> 2008 BUSINESS PLANS AND ANNUAL TRANCHE SUBMISSION DELAYS

Introduction

- 1. This document considers business planning in light of approvals at the 54th Meeting, submissions to the 55th Meeting, and allocations in the 2008 business plans. Firstly, it addresses decisions taken at the 54th Meeting with respect to the 2008-2010 business plans. It also presents the value of activities that were not submitted to either the 54th or 55th Meetings but were included in the 2008 business plans. The document identifies projects required for compliance and proposes activities that could assist countries for which decisions on compliance have been taken by the Meeting of the Parties. The document also assesses the forward commitments approved to-date as well as those submitted for approval to the 55th Meeting. It concludes with observations and recommendations.
- 2. At its 53rd Meeting the Executive Committee requested the Fund Secretariat "to proceed with the inclusion of information on submission delays in the context of its review of the implementation of business plans at the second and third Meetings of each year" (decision 53/3 paragraph (c)). Pursuant to that decision, a new section has been added to this document.

Decisions taken on 2008-2010 business plans

- 3. At its 54th Meeting the Executive Committee decided to remove HCFC demonstration and investment activities, associated project preparation and start-up costs from the business plans but to reconsider their inclusion in the business plans at the 56th Meeting. The Committee also agreed to remove all but two ODS disposal activities. Of the remaining activities, one is a demonstration project and the other a study.
- 4. The Committee decided to remove several projects from UNEP's business plan. These included non-investment activities, such as the establishment of an East Caribbean regional refrigeration association network, TPMP activities in Turkmenistan, an assessment of unwanted ODS and ODS-based equipment, research and development activities in national institutions, a global project on sustainable agriculture, regional public awareness activities for methyl bromide, a regional workshop on strengthening monitoring and reporting systems on methyl bromide use, a regional workshop to prevent new uses in methyl bromide, and a request for additional funds to cover the post-adjustment allowances of UNEP Compliance Assistance Programme (CAP).
- 5. Table 1 presents the resources allocated in the 2008-2010 business plans based on the modifications made at the 54th Meeting according to:
 - Activities identified as required for compliance in the compliance-oriented model rolling three-year phase-out plan; and
 - Activities considered not required for compliance by the model.
- 6. The value "required for compliance" is defined as those activities required by the compliance-oriented model, institutional strengthening, Secretariat/Executive Committee/Treasurer, CAP and core unit funds. Pursuant to decision 54/5, paragraph (b)(i), an HCFC analysis is included in the compliance-oriented model and, therefore, HCFC activities are now considered to be required for compliance. Those activities not required for compliance are defined as those beyond the needs identified by the model rolling three-year phase-out plan.

- 7. A total of US \$133.2 million in 2008 is required for compliance and standard activities under the Multilateral Fund. Table 1 indicates that US \$18.1 million has been allocated over and above the needs identified by the model three-year phase-out plan.
- 8. A total of US \$285,386,359 (US \$143,021,889 in 2006 and US \$142,364,470 in 2007) was approved in 2006 and 2007 against the 2006-2008 triennium budget. US \$184,613,641 remains in the budget for 2008. A total of US \$33,350,674 remains unallocated.
- 9. The modifications by the Executive Committee to the 2008-2010 business plan at its 54th Meeting changed the allocation among agencies, as indicated in Table 2.

