners from the public and private sector, both within the Article 5 group of countries and with Article 2 neighbors including GEF-supported countries with economies in transition. Such cooperation will especially be crucial in the context of HCFC management, where European Union and their accession countries have accumulated significant experience in terms of stakeholder communication, regulation, standardization, available technologies and cost implications.

67. Emphasis will be put on the review and enforcement of import / export licensing systems as recommended by the CAP advisory group to ensure effective control of ODS trade including HCFCs. Continuous efforts will be undertaken to facilitate the ratification of the Montreal Protocol amendments especially in some Central Asian countries, to maintain the quality and timeliness of data reporting, to inform on the latest developments of non-CFC metered-dose inhalers, to support other agencies in the development of HCFC surveys & strategies, to continue monitoring instances of illegal trade in ODS and the potential risk of non-compliance in order to achieve sustained phase-out of ODS beyond 2010.

68. Sustaining the phase-out beyond 2010 through enhanced partnerships and collaboration with various regional and sub-regional initiatives and organizations, inter-governmental and non-governmental organizations, and industry will be promoted with a view to raising the political profile and awareness of the Montreal Protocol. National and regional awareness raising, briefing of environmental journalists and media and revision of training curricula of schools and educational institutes will be crucial. Subject to funding availability, technical and policy documents will be translated into Russian as well as other regional languages to ensure access to up-to-date information.

69. Some countries need to review their consumption data for example concerning the use of halons in military and aviation and MeBr for quarantine and pre-shipment uses. The need for an integrated and synergetic approach towards chemicals management and MEA implementation was emphasized by several countries.

70. The CAP team will facilitate direct country-to-country and programmatic assistance to those countries facing immediate and long-term compliance challenges through exchange of experience with network countries, operation of contact groups and involvement of local experts. Such activities will include:

- Induction training and mentoring of newly recruited National Ozone Officers or Assistant Ozone Officers by their more experience counterparts from other network countries or through participation in ECA network activities
- Country-to-country visits on the verification of data, review and improvement of ODS legislation, enforcement of import/export licensing systems, preparation of phase-out strategies and projects or participation in national stakeholder consultations as resource persons
- Facilitation of expert participation in international conferences on relevant subject areas upon request by ECA network countries

71. Special compliance sessions will be organized in margins of network and thematic meetings with involvement of network members, implementing agencies, secretariats, bilateral partners and other stakeholders. Through these sessions countries experiencing compliance difficulties will benefit from a peer review of their national situation in terms of ODS phase-out as well as from advice and consultation on the ways to return to compliance.

72. UNEP will continue to promote co-funding approaches e.g. through joint activities with the GEF-supported CEIT countries and the possibility of the HCFC workshop funded or co-funded by TAIEX for EU neighborhood countries or MeBr workshops sponsored by the Government of Israel may be explored.

73. Efforts will be undertaken to reduce the carbon impact of the ECA network activities, initially through symbolic initiatives such as tree planting, reduced travel or different modes of travel, use of virtual conference techniques where applicable up to participation in carbon off-set schemes.

#### **Support to the Pacific Island Countries**

74. The Regional Strategy to Comply with the Montreal Protocol in the Pacific Island Countries, which included institutional strengthening, capacity building activities and the PIC Network, expire by the end of 2005. While the Pacific Island Countries have very low or zero consumption of ODS, they are still faced with similar problems and have to implement phase-out measures and activities as other Parties.

75. UNEP is cooperating with Australia and SPREP on the development of a new proposal for the establishment of a sub-regional network for 14 Pacific Island Countries. The proposal is included in the bilateral Business Plan of Australia for 2008.

#### **IV. PLANNED 2008 ACTIVITIES AT THE GLOBAL LEVEL**

##### **Information and public awareness services**

76. In support of *Objectives 1-13* above, and consistent with the objectives outlined in the first year's Business Plan of this triennium, in 2008 UNEP will develop, deliver and support action-oriented information, communication and education (ICE) services to support national compliance objectives relative to the Montreal Protocol. These services will continue to be performed within the framework of the *Communication Strategy for Global Compliance with the Montreal Protocol* developed by UNEP, and wherever possible, in support of the *Information Strategy of the Multilateral Fund*.

