INFORME SOBRE LA MARCHA DE LAS ACTIVIDADES DEL PNUMA AL 31 DE DICIEMBRE DE 2007

COMENTARIOS DE LA SECRETARÍA DEL FONDO

Introducción

1. En el presente documento figuran los comentarios y las recomendaciones de la Secretaría del Fondo acerca del informe sobre la marcha de las actividades del PNUMA realizadas hasta el 31 de diciembre de 2007. Se adjunta el mencionado informe.

Descripción sucinta de los problemas

- Se han aprobado 5,6 millones \$EUA para la ejecución de acuerdos plurianuales del PNUMA y al 31 de diciembre de 2007 había un saldo de 3,7 millones \$EUA.
- Se están ejecutando cuarenta y un acuerdos plurianuales; en cuatro acuerdos plurianuales (aprobados hace más de un año) se ha desembolsado menos del 20 por ciento de los fondos aprobados.
- Un proyecto regional y cuatro proyectos mundiales han experimentado demoras, además de los nueve proyectos, clasificados como tal, que están sujetos a los procedimientos de anulación de proyectos.
- Se han producido demoras en las actividades de preparación de proyectos, para las cuales no se han desembolsado los fondos, y hay proyectos para los cuales no se han consignado desembolsos.
- Se han notificado 33 casos de países con proyectos de fortalecimiento institucional aprobados hace más de un año para los que no se han efectuado desembolsos o para los que se han producido demoras en la ejecución.
- Se han presentado demoras en cuatro planes de gestión de refrigerantes.
- La preparación del programa de país aprobado en julio de 2006 comenzó en enero de 2008.
- Se desembolsaron fondos para un proyecto de bancos de halones antes de que se hubiese presentado el plan administrativo.
- Los fondos del programa de asistencia al cumplimiento se están utilizando para realizar estudios sobre aplicaciones de cuarentena y previas al envío.
- Aún no se ha dado respuesta a las preguntas formuladas por la Secretaría respecto de varios proyectos.

Situación de la ejecución

2. A finales de 2007, el PNUMA había completado la ejecución del 75 por ciento (839) de los proyectos aprobados (1 121) y desembolsado el 78 por ciento (99,35 millones \$EUA) de los recursos aprobados por el Comité Ejecutivo (126,87 millones \$EUA). El saldo restante ascendía a 695 895 \$EUA de fondos para la preparación de proyectos. Estos fondos aprobados para el PNUMA se destinan al desarrollo de planes de gestión de refrigerantes o planes de gestión para la eliminación definitiva.

3. En 2007 el PNUMA concluyó 16 programas de asistencia técnica, 13 programas de formación y 15 proyectos de preparación. Además, inició un nuevo proyecto de fortalecimiento institucional y renovó 41 proyectos de fortalecimiento institucional en curso.

Marcha de las actividades durante 2007 a nivel de país

- 4. En el Anexo I figura una evaluación por país de las actividades desempeñadas por el PNUMA en 2007. Este organismo ha programado desembolsos en 116 países o regiones y ha desembolsado más del 85 por ciento de los fondos previstos en 12 de estos países. El desembolso en un país fue negativo, lo que indica que ajustó los "fondos desembolsados" por debajo del nivel indicado en su informe sobre la marcha de las actividades de 2006.
- 5. Al 31 de diciembre de 2007, el PNUMA había terminado todos los proyectos que tenía previsto concluir en 29 de los 97 países y cuya finalización estaba prevista en 2007.

Acuerdos plurianuales

6. El PNUMA está participando en 49 acuerdos plurianuales (incluidos ocho acuerdos aprobados en 2008), lo que supone un aumento considerable ya que, a finales de 2006, sólo participaba en 16 acuerdos plurianuales.

Desembolsos para acuerdos plurianuales

7. El PNUMA está ejecutando 49 tramos anuales de los 41 acuerdos plurianuales con saldos a la espera de ser desembolsados. Estos tramos anuales se indican en el Cuadro 1.

A fines de 2007, el PNUMA había desembolsado 1 909 295 \$EUA de un total de 5 646 645 \$EUA de fondos aprobados para tramos anuales de proyectos plurianuales en curso (es decir, el 34 por ciento), por lo que el saldo restante se eleva a 3 737 350 \$EUA. De esta suma, en 2008 tiene previsto desembolsar 3 737 350 \$EUA (el 100 por ciento). Ahora bien, veinticuatro países han notificado desembolsos inferiores al 20 por ciento de los fondos aprobados para proyectos plurianuales.
- 9. Para varios tramos de proyectos plurianuales se ha notificado un desembolso de cero o casi cero a finales de 2007, lo cual se debe al hecho de que se aprobaron en la segunda o la tercera reunión del 2007. Estos son los planes de eliminación de SAO o CFC en Belice, Camboya, Chad, Djibouti, El Salvador, Gambia, Guyana, Kuwait, Liberia, Malawi, Maldivas,

Malí, Mauritania, Moldova, Nepal, Qatar, Rwanda, Samoa, Arabia Saudita y Zambia (véanse las filas en cursivas del Cuadro 1). El PNUMA ha informado a la Secretaría del Fondo que han comenzado las actividades en Kuwait, Moldova y Nepal. Cabe observar, sin embargo, que el PNUMA ha desembolsado más del 20 por ciento de los fondos para los siguientes países cuyos planes de gestión para la eliminación definitiva se aprobaron en la segunda o la tercera reunión de 2007: Comoras, Djibouti, Gabón, Madagascar y Senegal.

- 10. Hay cuatro proyectos que se aprobaron antes de la segunda reunión de 2007 cuyos niveles de desembolsos son inferiores al 20 por ciento (véanse las filas en negritas del Cuadro 1). Estos países son: Bahrein, Bangladesh, Panamá y Paraguay.
- 11. En lo que respecta al plan de gestión para la eliminación definitiva (primer tramo) en Bahrein (BAH/PHA/50/TAS/17), aprobado en noviembre de 2006, el PNUMA notificó que la firma del memorando de entendimiento está prevista para junio 2008.
- 12. En Bangladesh, el plan nacional de eliminación de SAO, aprobado en abril de 2004: programa de capacitación y certificación para técnicos de servicio de refrigeración, incluido el desarrollo de un código de buenas prácticas (programa de trabajo para 2004) (BGD/PHA/42/TRA/16) figura entre los de cero desembolsos. Sin embargo, el PNUMA alegó que el primer pago se efectuó en mayo de 2006 en concepto de actividades del proyecto, una vez firmado el documento del proyecto. El PNUMA también ha notificado que el segundo pago se efectuó en octubre de 2007 tras recibir, en septiembre de 2007, un informe satisfactorio sobre la marcha de las actividades del plan nacional de eliminación.
- 13. El plan nacional de eliminación de SAO: Sensibilización del público y divulgación de información entre los principales interesados (programa de trabajo para 2004) (BGD/PHA/42/TAS/18) incluye un plan para un estrategia de comunicaciones, presentado junto con la solicitud del tramo del plan nacional de eliminación para Bangladesh a la 55ª Reunión del Comité Ejecutivo. Las actividades indican un desembolsos igual a cero, aunque tras preguntarle al respecto, el PNUMA notificó que se han transferido 78 500 \$EUA al Gobierno de Bangladesh en el marco de este proyecto.
- 14. El PNUMA notificó que la aprobación administrativa para la firma del documento del proyecto para la estrategia de transición de inhaladores de dosis medidas en Bangladesh (BGD/ARS/52/TAS/27) ha llevado mucho tiempo. El proyecto se aprobó en la 52ª Reunión del Comité Ejecutivo y el PNUMA espera que el acuerdo con el Gobierno de Bangladesh se firmará antes de junio de 2008.
- 15. En cuanto al plan de gestión para la eliminación definitiva en Panamá (PAN/PHA/50/TAS/27), aprobado en noviembre de 2006, el PNUMA notificó que se ha firmado un memorando de entendimiento entre la autoridad aduanera y el PNUMA/ROLAC con el fin de crear un centro de coordinación técnica para impedir el comercio ilícito de SAO. La formación sobre la supervisión y control de las importaciones de SAO contó con la asistencia de 30 funcionarios. Queda por efectuar el primer desembolso.
- 16. En lo que concierne al plan de gestión para la eliminación definitiva en Paraguay (PAR/PHA/51/TAS/18), aprobado en marzo de 2007, se ha firmado el memorando de

entendimiento con el Gobierno de Paraguay para la ejecución de dicho plan. La oficina nacional del ozono ha preparado un plan operativo anual para el año 2008.

17. El Comité Ejecutivo pudiera considerar oportuno solicitar que se presenten informes de situación adicionales sobre estos proyectos.