Approvals and the 2008 business plan

- 10. Table 3 shows the approvals at the 54th Meeting and the submissions to the 55th Meeting as at 4 June 2008. It indicates the extent to which these approvals either exceed, or are less than, the values assigned to them in the business plan. It illustrates that the actual values of projects approved at the 54th Meeting were higher than the levels that had been indicated for these activities in the 2008 business plans. It also shows that at its 54th Meeting, the Executive Committee approved projects valued at a total of US \$248,612 greater than had been indicated in the 2008 business plan for these projects.
- 11. Submissions to the 55th Meeting also include project values, amounting to US \$91,894,661 (including US \$8,310,280 that were not in the business plans), which exceed the amount included for them in the 2008 business plans. Those activities not included in the business plan are: HPMP preparation for 34 projects (US \$7,889,907), a TPMP for Benin (US \$115,540), two MDI transition strategies (US \$32,700 each for Mongolia and Peru), a methyl bromide technical assistance project in Colombia (US \$43,600), and three institutional strengthening projects (US \$60,000 for Jamaica, US \$75,833 for Kenya and US \$60,000 for Saint Lucia). If all of the submissions to the 55th Meeting are approved at the levels requested, the Executive Committee would have approved US \$38,412,390 more than the total amount included in the 2008 business plans for these projects.
- 12. The main reason that the submissions (including those activities that were not in the business plans) have exceeded their business plan value is that the cost of HPMP preparation funding requests amounts to US \$29,955,540 more than had been indicated in the business plans. Moreover, the costs of China's MDI project exceeded its business plan level by US \$7,264,290, and the CFC phase-out plan for Yemen exceeded its business plan level by US \$1,214,198.
- 13. Given that the submitted value of projects is significantly higher than the values in the business plans, a more accurate assessment will be forthcoming based on the Secretariat's recommendations (to be known and provided nearer the date of the 55th Meeting). Table 3 will be updated based on the value of the Secretariat's recommendations as part of an addendum to this document.

14. Table 4 presents, by agency, the value of accounts included in the 2008 business plans and the balance of funds from projects in the 2008 business plans, which have not been submitted. Table 4 will also be updated based on the Secretariat's recommendations as part of an addendum to this document. This table also shows that US \$23,601,699 of the US \$151,262,967 in the 2008 business plans budget (16 per cent) is expected to be submitted to the 56th Meeting.

Value of projects not submitted

16. Table 5 addresses the account value remaining for activities not submitted to either the 54th or 55th Meetings, which were included in the 2008 business plans. It indicates that activities required for compliance valued at US \$41.4 million were not submitted to either the 54th or 55th Meetings. A detailed list of all these activities is provided in Annex I. A list of activities not required for compliance (with a total value of US \$13.95 million) is provided in Annex II.

Annual Tranche Delay

- 17. This section is submitted as a follow-up to the decision taken at the 47th Meeting, which requested a report on delays in the submission of annual tranches (decision 47/50, paragraph (d)) and was modified at the 53rd Meeting by decision 53/3, paragraph (c), and that this information be included in this report to the second and third meetings of the year. The reason for this report emanates from a history of late submissions of annual tranches that resulted in delays in transferring funds and in fulfilling obligations to fund the activities required by the annual tranches. It is intended to enable the Executive Committee to encourage countries and relevant agencies to enhance their efforts to submit annual tranches as soon as possible and to address difficulties in meeting deadlines with respect to their submissions. The report is only provided to the second and third meetings of the year so that once the business plans are approved at the first meeting, documents on business planning submitted to the subsequent meetings in the year can monitor the implementation of the annual business plans, including the submission of annual tranches that are due during that year.
- 18. This report has addressed delays in the submission of tranches that were due at the current meeting and presents recommendations for consideration by the Executive Committee. It also highlights annual tranches that have been withdrawn from consideration at the current meeting due to slow implementation of the first tranche. A new sub-section has been added to address annual tranches that have been delayed to two consecutive meetings.
- 19. Fifty-two annual tranches were due for submission to the 55th Meeting. Twenty-one have not been submitted. These are broken down as follows: UNDP (6), UNEP (5), UNIDO (4), World Bank (3), Canada (1), Italy (1) and Spain (1).

Annual Tranche Delays for two consecutive meetings

20. Table 6 presents those tranches that were not submitted to two consecutive meetings with the reasons as provided by the relevant implementing agency.

21. The Executive Committee may wish to note these facts and request that letters be sent encouraging implementing agencies and the relevant Article 5 Governments to take actions to expedite the implementation of the approved tranches so that the past-due tranches could be submitted to the 56^{th} Meeting.

Other annual tranches due for submission to the 55th Meeting

22. Table 7 presents those tranches that were not submitted with the reasons as provided by the relevant implementing agency.

23. The Executive Committee may wish to note these facts and request that letters be sent encouraging implementing agencies and the relevant Article 5 Governments to submit these annual tranches to the 56^{th} Meeting.