77. These will be delivered by the Paris-based CAP team consisting of an Information Manager, an Information Officer, a Clearinghouse Assistant, and a Documentation assistant. Both these staff and their outputs will be funded from the CAP budget contained in the approved 2008 UNEP Work Programme, which reflects a reorientation of its ICE activities and related budget allocations following advice provided to UNEP by the CAP Advisory Group meeting on 22 September 2007.

78. UNEP will focus its *global* ICE activities<sup>2</sup> on supporting national celebrations of 2008 International Day for the Preservation of the Ozone Layer by providing NOUs with adaptable media materials and guidance.<sup>3</sup> Regarding *regional* ICE activities, the Paris-based staff will assist the Regional CAP teams with the conceptualization, production and outreach of the materials produced in the regions as part of the *Regional Awareness* budget lines controlled by the RNCs. Additionally, the Paris team will assist all CAP teams on an as needed basis with the ICE components of individual projects and activities reflected in this Business Plan including the CAP Services annex.

79. Specific services UNEP will deliver in 2008 are:

##### **Information**

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- Provide *information support to NOUs* and other stakeholders upon request in close coordination with the Regional CAP teams.
- Develop, disseminate and outreach an *Illustrated booklet in the Ozzy Ozone* series related to HCFCs and energy efficiency (e.g. as advised by the CAG to reorient existing services to address HCFCs).
- Reproduce and *disseminate* training manuals, guidelines and other information tools to (a) facilitate capacity building and training of new Ozone Officers and their assistants to ensure their quick understanding of Montreal Protocol requirements (b) service the national and regional workshops organized by the Regional CAP teams.
- *Encourage countries, organisations and companies to translate and adapt existing materials* produced under the Multilateral Fund into national languages at their own cost.
- Organise a *Global ozone protection photography contest*, which was not undertaken in 2007 due to the large number of awareness activities developed during the 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary year.
- Develop an online *Montreal Protocol's Who's Who* directory.

### Communication

- Produce and distribute in hardcopy and electronic format one large issue of the *OzonAction Newsletter* in Arabic, Chinese, English, French, Russian and Spanish.<sup>4</sup> This shift from three newsletter issues to one issue in a magazine format responds to the need to improve the timeliness and impact of this information product, in line with advice provided by the 2007 CAP Advisory Group meeting.
- Develop and disseminate the *electronic news services* OzoNews (24 issues), Clío3 and RUMBA (6 issues respectively).
- Continue seeking partnerships and linkages with other international, regional, national and corporate initiatives to propagate or incorporate information and awareness messages related to the Montreal Protocol and ozone protection.
- Conduct *strategic outreach* at key international and regional fora, and participate in regional or national workshops related to information, communication and education issues, as requested by the Regional CAP teams.

### Education

- Develop, disseminate and outreach a *Teacher's guide for secondary schools* in English, French and Spanish. This guide will be developed through a participatory process in close cooperation with NOUs and other partners.
- Develop, disseminate and outreach a *Resource guide on how to use the awareness and educational materials*. This resource kit, which will include all Ozzy Ozone materials translated by governments or the private sector, will be designed for NOUs to use in their countries' 2008 International Ozone Day celebrations.
- Create a *global network of NGO's, teachers and schools* that will be developed in close cooperation with NOUs to ensure proper dissemination of the materials in the regions and to promote the global OzonAction education strategy.
- Help ensure the long-term sustainability of the Montreal Protocol compliance in Article 5 countries by providing guidance and materials that can be used by Ozone Officers and Ministries of Education to incorporate issues of the ozone layer protection into their *national educational curricula*.

### **Capacity building and programme support**

80. In support of *Objectives 1-13* above, and consistent with the objectives outlined in the first year's Business Plan of this triennium, in 2008 UNEP will develop, deliver and support capacity building services to support national compliance objectives relative to the Montreal Protocol. These will be delivered by the Paris-based CAP team who will be funded from the CAP budget contained in the approved 2008 UNEP Work Programme.