Proyectos individuales

- 18. En esta sección se aborda el tema de las demoras en la ejecución y se formulan comentarios sobre proyectos concretos que aún no se han clasificado como proyectos con demoras de ejecución pero cuya ejecución parece presentar dificultades.
- 19. En lo que respecta al proyecto para la armonización regional de mecanismos reglamentarios y legislativos que permita mejorar la supervisión y el control del consumo de SAO en los países de África de habla inglesa (AFR/SEV/45/TAS/33), el PNUMA notificó en 2007 que el acuerdo con ECOWAS se encuentra en su fase final. La Secretaría del Fondo entiende que las demoras se han resuelto. El PNUMA ha notificado que la Dependencia Nacional del Ozono de Nigeria está prestando asistencia en las consultas con la Secretaría de ECOWAS y que el PNUMA tiene prevista una misión de alto nivel para finalizar el proyecto.
- 20. Se ha tardado mucho tiempo en terminar el manual de aduanas en el marco del proyecto global sobre la actualización del manual de capacitación de aduanas (GLO/SEV/48/TRA/274). El PNUMA notificó que el manual ya se ha terminado, que en febrero de 2008 fue revisado por un editor profesional y que se está finalizando su diseño y composición. Se observó además que la publicación y divulgación está prevista para finales de junio de 2008, lo que representa otra demora para su conclusión.
- 21. El proyecto mundial sobre el estudio de los problemas relativos a los bancos de halones en países en desarrollo (GLO/HAL/52/TAS/281), aprobado en 2007, ha tardado mucho en comenzar. El PNUMA notificó que se presentaron dificultades para contratar un consultor, aunque está discutiendo con un consultor los pormenores del trabajo.
- 22. En cuanto al programa mundial de asistencia técnica en el sector de enfriadores (GLO/REF/48/TAS/275), el PNUMA notificó que se ha utilizado una parte de la financiación para la primera reunión de coordinación celebrada en Nueva Delhi en noviembre de 2006 y para producir un DVD sobre enfriadores, con la colaboración del Organismo de Protección del Medio Ambiente de Estados Unidos. Aunque indicó que hay otras actividades en curso, la Secretaría del Fondo ha observado que al parecer no se han desembolsado fondos para este proyecto que fue aprobado en abril de 2006.
- 23. El Comité Ejecutivo pudiera considerar oportuno solicitar que se presenten a la 56ª Reunión informes de situación adicionales sobre los cuatro proyectos mencionados en los párrafos precedentes.

Demoras en la ejecución

24. El Comité Ejecutivo está supervisando nueve proyectos que presentan demoras de ejecución. Cuatro de estos proyectos ya se clasificaron en 2006 como proyectos con demoras en la ejecución. El número de proyectos del PNUMA con demoras en 2007 fue mayor que en 2006, año en el que había siete proyectos clasificados en esta categoría. La tendencia de los otros organismos ha sido seguir reduciendo el número de proyectos con demoras en la ejecución. Obsérvese que la mayoría de los proyectos en la cartera del PNUMA no se clasifican como proyectos con demoras en la ejecución. El Comité Ejecutivo pudiera tomar nota de que el PNUMA tiene nueve proyectos clasificados como proyectos con demoras en la ejecución, incluidos cuatro así clasificados el año pasado, y solicitar que se presente en la 56ª Reunión un informe sobre estos proyectos;

Demoras en la preparación de proyectos

25. La preparación del plan de gestión para la eliminación definitiva en Nicaragua (NIC/PHA/49/PRP/19), aprobada en julio de 2006, experimentó demoras en 2007. Estas demoras se debieron, en parte, a la necesidad de un memorando de entendimiento con el PNUMA y a la lenta ejecución del plan de gestión de refrigerantes. El memorando de entendimiento entre el Gobierno de Nicaragua y el PNUMA se firmó en diciembre de 2007 con el fin de comenzar la preparación del plan de gestión para la eliminación definitiva.

Preparación de proyectos para los que no hay desembolsos consignados

- 26. En el Cuadro 2 se presenta información sobre la preparación de planes de gestión de la eliminación definitiva para los que al 31 de diciembre de 2007 no se habían desembolsado fondos. El Cuadro incluye las observaciones formulados por el organismo. Todos los proyectos se aprobaron entre noviembre de 2005 (47ª Reunión) y noviembre de 2006 (50ª Reunión).
- 27. La falta de desembolsos consignados para estas actividades de preparación de proyectos plantea dos problemas importantes. En primer lugar, en algunas observaciones se indica que los pagos se efectuaron a lo largo del año 2007. La causa de que dichos pagos no se hayan consignado como desembolsos puede ser que aún no se han recibido las correspondientes facturas. No obstante, dado que todos los proyectos se aprobaron antes de 2007, tendrían que haber desembolsos registrados si las actividades se hubieran iniciado cuando se aprobó el proyecto. En segundo lugar, hay varias cuentas de preparación de proyectos para las que aún no se ha firmado el memorando de entendimiento. Este memorando es una condición que ha de cumplirse antes de iniciar la preparación del proyecto y varias de estas actividades se han demorado más de un año en espera de la firma de dicho memorando.

Proyectos preparados sin desembolsos

28. En el Cuadro 3 se presenta información sobre la preparación de planes de gestión de eliminación definitiva para los que al 31 de diciembre de 2007 no se habían desembolsado fondos, pese al hecho de que dichos planes se había preparado y aprobado en la primera reunión de 2008. Estos proyectos se aprobaron entre marzo de 2006 (48ª Reunión) y noviembre de 2006 (50ª Reunión).

29. El Comité Ejecutivo pudiera considerar oportuno solicitar que se presenten a la 56ª Reunión informes de situación adicionales sobre los proyectos de preparación de planes de gestión para la eliminación definitiva indicados en los Cuadros 2 y 3.

Fortalecimiento institucional, planes de gestión de refrigerantes y presupuesto del programa de asistencia para el cumplimiento

30. Estos proyectos no están sujetos a supervisión mediante informes sobre demoras en la ejecución y, por consiguiente, no son aplicables los procedimientos de anulación de proyectos.

Fortalecimiento institucional

- 31. El PNUMA está ejecutando 122 proyectos de fortalecimiento institucional en 101 países.
- 32. El PNUMA ejecuta varios proyectos de fortalecimiento institucional para los que aún no se han desembolsado fondos. Varios de estos proyectos se aprobaron en la 52ª y 53ª Reuniones del Comité Ejecutivo y el PNUMA las notificó como "recientemente aprobadas". Ahora bien, hay también varios proyectos de fortalecimiento institucional que se aprobaron antes de la 52ª Reunión para los que resulta razonable esperar que se hayan efectuado desembolsos. En el Cuadro 4 se indican los motivos por los que el desembolso o la ejecución han sido lentos para los proyectos de fortalecimiento institucional que ejecuta el PNUMA.

33. El Comité Ejecutivo pudiera considerar oportuno solicitar que se presente a la 56ª Reunión informes de situación adicionales sobre estos proyectos de fortalecimiento institucional.

Demoras en la ejecución de planes de gestión de refrigerantes

- 34. Se han registrado adelantos en varios proyectos en curso. Sin embargo, algunos proyectos han experimentado demoras.
- 35. Se han producido demoras en la ejecución de los planes de gestión de refrigerantes (capacitación de instructores en buenas prácticas de gestión de refrigerantes y capacitación de técnicos nacionales) en Brunei Darrasalam (BRU/REF/44/TRA/07). Estas demoras se deben sobre todo al hecho de que el memorando de entendimiento se envió para su revisión en febrero de 2005, pero no se firmó hasta octubre de 2007.
- 36. En lo que respecta al programa de capacitación de funcionarios de aduanas del plan de gestión de refrigerantes en Syria (SYR/REF/29/TRA/47), se celebraron seis talleres de capacitación en 2006 y más de 100 funcionarios se beneficiaron de la capacitación. Ahora bien, según los desembolsos notificados por el PNUMA, sólo se han desembolsado 10 000 \$EUA de los 72 000 \$EUA de fondos aprobados para el proyecto. En cuanto a la capacitación de instructores y técnicos de refrigeración en buenas prácticas de servicio (SYR/REF/29/TRA/49), el informe presentado a la 52ª Reunión del Comité Ejecutivo indica que todas las actividades pendientes se realizaron en 2006 y sólo queda por notificar los gastos en 2007. Sin embargo, en sus últimas observaciones sobre este proyecto, el PNUMA afirma que las actividades se han demorado debido a un cambio en la oficina nacional del ozono. Así pues, no queda claro qué actividades se han demorado y a cuánto asciende el saldo que se devolverá al Fondo Multilateral.
- 37. En cuanto a la ejecución del componente del plan de gestión de refrigerantes relativo a la sensibilización pública de los usuarios en Chile (CHI/REF/35/TAS/148), el PNUMA notificó que al 31 de diciembre de 2006 sólo se habían desembolsado 27 367 \$EUA del total de los fondos aprobados para el proyecto (172 000 \$EUA). En el informe sobre la situación al 31 de diciembre de 2007 se indica un desembolso de 30 938 \$EUA. El PNUMA notificó que un desembolso se había efectuado por conducto de la oficina del PNUD en el terreno para ejecutar la segunda fase del programa de formación sobre el control de SAO, pero la fecha de terminación prevista se ha modificado de marzo de 2007 (según el último informe sobre la marcha de las actividades) a diciembre de 2008, como figura en el informe reciente.
- 38. En lo que concierne al plan nacional de eliminación de CFC en la República Democrática del Congo (DRC/PHA/49/TAS/23), al 31 de diciembre de 2006 no se había desembolsado nada de los 143 750 \$EUA aprobados. El PNUMA notificó que al 31 de diciembre de 2007 el proyecto había concluido aunque quedan fondos.
- 39. El Comité Ejecutivo pudiera considerar oportuno solicitar que se presenten a la 56ª Reunión informes de situación adicionales sobre estos componentes de los planes de gestión de refrigerantes.