Annual tranches submitted but withdrawn after discussion with the Fund Secretariat

24. Table 8 presents those annual tranches that were submitted to the Fund Secretariat but withdrawn after review by the Fund Secretariat.

25. The Executive Committee may wish to encourage the Governments of Bangladesh, Comoros, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Dominica, Saint Kitts and Nevis, Saint Vincent and the Grenadines, and Uruguay to expedite the implementation of the first tranche of its TPMP in order to submit the next tranche as soon as possible.

Forward commitments

26. The addendum that will be issued prior to the 55th Meeting of the Executive Committee will cover this section, based on draft agreements currently under preparation. The addendum will further address the extent to which forward commitments submitted for approval at the 55th Meeting correspond to the amounts associated with them in the 2008-2010 business plans.

Observations

- 27. Following the modifications to the 2008-2010 business plans agreed at the 54th Meeting, there remains an unallocated amount of US \$33,350,674 for the triennium. The value of projects submitted to the 55th Meeting exceeds those indicated for them in the business plans by US \$38,412,390. This is due largely to the cost of HPMP preparation, which exceeded the values that had been included in the agencies' business plans and that had been endorsed at the last meeting of the Executive Committee by US \$29,995,540. The value of these projects could more than offset the unallocated funds if they are approved at the levels that have been submitted.
- 28. Projects valued at US \$8,310,280 have been submitted to the 55th Meeting but have not been included in the business plans. Almost all of this (US \$7,889,907) is for HPMP preparation.

- 29. Thirty-seven per cent of the value of the 2008 business plans is expected to be submitted to the 56th Meeting. Bilateral and multilateral implementing agencies should be requested to submit those activities required for compliance in their 2008 business plans to the 56th Meeting, particularly in view of the short time remaining until complete phase-out of CFCs, halon and CTC in 2010.
- 30. Twenty-one annual tranches due to the 55th Meeting were not submitted, seven of which have been delayed for the second consecutive meeting. An additional seven annual tranches were submitted but have been withdrawn due to limited implementation of some of the activities previously approved and incomplete verification as documentation.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 31. The Executive Committee may wish to consider:
 - (a) Noting the Report on the status of the 2008 business plans as contained in UNEP/OzL.Pro/ExCom/55/5 and the fact that US \$41.4 million in activities that were required for compliance had not been submitted to the 55th Meeting, and that the value of forward commitments approved at the 55th Meeting [exceeds/is below] the value in the 2008-2010 business plan of the Multilateral Fund by US \$XXX [to be provided based on actual approvals];
 - (b) Noting the information on annual tranches of multi-year agreements submitted to the Secretariat by Canada, Italy Spain, UNDP, UNEP, UNIDO, and the World Bank as contained in the document (UNEP/OzL.Pro/ExCom/55/5);
 - (c) Requesting bilateral and multilateral implementing agencies to submit those activities required for compliance in the 2008 business plans to the 56th Meeting.
 - (d) Noting that 31 of the 52 annual tranches of multi-year agreements that were due for submission were submitted on time to the 55th Meeting, but the remaining 21 have not been:
 - (e) Noting that letters should be sent for the annual tranches, indicated in Table 6 of the present document, that were due for submission to the last two meetings with the reasons indicated for the delay, and encouraging implementing agencies and the relevant Article 5 Governments to take actions to expedite the implementation of the approved tranches so that the past-due tranches could be submitted to the 56th Meeting;
 - (f) Noting that letters should be sent for the annual tranches, indicated in Table 7 of the present document, that were due for submission to the 55th Meeting with the reasons indicated for the delay, and encouraging implementing agencies and the relevant Article 5 Governments to submit these annual tranches to the 56th Meeting;

- (g) Encouraging the Governments of Bangladesh, Comoros, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Dominica, Saint Kitts and Nevis, Saint Vincent and the Grenadines, and Uruguay to expedite the implementation of their current tranches of the TPMP in order to submit the next tranche as soon as possible.
- (h) Noting that the level of annual tranches submitted for approval to the 55th Meeting amounted to US \$ XXX and, as a result, the total level of commitments for the period 2009 to 2014 would amount to US \$ XXX million [to be updated].