81. UNEP will focus its capacity building services on supporting compliance in Article 5 countries through development and delivery of: *global* capacity building services and *indirect* services through the support for Business Planning and Work Programming activities.

82. Specific services UNEP will deliver in 2008 are:

#### Capacity building

- Implement the *Global technical assistance programme in the chiller sector* and disseminate information through a website.<sup>5</sup>
- Develop a series of *short technical and policy information materials* on priority compliance issues identified by NOUs.<sup>6</sup>
- Provide the *Help Desk* function including collection and analysis of regional trends, development of guidelines and assistance with compliance-related issues originating from the Regional CAP teams and countries.
- Develop an updated version of the *Refrigeration Servicing Technicians manual* in electronic format.
- Develop an interactive *online version of the updated Customs Training Manual*.
- Develop a *strategy for sustainability of local training capacity* built in Article 5 countries to enable continued training of customs officers and refrigeration technicians, placing an emphasis on national and institutional ownership and securing access to appropriate know-how beyond 2010.
- Collect and disseminate technical and policy information related to *HCFCs*.
- Provide Montreal Protocol-related inputs to the *Green Customs Initiative*.

#### Support to programme management

- Provide core support for the overall development of *Business Planning, Work Programming, CAP Budget Progress Reporting and Implementation Delays*.
- Collect, monitor, review and submit on behalf of management project proposals and other inputs from the Regional CAP teams related to *Executive Committee submissions*.
- Coordinate CAP's inputs to the *Implementation Committee*.
- Monitor and report on all *IS projects* implemented by UNEP.
- Assist with the development of common *compliance monitoring tools* through oMIS.
- Develop internal *guidelines for HCFC Management Plans* and other HCFC-related issues.

#### Programme management and coordination

83. The Paris-based CAP team is the coordinating hub of all CAP teams, including those in the region and Paris. Its roles and responsibilities include:

- Provides overall strategic direction and oversight of all UNEP's activities related to the Montreal Protocol implementation.
- Acts as principal liaison with the Executive Committee, the Multilateral Fund Secretariat, Ozone Secretariat, Implementing Agencies and bilateral agencies.
- Ensures the overall coordination of Regional Networking activities and project development in the regions.
- Supports project implementation by guiding countries on policy and technical issues relating to the projects.
- Coordinates programme planning, budgeting and reporting.
- Monitors progress both at the project- as well as country strategy-level, and provides early warning and guidance to the CAP teams related to implementation delays.
- Undertakes administrative services required for overall programme operation.
- Facilitates the evaluation of CAP activities as needed by the Multilateral Fund.

Under the guidance of this coordinating hub, the regional CAP teams implement the regional and national activities approved in the Business Plan. Additionally, two other Paris-based CAP teams, Information Management and Capacity Building, implement global and regional activities in coordination with the regional CAP teams.

## V. EXPECTED RESULTS FROM UNEP'S INTERVENTION

84. It is expected that the implementation of the above projects and activities will result in the following:

- Improved capabilities and technical skills of NOUs staff to effectively carry out approved phase-out programmes and thus ensure sustained compliance;
- Countries in non-compliance received necessary support enabling swift return to compliance;
- Increased high level political commitment to the ozone agreements;
- ODS phase-out obligations mainstreamed into national environmental strategies/policies;
- Increased number of Parties to the Montreal Protocol and its Amendments;
- Enhanced awareness of users and other relevant stakeholders of forthcoming reductions in ODS supply and availability of viable alternatives;
- All client countries reported Article 7 data by established deadlines; quality of reported data improved;
- Majority of client countries submitted outstanding reports on implementation of their Country Programme to the Multilateral Fund Secretariat;
- Improved and enforced ODS related legal instruments;
- NOUs provided with best available information that enable them to make decisions on alternative technologies, sound approaches and methodologies;
- Broadened and strengthened regional cooperation in the implementation of the ozone treaties;
- Increased number of countries benefiting from direct country-to-country assistance;
- Concerted actions taken at national and regional levels to combat illegal trade in ODS;
- Improved access to ODS-related technical information and enhanced experience exchange in widely-spoken languages, such as Russian and Portuguese;
- Indirect support provided for the implementation of investment projects through strengthened institutional and legal frameworks.