Preparación de programas de país

40. En su 49ª Reunión, celebrada en julio de 2006, el Comité Ejecutivo aprobó la preparación de un programa de país/plan de gestión de eliminación definitiva para Guinea Ecuatorial (EQG/SEV/49/CPG/01). Al 31 de diciembre de 2007, no se había desembolsado nada de los 60 000 \$EUA aprobados para el proyecto. El PNUMA notificó que la preparación comenzaría en enero de 2008. El Comité Ejecutivo pudiera estimar oportuno solicitar que se presente a la 56ª Reunión un informe de situación sobre la preparación del programa de país/el plan de gestión para la eliminación definitiva en Guinea Ecuatorial (EQG/SEV/49/CPG/01).

Bancos de halones

41. El PNUMA está ejecutando un proyecto de bancos de halones en Haití y un estudio mundial sobre bancos de halones. El programa de eliminación sectorial "elaboración de un plan de gestión de halones en Haití" (HAI/HAL/50/TAS/10) se aprobó con la condición de que no se desembolsarían fondos hasta tanto no se presentase a la Secretaría un plan administrativo aceptable para el funcionamiento sostenible del banco de halones y de que no se volvería a solicitar más financiación para el sector de halones. Pese a que el PNUMA no ha suministrado el plan administrativo solicitado, se han desembolsado fondos. El PNUMA notificó la constitución del Equipo Nacional de Gestión de Halones y la celebración de un taller introductorio en 2007. Señaló que en 2007/2008 se dedicaría a la observancia de la reglamentación en materia de SAO para la gestión de halones, la asistencia sobre ingeniería para los servicios de bomberos, la identificación de usuarios de halones y los usos esenciales y la desmantelación de sistemas de basados en halones. El Comité Ejecutivo pudiera examinar qué medidas adoptar habida cuenta del aparente desembolso de fondos antes de presentar el plan administrativo sobre la ejecución del proyecto de bancos de halones en Haití y el estudio mundial sobre bancos de halones (HAI/HAL/50/TAS/10), basándose para ello en la cualquier otra información que facilite el PNUMA en la 55^a Reunión.

Presupuesto del programa de asistencia al cumplimiento

42. Al aprobar por primera vez el programa de asistencia al cumplimiento en su 35ª Reunión, el Comité Ejecutivo decidió que "los fondos aprobados anualmente para el CAP pero no gastados se devuelvan al Fondo Multilateral para reprogramación en la segunda reunión del Comité Ejecutivo del año siguiente a aquel en que habían sido aprobados." Según los datos que figuran en el informe sobre la marcha de las actividades del PNUMA y su informe incluido en el informe sobre saldos y disponibilidad de recursos (UNEP/OzL.Pro/ExCom/55/4), el saldo total del PNUMA para los presupuestos de asistencia al cumplimiento de los años 2006 y 2007 se eleva a 1,5 millones \$EUA. Estas cifras se muestran en el Cuadro 5.

43. Las obligaciones que se hayan contraído antes de fines de 2006 y 2007 se consideran gastos en espera de recibir las facturas correspondientes a dichas obligaciones. Ahora bien, se prevé que los fondos no comprometidos no se utilizarán. El Comité Ejecutivo pudiera considerar oportuno solicitar al Tesorero que los saldos no comprometidos se deduzcan del presupuesto del PNUMA para el programa de asistencia al cumplimiento de los años 2006 y 2007, que se eleva a 424 415 \$EUA, de conformidad con la Decisión 35/36 a) relativa a dicho programa.

Estudio por región de las aplicaciones de cuarentena y previas al envío

44. En Malasia, el PNUMA notificó que el programa de asistencia al cumplimiento realizó un estudio sobre la utilización de metilbromuro en aplicaciones de cuarentena y previas al envío, en el marco de las actividades regionales sobre este tipo de estudios y de conformidad con la decisión adoptada por los países en la reunión de la red celebrada en Nepal. El PNUMA señaló que ha recibido informes según los cuales es posible que el metilbromuro destinado para aplicaciones de cuarentena y previas al envío se utilice para otras aplicaciones en la región, lo que probablemente pondría a los países en dificultades para el cumplimiento. El estudio se realizó para facilitar la supervisión y notificación sobre el empleo del metilbromuro a nivel de país y para fomentar la adopción, en la medida de lo posible, de tecnologías alternativas sin metilbromuro. Las aplicaciones de cuarentena y previas al envío no están sujetas al control del Protocolo de Montreal. El Comité Ejecutivo pudiera estimar oportuno aconsejar al CAP sobre la utilización de sus fondos en el futuro para actividades que no están sujetas al control del Protocolo de Montreal.

Notificación incompleta

45. Esta sección trata de las dificultades relativas a la tramitación del informe sobre la marcha de las actividades del PNUMA en 2007.

Información incompleta

46. El PNUMA no respondió a diversas preguntas formuladas por la Secretaría del Fondo. Estas preguntas se referían, entre otras cosas, al desembolso de fondos de varios proyectos (BRU/REF/44/TRA/07, MLI/REF/43/PRP/13, MLI/REF/45/TAS/19, MLI/REF/45/TRA/18, SYR/REF/29/TRA/47, SYR/REF/29/TRA/49); la firma de los memorandos de entendimiento

(COI/PHA/52/TAS/13, GAB/PHA/52/TAS/20); la finalización de actividades (GAB/PHA/52/TAS/20, DRC/PHA/40/TAS/23) y la interpretación de la situación de la legislación (GUA/REF/35/TAS/23, PAN/REF/29/TAS/14). El Comité Ejecutivo pudiera considerar oportuno solicitar al PNUMA que responda en la 55ª Reunión a las preguntas formuladas por la Secretaría del Fondo.

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INTRODUCTION

- 1. This document, as submitted for consideration to the 55th meeting of the Executive Committee of the Multilateral Fund for the Implementation of the Montreal Protocol, represents a Progress and Financial Report on the Montreal Protocol related operations of the United Nations Environment Programme during the year 2007.
- 2. In accordance with the UNEP's Business Plan 2007-2009 endorsed by the 51st meeting of the Executive Committee, the objectives of UNEP's activities in 2007 were to:
 - ➤ To continue strengthening capacity of National Ozone Units and relevant institutions through training and knowledge transfer;
 - ➤ To leverage and improve existing national/regional/sub-regional institutional and legislative frameworks and support the development of new policies and legal instruments to enable the implementation of ODS phase-out strategies;
 - ➤ To raise the political profile of the Montreal Protocol and thereby increase high-level support for its implementation;
 - ➤ To improve the access of client countries to specific expertise and knowledge; and to disseminate and publicize good practices, innovative approaches and experiences in phase-out of controlled substances;
 - ➤ To promote and enhance the inter-regional and intra-region information exchange and cooperation in the implementation of the Montreal Protocol;
 - > To enhance direct country-to-country assistance, especially to those countries facing immediate and long-term compliance challenges;
 - ➤ To support the development of regional/sub-regional approaches to tackling problems of common concern;
 - > To support regional/sub-regional initiatives to combat illegal trade in ODS;
 - ➤ To pursue universal ratification of the Vienna Convention, the Montreal Protocol and its Amendments;
 - To enhance public awareness of the impact of the ozone layer depletion on human health and the environment and encourage civil society action;
 - ➤ To encourage countries that have recently ratified the Vienna Convention, the Montreal Protocol and its Amendments to put in place and implement appropriate national policies, strategies and programmes to control and reduce the use of ODS in refrigeration and air-conditioning servicing, agricultural, fire-fighting and other relevant sectors;

- ➤ To enhance working arrangement with other Implementing Agencies thereby allowing for the provision of a coordinated and holistic service to client countries.
- 3. The following means were used in 2007 to achieve the above objectives:
 - > Regional Networking of National Ozone Officers;
 - > Information Clearing House;
 - Compliance services as part of the Compliance Assistance Programme (CAP);
 - > Implementation of non-investment projects for individual countries/regions.
- 4. In 2007 the CAP in cooperation with the other Implementing and Bilateral Agencies provided significant advisory and project implementation support to Article 5 countries that resulted in an overall high note of compliance with the Montreal Protocol and its Amendments by those countries.