85. Qualitative results are covered in Performance Indicators section.

## VI. RESOURCE ALLOCATION

86. As stated above, the annual budget of the UNEP Compliance Assistance Programme for 2008 was approved by 53<sup>rd</sup> meeting of the Executive Committee at the amount of **US\$ 8,902,447** including programme support costs.

87. The 2008 CAP budget is to be used for salaries of 45 CAP staff members, more than 550 country-specific compliance services, operation of 9 Regional/Sub-regional Networks and the Information Clearing House.

88. In 2008 UNEP will submit for approval to the 56<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Executive Committee an annual budget of the CAP for 2009 at the estimated amount of **US\$ 9,637,000** including programme support costs.

89. A summary of projects planned for submission by UNEP in **2008** is presented in Table 2.

#### D. SPECIAL INITIATIVES

##### Activities to prevent illegal trade in ODS

90. Decision XII/16 of the Meeting of the Parties to the Montreal Protocol recommends “to encourage further work on the Green Customs initiative of the United Nations Environment Programme in combating illegal trade in controlled ozone-depleting substances as well as further networking and twinning activities in the framework of regional networks aimed at the exchange of information and experience on both licit and illicit trade in controlled ozone-depleting substances between the Parties, including enforcement agencies”.

91. Decision XVIII/18 of the meeting of the Parties to the Montreal Protocol encourages Parties to consider effective action to improve monitoring of transboundary movement of ozone-depleting substances. The same decision encourages UNEP’s Compliance Assistance Programme (CAP) to continue its efforts to train ozone officers and customs officers on best practices and raise awareness and to disseminate examples of best practices for national licensing systems and regional cooperation to combat illegal trade.

92. Initially based on regional and sub-regional workshops, the Green Customs Initiative will continue exploring national-level complementary training, which will introduce Montreal Protocol activities in synergy with other MEAs. The Green Customs Partners’ meeting held in January 2008 in Paris further discussed and agreed on future orientations.

93. The following activities are planned for 2008, in addition to regional enforcement networks:

- Enforcement Network for West Asia;
- Intelligence-led enforcement support for Armenia, Kyrgyzstan and Turkmenistan (Europe and Central Asia);
- Integrated enforcement training under the Montreal Protocol through Green Customs Initiative

#### E. PLANNED BUSINESS PLAN ACTIVITIES

94. *Ongoing projects* – By the end of 2007, UNEP project portfolio consisted of **292** ongoing non-investment projects as contained in Annex II. In addition UNEP is implementing **107** institutional strengthening projects. UNEP will strive to complete delayed projects and those projects due for completion in 2008 in a timely manner, taking into account the importance of efficient project implementation for compliance with the 2007 and 2010 phase-out targets.

95. *Programme expansion* – UNEP plans to prepare and submit for approval during 2008-2010 **387** non-investment projects as itemized in Annex III.

## F. PERFORMANCE INDICATORS

96. As per Decision 48/7, 48/45, and 49/4, UNEP will use the following indicators in 2008:

## G. POLICY ISSUES

### Policy Issues

#### Changed GEF policy and support for Article 5 CEITs.

98. GEF has changed its funding policy and provided additional financial assistance to CEIT countries to achieve total phase-out through continued IS projects, which include RMP-type activities to phase-out residual amounts of CFCs (customs training, refrigeration training), networking (participation in the ECA network), HCFC and methyl bromide related activities and support to the Green Customs Initiative. This is reflected in the Ozone Focal Area Strategy text under GEF 4: "Objective: For the period of GEF-4, the GEF will assist eligible countries in meeting their HCFC phase out obligations under the Montreal Protocol, as well as addressing remaining use of methyl bromide, and strengthening capacities and institutions in those countries that still are faced with difficulties in meeting their reporting obligations and in phasing out residual amounts of CFCs."