I. PROJECT APPROVALS AND EXPENDITURES

A. ANNUAL SUMMARY DATA

- 5. From its inception in June 1991 until the end of December 2007, the Executive Committee of the Multilateral Fund has approved 1,128 projects for implementation by UNEP. The total funding approved for UNEP during the same period was US\$ 131,774,502, representing about 6.7% of the total funding allocations approved by the Multilateral Fund for the four Implementing Agencies.
- 6. During 2007, the Executive Committee approved 80¹ projects for UNEP to implement. The total value of UNEP's approvals in 2007 was US\$ 15.1 million plus programme support costs of US\$ 1.1 million. *Annex 1: Annual Summary* provides details.

B. INTEREST

7. The interest accrued from 1991-2007 was US\$ 7,087,532 as follows:

C. SUMMARY DATA BY TYPE

8. Of the 1,121 projects approved for UNEP from June 1991 until December 2007², 378 are time-sensitive Institutional Strengthening (IS) projects and 743 are objective-sensitive activities, including 361 technical assistance projects (TAS), 195 training projects (TRA), 94 Country Programmes (CPG) and 93 project preparations (PRP), including Refrigerant Management Plan and Terminal Phase-out Management Plan preparation.

- 9. The above data include 80 projects that the Executive Committee approved in 2007 to be implemented by UNEP. Of those, 41 are time-sensitive IS projects and 39 are objective-sensitive activities comprising 35 technical assistance projects and 4 project preparations.
- 10. The overall cumulative completion ratio is 75% (the ratio of the previous year was 72%). The cumulative completion rate by project type is 99% for CP preparations, 68% for project preparations, 72% for technical assistance projects, 85% for training projects and 68% for IS projects. For details of all completion ratios, please see *Annex 1: Summary Data by Projects Type*.

II. PROJECT COMPLETIONS SINCE LAST REPORT

A. ODP PHASED OUT SINCE LAST REPORT

11. UNEP only implements non-investment projects (i.e. capacity building and technical assistance). Due to the nature of these capacity-building projects, the directly associated ODP phase out is either zero or small according to the approved projects. The cumulative ODP phase-out achieved as a result of all completed UNEP projects to date is 260.8 ODP tonnes.

B. NON-INVESTMENT PROJECT COMPLETIONS SINCE LAST REPORT

- 12. During 2007, UNEP completed 85 projects as follows:
 - ➤ Institutional strengthening projects 41;
 - > Training projects 13;
 - ➤ Technical assistance projects 16;
 - > Project preparation 15.
- 13. The completion of projects by region was as follows:
 - > Africa 41 projects;
 - ➤ Asia and Pacific 19 projects;
 - Latin America and the Caribbean -18 projects;
 - ➤ Europe and Central Asia 2 projects;
 - ➤ West Asia 3 projects;
 - ➤ Global 2 projects.

III. GLOBAL AND REGIONAL ACTIVITY HIGHLIGHTS

A. GLOBAL ACTIVITIES

- 14. UNEP implemented the Montreal Protocol activities in Article 5 countries in 2007 through the Compliance Assistance Programme. The CAP carried out projects approved by the Executive Committee and compliance services funded from the CAP budget.
- 15. The CAP budget for the year 2007 was approved by the 50th meeting of the Executive Committee at the amount of US\$ 8,003,000 plus programme support costs.
- 16. The 2007 CAP budget was used for salaries of 40 1/2 CAP staff members, more than 533 country-specific compliance services, operation of 9 Regional/Sub-regional Networks and the Information Clearing House as described below as well as in Annex II *Country-by-country CAP services* and Annex VIII *Report on expenditures under the CAP budget for 2007*. In addition, UNEP supported the operation of the Network of South-East Asia and the Pacific funded by the Government of Sweden.

Staffing of the CAP

17. In 2007 the composition of the CAP was as follows:

- ➤ CAP Paris team: 7 full-time Professional staff, 1 half-time Professional and 7 General Service staff;
- ➤ CAP Regional Network for Europe and Central Asia: 1 professional and 1 general service staff coordinating the Regional Ozone Network for Europe & Central Asia;
- ➤ CAP Regional Office for Africa team: 5 Professional staff and 2 General Service staff:
- ➤ CAP Regional Office for Asia and Pacific team: 4 Professional staff and 2 General Service staff. This team also includes 1 Professional staff member funded through a bilateral contribution from the Government of Sweden;
- ➤ CAP Regional Office for West Asia team: 3 Professional staff and 2 General Service staff;
- ➤ CAP Regional Office for Latin America and the Caribbean team: 4 Professional staff and 2 General Service staff.

CAP Coordination Team in Paris

18. The CAP staff in Paris performed the following tasks in 2007:

- ➤ Overall management of the Compliance Assistance Programme;
- ➤ Coordination of the development, review and submission of annual Business Plans and Work Programmes;
- > Development, submission, and monitoring of the overall programme budget;
- ➤ Coordination of training/capacity building activities, ensuring consistent methodologies;
- ➤ Development, management and reporting on the Information Clearing house function as part of UNEP's mandate under Article 11 of the Montreal Protocol;
- > Coordination of the relationships with other Implementing Agencies and bilateral partners;
- ➤ Provision of main link to the Executive Committee;

- ➤ Coordination and/or preparation of reports and information for submission to the Meeting of the Parties to the Montreal Protocol, meetings of the Open-Ended Working Group and the Implementation Committee as required;
- ➤ Monitoring of all projects and activities of the programme, including those in the regions;
- ➤ Maintenance of the OzonAction Management Information System (oMIS) as a main monitoring tool of the programme;
- ➤ Development of regular CAP Management Briefs;
- Financial and progress reporting to the Executive Committee on all projects and activities of the programme, including those implemented in the regions;
- ➤ Identification and facilitation of the exchange of information, ideas, practices, and outputs between the Regional CAP teams.

19. During 2007, UNEP submitted:

- ➤ UNEP's Business Plan 2007-2009 to the 51st meeting of the Executive Committee;
- ➤ Progress and Financial Report 2006 to the 52nd meeting of the Executive Committee:
- ➤ CAP budget for 2008 and Work Programme for 2008 to the 53rd meeting of the Executive Committee;
- ➤ Three Work Programme Amendments to its 2007 Work Programme;

Monitoring of the CAP operation

- 20. The monitoring of implementation of UNEP's projects funded by the Multilateral Fund was performed using the programme-wide management information system (oMIS). The system is web-based and made accessible to all regional CAP staff. In oMIS each approved project is assigned to a professional staff member (Activity Leader), who is to regularly report on achieved milestones of the project through inputting the relevant information electronically in the system. oMIS helped improve the quality of monitoring and reporting of all projects under the CAP.
- 21. In addition to oMIS, one CAP Management Brief was prepared to review and assess the performance of the CAP and highlight areas requiring priority attention. CAP Management Brief was circulated to the CAP regional teams and discussed in detail during regular tele- and videoconferences.

Information Clearing House and public awareness activities

22. Throughout 2007, UNEP provided an Information Clearinghouse service to National Ozone Units and other key stakeholders in Article 5 countries. The emphasis of this service was on delivering or supporting information, communication and education (ICE) services that create action-oriented awareness to support national compliance objectives related to the Montreal Protocol. UNEP delivered this service within the framework of the Communication Strategy for Global Compliance with the Montreal Protocol developed by UNEP, and wherever possible, in support of the Information Strategy of the Multilateral Fund.

- 23. The Clearinghouse helped promote the overall visibility of the Montreal Protocol and Multilateral Fund implementation achievements through its core services (OzonAction Newsletter, websites and outreach activities) and it played a major supporting role for national and regional celebrations of the International Day for the Preservation of the Ozone Layer.
- 24. The Clearinghouse services were performed by the Paris-based Information Management Team, comprising 2 Professional and 2 General Service staff members. Their work was conducted in close cooperation with the other CAP teams (particularly the Regional Network Coordinators) as well as with UNEP's Division of Communication and Public Information (DCPI).

Core Clearinghouse Services

- 25. Assisting National Ozone Units with Ozone Day celebrations. In 2007, the Information Clearinghouse supported national, regional and international efforts to celebrate the International Ozone Day and the 20th Anniversary of the Montreal Protocol through the provision of attractive awareness materials that were easily adapted by NOUs for national use. The Information Clearinghouse devoted a substantial portion of its overall staff resources to the Ozone Day support. The services provided to NOUs included:
- Public Service Announcements (PSAs), two 30-second videos ("The drummer" and "A kid's dream") that raise awareness of the good work that has been done during the last twenty years by the international community with regard to the ozone layer protection and reveal the sense of urgency for the next years to continue working on these endeavours. Designed for broadcast on international, regional and national television channels, and available in NTSC and PAL, as well as HD, in Arabic, Chinese, English, Finnish, French, Portuguese, Russian and Spanish. Distributed to NOUs in August 2007 and promoted to international and national television channels.
- <u>Vital Ozone Layer Graphics</u> publication and web site that informs and inspires
 journalists to cover the ozone story by providing overview of key issues and ready-touse graphics that can be incorporated directly into articles.
- Ozone Day web page. The Clearinghouse developed, outreached and maintained a web page devoted to the International Ozone Day, which included information on national celebrations in various countries. In addition to supporting national celebrations, the Clearinghouse also participated in several global celebrations e.g. organizing radio programmes for Arabic-speaking countries that reached millions of listeners. See www.unep.fr/ozonaction/events/ozoneday.
- Ozzy Ozone Snakes and Ladders Board Game, a colorful game in a form of snakes and ladders that raises the awareness of children about ozone depletion, Montreal Protocol and related issues, and supports National Ozone Units by providing an information tool to be used in their national ozone awareness campaigns. Available in English, French and Spanish. The game is downloadable from the OzonAction website and can be printed. Distributed to NOUs in August 2007 and launched (with a life-size version of the game) on 16 September 2007 at MOP-19. The online version can be played at www.unep.fr/ozonaction/information/ozzygame/play-game.html

- Ozzy Goes Polar. The third issue of the children's illustrated booklet designed to increase awareness about ozone depletion, climate change and persistent organic pollutants. In English, French and Spanish. Launched on World Environment Day 2007 in Tromso, Norway and distributed to NOUs in August 2007.
- Encouraged media coverage of 20th Anniversary. In cooperation with UNEP Division of Communication and Public Information, encouraged journalists, including Arabic-language Radio Dualiya and others, to cover the ozone story and MOP-19.
- Ozzy Ozone Website. A new module, "Ozzy's School", was added to the existing site to provide online resources for children linked to the OzonAction Education Pack, in English and French. The site was launched on 21 September.
- Ozzy Ozone Network, a global network database from different regions including NOUs, NGOs and schools was created to disseminate the activities of the Ozzy Ozone campaign including information updates.
- 26. Supporting regional awareness activities. The Clearinghouse continued to assist the Regional CAP teams with the conceptualization, review, production and outreach of the video, audio, media and published materials produced in all regions as part of the Regional Awareness facility. Electronic versions of the final awareness products were outreached through the OzonAction web site and the OzonAction newsletter. Through the OzonAction website, the Clearinghouse also shared awareness materials, videos, music and publications produced by NOUs/Article 5 countries, in different languages. The Information Management Team participated in regional or national workshops related to information, communication and education issues. Examples of these workshops include the Asia Pacific Media Workshop on Ozone and Linkages with Climate Change (Singapore) to build the capacity of media from 10 Asia Pacific countries.
- 27. Giving a voice to the Montreal Protocol community through the OzonAction Newsletter. The Clearinghouse provided NOUs and others with the key information about major ozone protection developments in industry, governments, NGOs, and international organisations by producing *Celebrate the Montreal Protocol*, a special double issue of the OzonAction Newsletter devoted to the 20th Anniversary of the Protocol. Articles authored by key figures in the global ozone protection community reflect on the achievements and future challenges of this multilateral environmental agreement. It was launched and distributed at MOP-19. This hardcopy newsletter was produced in Arabic, Chinese, English, French, Russian and Spanish. The production of the Chinese version was done in cooperation with the NOU of China. The newsletter is available in PDF at www.unep.fr/ozonaction/news/oan.htm.
- 28. Disseminating information to support capacity building. The Clearinghouse reproduced and provided training manuals, guidelines and other information tools that (a) facilitated capacity building and training of new Ozone Officers and their assistants to ensure their quick understanding of Montreal Protocol requirements (b) serviced the national and regional workshops organized by the Regional CAP teams. In 2007, the Clearinghouse dispatched over 19,000 hardcopy documents in response to requests received from individuals, distribution to workshop participants, and dissemination during outreach events.

- 29. Collecting and sharing ozone protection publications through the Multi-media Collection: The Clearinghouse obtained, processed and catalogued 105 new items sourced from around the world. OzonAction maintains the largest collection of ozone protection documents, videos, audio tracks, and awareness materials which reflects the rich knowledge of the global Montreal Protocol community. http://www.unep.fr/ozonaction/information/mmc/main.asp
- 30. Keeping key members of the Montreal Protocol community up-to-date on breaking news through E-news services: The Clearinghouse provided the latest ozone protection news to Ozone Officers and other stakeholders via "direct delivery" email news services, which included 24 issues of OzoNews; 6 issues of Regular Update on Methyl Bromide Alternatives (RUMBA); 6 issues of Climate and Ozone Update (CLIO3).
- 31. Providing ozone-related web services to a global audience. Through the OzonAction web site (www.unep.fr/ozonaction), the Clearinghouse provided targeted information to 156,807 unique visitors who used the site in 2007, amounting to more than 4,2 million hits. These users downloaded more than 670,000 PDF documents. If one assumes that someone would not spend their time downloading a PDF file (often large) without reading some/all of it, then this figure is a good proxy for how many people actually read some or part of the documents provided by OzonAction. The Clearinghouse helped improve access to information on ozone protection by launching the HCFC Help Centre in November 2007.
- 32. Conducting strategic outreach at key international events. With an aim to promoting synergies and increasing communication and cooperation between the different MEA communities, the Clearinghouse distributed awareness materials about the Montreal Protocol and the Basel, Rotterdam and Stockholm Conventions at the MOP-19. The Clearinghouse also raised the awareness of children from more than 100 countries about ozone depletion causes and consequences. This was achieved through sessions/activities at the Preparatory African Conference for the Sixth UNEP International Children's Conference on the Environment (ICC) held in Yaounde, Cameroon 27-31 July 2007, the World Environmental Education Congress held in Durban, South Africa, 30 June-5 July 2007 and the 4th International Conference on Environmental Education, Admedabad, India, 24-28 November 2007.

Special initiatives in 2007

- 33. Mobilising co-financing for ICE services produced under the Multilateral Fund. In 2007, as in previous years, the Information Clearinghouse continued to seek co-financing (both direct and in-kind contributions) by encouraging countries, organisations and companies to translate and adapt existing information, communication and education materials produced under the Multilateral Fund into national languages at their own cost.
- 34. The Clearinghouse promoted two PSAs produced for the International Ozone Day and according to available information the PSAs were broadcasted 372 times through 11 international television channels.

This illustrates the ability of such information products to mobilise considerable external financial resources to support Multilateral Fund objectives.

- 35. Refrigeration sector publications. Contributing to the visibility of the Montreal Protocol at a high-level by cooperating with the International Institute of Refrigeration to develop a special international booklet "Refrigeration Drives Sustainable Development" and a special issues of IIR's newsletter on the 20th Anniversary. This activity only used CAP staff time and was funded/managed by IIR.
- 36. Olympic Games. Continued to provide information and guidance to the Beijing Organising Committee for the Games of the XXIX Olympiad (BOCOG) to further include the Montreal Protocol and ozone protection issue into the agenda of the 2008 Beijing Olympic Games through cooperation. This is being done within the framework of the UNEP-BOCOG Memorandum of Understanding, for which OzonAction Programme helped to introduce the ozone protection issue. This only involves CAP staff time.