99. In the past, GEF approved Institutional Strengthening (IS) projects for CEIT countries to achieve *complete* phase-out of ODS. In contrast to IS projects under the Multilateral Fund these GEF-supported IS projects included typical RMP elements such as training of refrigeration technicians and customs officers and recovery and recycling. However, at the time they did not include support for methyl bromide or HCFC phase-out. In recent years, GEF approved regional total methyl bromide phase-out projects in CEITs. Recently, GEF has approved the renewal of GEF IS projects for Azerbaijan, Kazakhstan, Tajikistan, and Uzbekistan including typical RMP elements to phase-out residual amounts of CFC. Armenia and Turkmenistan, both of which have been reclassified as Article 5 countries, did not receive similar financial assistance to phase-out residual amounts of CFCs under Multilateral Fund regime. It appears that under the current arrangements they are disadvantaged compared to their GEF-supported counterparts.

*100. The Executive Committee may wish to consider this change in GEF policy in their decisions especially with regard to former CEIT countries which have been re-classified as Article 5 countries.*

#### TPMP support for Article 5 CEITs

*101. Turkmenistan - TPMP.* The country, which has been reclassified as an Article 5 country since January 2005, had already exhausted the funding provided by GEF to implement its CP and IS project. Overall, GEF had approved USD 0.4 million and the country phased out 118.7 ODP tons with GEF funding from an overall consumption of 177.9 ODP tons in 1989 to 59.2 ODP tons in 2004 (58.4 ODP tons of CFC and 0.8 ODP tons of HCFC). In 2006, the country reported a remaining CFC consumption of 16.8 ODP tons against a baseline of 37.3 ODP tons. Turkmenistan is expected to reduce its consumption to 5.6 ODP tons in 2007 and to achieve total CFC phase-out in 2010. According to the Fund Secretariat's risk analysis model of non-compliance, Turkmenistan's risk would be 200% over the 15% target in 2007.

102. Currently, the country receives IS support funded by the Multilateral Fund and actively participates in the ECA network. The phase-out of the remaining 16.8 ODP tons of CFC consumption appears to be a challenge without additional assistance from the Multilateral Fund. Recently, UNEP received confirmation that the Government of Turkmenistan has approved the ratification of the Copenhagen, Montreal and Beijing amendments.

*103. Armenia - TPMP.* The country, which was reclassified as an Article 5 country, has until recently used all of the remaining funding provided by the GEF to implement its CP and IS project. Overall, GEF had approved USD 2.1 million and the country phased out 133.7 ODP tons from an overall consumption of 196.5 ODP tons in 1989 to 62.8 ODP tons in 2006 (59.0 ODP tons of CFC and 3.8 ODP tons of HCFC). In 2006, the country reported a remaining CFC consumption of 59.0 ODP tons against a baseline of 196.5 ODP tons. Armenia is expected to reduce its consumption to 29.5 ODP tons in 2007 and to achieve total CFC phase-out in 2010. According to the Fund Secretariat's risk analysis model of non-compliance, Armenia's risk would be 100% over the 15% target in 2007.

104. The GEF funds have now been exhausted and the IS project for Armenia is included in UNEP's 2008 Business Plan. The country actively participates in the ECA network activities. The Executive Committee has already approved the country's TPMP preparation, but it is currently being reconsidered. The phase-out of the remaining 59.0 ODP tons of CFC consumption appears to be a challenge without additional assistance from the Multilateral Fund for phasing out residual amounts of CFCs. Recently, the country confirmed that the ratification of the Montreal and Beijing amendments is under consideration by the relevant Government bodies.

*105. The Executive Committee may wish to consider the need to provide TPMP assistance to Turkmenistan and Armenia to enable them to eliminate their remaining CFC consumption.*

### **Administrative and Financial Issues**

106. In general, UNEP is experiencing cost increases in salaries over and above the 3% increase approved in the Executive Committee for CAP budgets over the last few years. The main reason for this increase is the increase in travel costs (primarily driven by the increase in oil prices) and costs of the post-adjustment allowance component of the salary, which not only constitutes more than 30-35 percent of the salary and but also undergoes upward adjustment with depreciation of the US dollar against the local currency. While UNEP Regional teams and Paris undertake all efforts to control other administration costs, the manpower costs need to be examined closely for revisions aligned to global trends, if required.