Capacity building activities

- 37. The Capacity Building Team (CBT), being part of the CAP Coordination team located in Paris, consists of 2 Professional and 2 General Service staff members funded by the Multilateral Fund as well as one Professional staff member funded through a bilateral project. The following highlights the achievements of the Capacity Building Team in 2007.
- 38. Green Customs Initiative (GCI). This initiative was developed by UNEP (DTIE OzonAction and Chemicals and Division of Environmental Law on Conventions) in close collaboration with Secretariats of participating Multilateral Environmental Agreements (Stockholm Convention, Rotterdam Convention, Montreal Protocol, Basel Convention, CITES and Convention on Biological Diversity) as well as the World Customs Organization, Interpol and the Organisation for Prohibition of Chemical Weapons (OPCW). The GCI is a partnership of international organisations and Secretariats that cooperates to enhance the capacity of customs and other relevant border enforcement personnel to deal with environmentally-sensitive items covered by the respective traderelated agreements represented by the Partners. It offers an integrated approach for providing information, training and awareness-raising to facilitate legal trade in such commodities and prevent their illegal trade.
- 39. In 2007 there were six Green Customs Initiative workshops covering the Asia-pacific, Africa and west-Asia regions. These workshops involving participation of customs and other boarder control officers from 26 countries. Two of these Green Customs Initiative workshops were national workshops, held in Kenya and Bahrain respectively. The remaining four workshops were regional workshops: Senegal (in which eight countries participated), Mauritius (in which five countries participated), China: (in which six countries participated), Thailand (in which six countries participated). IN addition to

these workshops the Green Customs Initiative was presented at WCO RILO (Regional Intelligence Liaison Office) National Contact Points meetings for Eastern and Central Europe, and Western Europe. The Initiative was also presented at a number of regional customs enforcement meetings and the workshop on 'The Growth and Control of International Environmental Crime' held in Chatham House, London in December 2007. In 2007 a Green Customs 'flyer' was produced. This information leaflet provides a simple and concise introduction to the Initiative. The Green Customs Guide to Multilateral Environmental Agreements was finalised incorporating new and additional material provided by the Partner organisations.

- 40. The funding for GCI, including salary of a project coordinator, was provided by the Governments of Norway, Finland and the Czech Republic, UNEP and OPCW. The Multilateral Fund also provided funding in 2007 (although not with a salary component).
- 41. Global bidding exercise. CBT conducted a Global bidding exercise for refrigeration and customs training equipment in 2007. This annual exercise facilitates the administrative process for the regional CAP teams in purchasing and delivering training equipment to Article 5 countries, thus ensuring the smooth conduct of training workshops.
- 42. Customs Training Manual update. CBT continued working on the update of the training manual in 2007. The new edition was initially planned for presentation to the 52nd Executive Committee Meeting but was eventually postponed as UNEP decided to have the draft text reviewed and edited by a professional editor to harmonize the style and form and ensure better overall quality (substantial and technical review was done earlier by expert reviewers). The manual is now in the production phase and should be ready for dissemination by May-June 2008. It will be also presented to the 55th Executive Committee Meeting.

Halon management activities

- 43. In response to the request of the Executive Committee at its 44th meeting to fully utilize the capacity of CAP Halon Officer, located in West Asia, UNEP undertook to extend services of the Officer to all regions.
- 44. Specifically, the following services were provided in 2007:
 - ➤ Technical support to the NOU of Armenia and conducted a one day national roundtable discussion on halon management with the stakeholders in the country.
 - > Technical support to the NOU of Turkmenistan and conducted a one day national roundtable discussion on halon management with the stakeholders in the country
 - ➤ Technical support to the NOU of Haiti and conducted a one day national roundtable discussion on halon management with the stakeholders in the country.
 - > Technical support and expert input to the National Halon Management Workshop in Kuwait, which was held in collaboration with Kuwait NOU and UNIDO
 - ➤ Technical support to the Sri Lanka NOU, in facilitating and conducting the first National Halon Management Workshop.

Frechnical support, as part of the ROWA CAP team and UNIDO, to the NOU of Saudi Arabia for the preparation of their halon management project.

B. REGIONAL ACTIVITIES

- 45. In 2007 UNEP facilitated the operation of 10 Regional/Sub-regional Networks involving 148 members from developing countries and countries with economies in transition as well as 14 developed countries and the European Commission. These included:
 - Latin America-South (10 countries, with participation of USA and Canada);
 - Latin America-Central (10 countries, with participation of USA and Canada);
 - ➤ Caribbean (13 countries, with participation of USA and Canada);
 - English-speaking Africa (26 countries, with participation of Germany);
 - ➤ French-speaking Africa (27 countries, with participation of France and Switzerland);
 - ➤ West Asia (12 countries, with participation of France and Germany);
 - South Asia (11 countries, with participation of United Kingdom and Japan);
 - Southeast Asia and the Pacific (11 countries, with participation of Australia, New Zealand and Sweden. This Network is funded by the Government of Sweden);
 - ➤ Pacific Island Countries (14 countries, with participation of Australia, New Zealand and Sweden. This Network is funded through an individual project);
 - ➤ Europe and Central Asia (12 Article 5 countries, with participation of Austria, Czech Republic, Hungary, Romania, Slovak Republic, Sweden and the European Commission as well as the involvement of WCO's Regional Intelligence Liaison Offices, Environmental Investigation Agency and International Institute of Refrigeration).
- 46. Major activities and achievements of the Regional Networks and the regional CAP teams are highlighted below. The completed list of services provided to Article 5 countries in 2007 is contained in Annex II.

<u>Africa</u>

- 47. The CAP team in Africa focused its work in 2007 on ensuring that most countries in the region show a positive trend in achieving a 100% phase out of substances in Annexes A/I, A/II, B/I and B/II by 1st January 2010.
- 48. The focus of the Africa CAP team in 2007 was on the preparation of terminal phase out management plans (TPMP) for a large number of African countries where UNEP has been requested by the governments to be the lead agency. This resulted in submission to the Executive Committee of 18 TPMP proposals during the year 2007 out of which 15 were approved with UNEP as lead agency. The TPMP preparation process was a good opportunity to strengthen the cooperation between UNEP and the other implementing agencies (mostly UNDP) through joint missions to most countries.

- 49. The ROA CAP team conducted seven regional and sub-regional meetings during the year 2007, five of which were thematic meetings on TPMP preparation. The CAP team facilitated national training workshops for refrigeration technicians, customs officers, environmental inspectors and other import control officers, as well as stakeholders' consultative meetings on MeBr phase in a number of African countries during the year 2007(including MeBr workshops in Sierra Leone and Nigeria).
- 50. The CAP team worked with sub-regional groups (SACU, COMESA, CEMAC, UEMOA, RILOs and WCO Regional Capacity Building Centre for East and Southern Africa) with a view to enhancing their roles in the control of trade in ODS. This cooperation combined with the customs training at national level resulted in strengthening of the participation of custom officers in monitoring and prevention of illegal ODS trade in the region. For instance the CAP team facilitated a national Green Customs in Kenya, fully funded by the WCO Regional Capacity Building Centre for Eastern and Southern Africa.
- 51. In collaboration with UNEP's DELC division, CAP team organized two sub-regional Green Customs Initiative Workshops for French-speaking West African Countries and Indian Ocean Islands. The need for such meetings was expressed by countries in both region as a response to the increase in dumping of unwanted equipment and substances. The CAP team promoted cooperation with other implementing agencies and region in enhancing joint implementation of Methyl Bromide phase out activities at national and regional levels. In particular, the CAP team undertook joint project implementations with UNIDO in providing technical and policy assistance to sustain methyl bromide phase-out in Zimbabwe. The team collaborated with ROWA region in implementing Methyl Bromide Phase-out Programme.
- 52. By the end of the year 2007, only Five African Countries had not reported their article 7 data for the year 2006 or 2005. Some of these delays were due to wish of some NOU not to create discrepancies between their reported data and the information included in their TPMP. The concerned countries were making efforts to comply with their reporting requirement by the 1st quarter of 2008. One of the results of the TPMP preparation process was a greater accuracy on the countries consumption figures.
- 53. The CAP team also assisted countries that have not yet established licensing and quota systems to speed up the approval process. As a result three (3) countries (Cap Verde, Kenya, Tanzania) approved their ODS licensing and Quota Systems and the few remaining countries have submitted their ODS Regulations for approval
- 54. Several countries were assisted in preparing ratification documents for the Amendments to the Protocol. Five African countries have ratified all pending amendments to the Montreal protocol during the year 2007. Some of them had the process approved by countries parliaments awaiting notification of the depositary.
- 55. The team with the support of the regional information team of UNEP regional Office for Africa implemented a set of activities on the implementation Montreal protocol implementation in the Africa region. This included organization of a sub-regional journalist workshop on the Montreal Protocol in French-speaking West Africa. The

workshop involved journalist from 11 countries in the region members of the African Environmental Journalist Network. The CAP and the Information team also set up a new webpage on the Montreal protocol within the UNEP/ROA official website. Information on this website is regularly updated by material from the CAP including facts sheets on methyl bromide alternatives for different uses.

- 56. The CAP Team continued receiving requests from countries in the region seeking support for surveys on HCFC consumption and preparation of HCFC management plans. These request will be addressed in the CAP 2008 activities.
- 57. The CAP team provided continuous support to many National Ozone Units for specific country needs as well as the implementation of their Institutional Strengthening projects. Most of this support was done through bilateral discussion during network meetings, MOP, ImpCom, ExCom, and other regional forums as well as targeted country visits. A total of 23 countries were visited by the CAP staff in 2007 most of which were combined with TPMP preparation visits.

Asia and Pacific

- 58. During the past five years, compliance continued to be the main theme for the ROAP CAP team. UNEP organized regular network meetings and thematic meetings to address critical issues facing the countries in meeting Montreal Protocol compliance targets, in particular, the 50% and 85% reduction in CFC consumption in 2005 and 2007. Some of the main activities undertaken by UNEP ROAP CAP team in 2007 are given below.
- 59. Compliance assistance. Assistance was provided to the following countries for compliance with their action plans: Fiji Plan of Action for methyl bromide (Decision XVII/33), Iran compliance with CTC (Decision XIX/27), Maldives Plan of Action for CFC (Decision XVI/37), Nepal Plan of Action for CFC (Decision XVI/27), Pakistan Plan of Action for halon (Decision XVI/29), Pakistan Plan of Action for CTC (Decision XVIII/31).
- 60. The action plans of the countries are discussed in detail along with implementing agencies, bilateral partners, Ozone Secretariat and Multilateral Fund Secretariat during the Informal Advisory Group (IAG) meetings held in the margins of the network meetings. All these countries are progressing in a systematic manner in achieving their commitments under their respective plans and have achieved their targets in the year 2007. Details of specific steps relating to compliance are given in Annex 3 to this document.
- 61. In addition to this, assistance was provided to Bangladesh for addressing specific queries relating to their CFC consumption in RAC and MDI applications in the 38th and 39th meetings of the implementation committee. Assistance was also provided to India during the Core Group meetings in addressing compliance challenges faced by them in the RAC sector.
- 62. Network meetings and other regional consultations. The following two joint network meetings for South Asia and SEAP countries were conducted in the year 2007.

During both the meetings, awareness on 20th Anniversary of Montreal Protocol through print and electronic media were undertaken to ensure greater outreach of Ozone Layer protection message.

- 63. In the Bali Network Meeting held after the 19th Meeting of Parties advanced phase-out schedules for HCFC production and consumption were agreed to. In view of this, the meeting had focused discussions relating to HCFC phase-out challenges. The outcome of these discussions were communicated to the Executive Committee through China, which was a member of the Executive Committee, as inputs from the countries for consultations on HCFC phaseout policies in the 53rd Meeting of the Executive Committee. In addition, consultations focusing on Methyl Bromide phaseout especially relating to adoption of MB free alternatives in QPS applications and strengthening monitoring of Methyl Bromide use for QPS applications were held during the Bali Network meeting.
- 64. In addition to the above, during the Bali Network Meeting, Government of Indonesia, in a joint UNDP-UNEP event, declared its ban on import of virgin CFCs and Methyl Bromide for non-QPS applications from 1 January 2008.
- 65. Regional Enforcement Network (REN) Meeting. Back to back with the joint network meeting held in Bali in November 2007, the first Regional Enforcement Network (REN) meeting for Asia and the Pacific region was held. This is a continuation of the former "Customs Initiative, bilateral project funded by Sida (Sweden). This meeting resulted in greater understanding of chemical management issues relating to Montreal Protocol and Rotterdam, Basel & Stockholm conventions and created a platform for regional actions for compliance.
- 66. Mongolia meeting on Public-Private partnership. UNEP CAP team in Bangkok organised a meeting in Mongolia on 28 and 29 June 2007 on Public-Private partnership for addressing environmental crime specifically relating to ODS. 35 participants from Government and industry of China, India, Republic of Korea, Russia, Nepal, Indonesia, Singapore, Thailand, US, EC as well as RILO A/P, EIA and Dupont attended in this 2-day workshop. A declaration, namely "Ulaan Baatar Declaration of Public-Private Partnership on Addressing Environmental Crime" was adopted during this meeting.
- 67. SEAP-South Asia Ozone-Customs Officer Network. The SEAP and South Asia Ozone –Customs Officers (Customs Initiative) Network, with bilateral support from Sweden to strengthen cooperation between customs and ozone officers at the regional and national levels, has targeted growing problems of illegal trade of ODS in the region. Major achievements from this bilateral project in 2007 include:
- (a) development and sharing of information sheet on official importers and exporters in each country to ensure compliance with trade regulations on ODS;

- (b) voluntary adoption of prior informed consent procedure ("voluntary iPIC") to control the export of CFCs and other ODSs to countries in the region with Singapore taking a leading example;
- (c) participation of countries in the region in Project Skyhole Patching which enables tracking consignments relating to illegal ODS trade. To date, 20 customs and environmental authorities from 18 countries joined the operation, including Australia, Bangladesh, Bhutan, Brunei Darussalam, Cambodia, China, Fiji, India, Japan, Republic of Korea, the Maldives, Mongolia, New Zealand, the Philippines, Samoa, Sri Lanka, Thailand, and Viet Nam.
- (d) sharing of information on ODS trade that led to bilateral cooperation to address discrepancy between importing and exporting countries.
- 68. The NOUs of countries in the region agreed on an Informal Prior Informed Consent mechanism for ODS trade. When issuing import/export licenses, the NOUs would informally consult the list of registered importers/exporters and inform the corresponding NOU. The NOUs of exporting countries like China, Republic of Korea and India would ensure that the export licenses would not be issued in excess of the limits set in the phase out plans of the importing countries. The exporting company would also try to report the destination countries for the bulk ODS export while applying for the license. India, Republic of Korea and China have agreed to send a copy of export license to the NOU of the importing country for information. Singapore, as the main transit hub in the region, has implemented the mechanism in 2006 through informal consent with the NOU of the importing countries to verify the official list of CFC importers.
- 69. Desk study on trans-boundary movement of ODS. ROAP CAP continued to follow-up on the Desk Study on trans-boundary movement of ODS through data analysis with countries, also referring to the Article 7 data reports provided by NOUs to the Ozone Secretariat, and EIA's analysis of customs data available in the public domain like Global Trade Atlas and United Nations Commodity Trade Database. UNEP ROAP is encouraging these countries to check companies involved, licenses granted, quantities and codes used so that data discrepancies could be detected and a possible investigation could be initiated. Ulaan Bataar declaration mentioned earlier is also expected to assist in controlling illegal trade of ODS through stringent monitoring with better involvement of industry.
- 70. Regional partners' forum on combating environmental crime: 3rd meeting on 2nd February 2007 and fourth meeting on 14 August 2007. Four partners, UNODC, UNEP, TRAFFIC and Wildlife Alliance agreed to develop a joint Programme "Regional Coordination and Cooperation in the Fight against Trans-national Crime in Southeast Asia (Phase I)", which will aim at including control of illegal trade of ODS into the Border Liaison Offices of countries in the Mekong sub-region.
- 71. Green Customs Initiative in the Asia-Pacific. Two meetings were held relating to this project in the year 2007. Train-the-trainer, Shanghai was held in May 2007. The participants for this GCI workshop included WCO Regional Training Centers AKMAL, SCC, NACEN, Oceania Customs Organisation (PIC), and National Customs Training

Institutes of Thailand, Sri Lanka, Philippines and Pakistan. The second Green Customs Workshop for Greater Mekong Sub-region was held in Bangkok between 5-7 September 2007. This included participation from Cambodia, China, Laos, Myanmar, Malaysia, Thailand and Vietnam.

Others

(a) MTOC meeting in April 2007

72. At the invitation of the MTOC, regional network coordinator for Asia and the Pacific participated in their annual meeting in March 2007. During this meeting, he shared his views on challenges faced by the countries in CFC MDI phase-out including indicative estimates of pharma grade CFCs that would be needed by the countries for manufacturing MDIs from 2007 till complete phase-out.

Awareness related

- 73. The main awareness initiatives undertaken in the year 2007 are highlighted below.
- 74. UNEP ROAP in cooperation with Ruamrudee International School in Bangkok, organised the first Regional Ozone Quiz during 20-21 August 2007 in Bangkok, Thailand. High school students from 16 Asia-Pacific countries were represented in the competition, which consisted of two national winners from each country, namely Afghanistan, Brunei Darussalam, Cambodia, China, Fiji, Indonesia, Iran, Lao PDR, Malaysia, Maldives, Mongolia, Nepal, Philippines, Sri Lanka, Thailand and Vietnam. Philippines, Sri Lanka and Thailand won the first, second and third position in the quiz. Philippines team was congratulated by the President of Philippines. They also participated in the 20th Anniversary celebrations of the Montreal Protocol in Montreal in September 2007.
- 75. UNEP ROAP in cooperation with JASON produced a DVD of the performance during the final celebrations of the Ozone quiz. JASON had sung the, "What's the Ozone Layer?" famous ozone song along with the 32 students wearing their national dresses from 16 countries participating in the finals of the Quiz. The viewers would be able to capture the atmosphere of the night and also enjoy the impressive performance of JASON and the students.
- 76. Media and the Ozone Layer Protection Workshop for media professionals. Workshop organized on 17-20 April in Singapore, in cooperation with the Earth Journalism Network. The theme of the workshop was Ozone and Climate Change. A two-day workshop attended by leading media professionals (journalists and editors) in Asia and the Pacific Region with around 25 journalists from 14 countries was initiated by UNEP Regional Office for Asia and the Pacific in Bangkok for helping them in understanding Ozone Layer protection related issues and undertaking activities on raising awareness on Ozone Layer protection. The Earth Journalism Network was selected by UNEP under a signed Memorandum of Understanding with Internews to organize the workshop. Workshop trainers James Fahn and Clare Arthurs assisted UNEP to develop the curriculum, assisted and led the instruction. The media were a mix of print and broadcast,

and made up mostly of mid-career or senior journalists and editors. The media were selected based on recommendations from some National Ozone Units, Earth Journalism Network and UNEP Regional Office contacts. The workshop resulted in greater awareness among media about ozone layer protection and challenges that remain and climate change linkages and also strengthened links between media and UNEP experts in ozone and climate change.

- 77. Regional translations of OzonAction Education Pack. It was translated into Hindi, Marathi, Bengali and Urdu for use in primary schools in the region.
- 78. ICE assistance for Nepal. As part of expedited assistance, special assistance was provided to the country of Nepal in 2007, which organized awareness campaigns, developed information, communication and education (ICE) strategy, developed Ozzy Ozone video dubbed into local language and organized the International Ozone day.
- 79. A video "Return of the Ozone Layer: Are We There Yet", produced by UNEP ROAP with TVE Asia Pacific as part of UNEP's work programme under the Multilateral Fund for the implementation of the Montreal Protocol, was distributed to the network countries for use in awareness. This video has received a feedback of positive outreach impact as it presents case studies of ODS phase-out actions taken by people from countries in the region.
- 80. ROAP CAP developed 3 fact sheets in 2007 on "Limitation of Application of Refrigerant Identifier", "Refrigerant Blends" and "Metered Dose Inhaler (MDI) Transition Strategy to CFC Free Alternatives: Guidance Sheet on non-investment components of transition strategy which were distributed to the network countries, implementing agencies and other partners.
- 81. South-south cooperation. As a part of South-south cooperation and expedited CAP assistance initiatives, the following major activities were undertaken during the year 2007.
- 82. Republic of Korea agreed to continue exchange of information with Pakistan on exports of CTC to Pakistan from Samsung. This facilitated achievement of compliance of Pakistan with their CTC phase-out plans as per decision XVIII/31.
- 83. Under the south south cooperation facilitated by UNEP ROAP CAP between the Republic of Korea and Afghanistan, the Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA) authorities in Afghanistan has established the refrigerant technicians training center at the AFGHAN KOREA Vocational Training Center. The National Ozone Unit has further equipped the Training Center with Recovery and Recycling machines and other equipment for training refrigeration technicians on Good Practices. Similarly, Afghan Korean Vocational Training Centers (both Korean Advisors and Afghan Instructors) have agreed to incorporate the syllabus of Good Practices in Refrigeration and Use of Recovery and Recycling Machine into training syllabus.

Capacity building programs were organised for the new Ozone officer for Bhutan was trained in India. Inputs were also provided to the Iran NOU on NPP implementation and CFC MDI phase-out project during the inter-agency meeting.

- 84. Consultations on ODS trade controls between customs and other enforcement officers of India, Nepal, Bangladesh, Bhutan and Cambodia, Thailand, Vietnam, Laos PDR on regional trade issues are ongoing.
- 85. QPS survey. A regional survey on QPS uses was completed during the year 2007 and the results were shared with the countries during the network meeting in Bali in November 2007. Specific findings from the QPS survey were communicated to the countries, particularly Republic of Korea, Thailand and Vietnam, for their information and action, wherever necessary. A manual on heat treatment alternatives is under preparation for reducing use of Methyl Bromide for ISPM-15 applications.
- 86. New Parties to Amendments to the Montreal Protocol. Cambodia ratified London, Copenhagen, Montreal and Beijing Amendments in the year 2007. Fiji ratified Montreal and Beijing Amendments in February 2007. Singapore ratified Beijing Amendment in January 2007.

Latin America and the Caribbean

- 87. In 2007, the LAC Network meetings were carried out as follow:
 - ➤ One Joint Main Meeting of the three Networks was organized in Panama city, which was attended by 30 NOUs, UNDP, UNIDO, Environment Canada and both Secretariats.
 - > Sub-regional Workshop on Methyl Bromide alternatives update for melon growers and NOOs carried out in Costa Rica, which was attended by Costa Rica, Honduras and El Salvador representatives.
 - ➤ Sub-regional Workshop for English Speaking Caribbean Network in order to prevent ODS illegal trade carried out in St Lucia, which was attended by NOO of 14 countries of the Caribbean Ozone Officers Network, Mexico, USA EPA, Caribbean Customs Enforcement Council, CARICOM and UNDP
 - ➤ Follow up Network Meeting for Latin American countries carried out in Nicaragua was attended by 17 countries.
- 88. In order to analyze and develop agreed strategies, each particular situation causing project delays, non-compliance or potential non-compliance special, bilateral meetings with Implementing Agencies and National Ozone Officers were arranged back-to-back with the Main Network Meetings.
- 89. Guided by the decisions of the MOP, special and dedicated compliance support assistance was provided to countries in actual or potential non-compliance such as Dominica, Ecuador, Guatemala, Guyana, Paraguay and Venezuela.
- 90. Together with the Central American Commission for Development (CCAD) and with assistance from the USAID, a sub-regional workshop on Green Customs Initiative approach was carried out in Honduras in last quarter of 2007. The aim of the workshop

was to create awareness and explore synergies between different MEAs with trade related provisions. The workshop was attended by customs officers from 6 countries of the Central America region as well as representatives of CCAD and UNEP. UNEP/ROLAC functioned as trainer and provided policy guidance using the Montreal Protocol approaches to MEA implementation.

- 91. The combination of the CAP team support, national efforts and work of the other Implementing and Bilateral Agencies led to the following achievements in Latin America and the Caribbean in 2007:
 - Full compliance with Article 7 data reporting requirements (33 countries reported).
 - ➤ 3 countries have established, strengthened or enforced their ODS legislation and import/export licensing systems (Barbados, Chile and Guyana).
 - ➤ Honduras ratified Montreal and Beijing Amendments
 - ➤ El Salvador and Mexico ratified the Beijing Amendment.
 - > 13 projects were technically completed.
 - ➤ Belize, Bolivia, El Salvador, Guatemala and Paraguay Institutional Strengthening Projects were renewed.
 - ➤ Honduras TPMP preparation funds were approved by the 51 ExCom.
 - First tranche of funds of TPMP respectively for Belize, El Salvador, Guyana and Paraguay were approved by Multilateral Fund.

West Asia

- 92. Since compliance with Montreal Protocol is the main driving force behind CAP's work in different themes and areas; extensive efforts were made to enable Iraq, as the biggest country remains as non-party, to join the international regime for Ozone Layer protection. Accordingly, Iraq Presidential Council issued the Law 42/2007 to join the Vienna Convention and the Montreal Protocol and its amendments. CAP/ROWA played key role in encouraging Iraq expediting the accessing process and is currently following-up with the country on the procedures to deposit the accessing documents.
- 93. Thematic considerations of West Asia member states were addressed as planned and agreed with network's members. Three thematic regional round-table meetings were organized by CAP/ROWA in 2007 addressing three important regional concerns i.e. updating the vocational refrigeration curricula, Methyl Bromide alternatives in different sectors and updating the technical agricultural curricula.
- 94. The issue of HCFC took considerable amount of 2007 work where member states requested CAP/ROWA to give it special attention particularly during and after the Montreal Adjustment negotiations. CAP/ROWA organized special consultation meeting to network members prior to the 19th MOP to discuss the adjustment proposals not mentioning the special sessions dedicated during the 2007 network meetings to address the same. After the Montreal Adjustment, CAP/ROWA managed to raise the level of attention through including the new commitments in the agenda of regional ministerial meetings i.e. GCC Environment Ministerial Meeting and the Council of Arab Ministers responsible for Environment (CAMRE) which is achieved through the distinguished

relations and trust built between CAP/ROWA and both the GCC Secretariat and the League of Arab States

- 95. Ensuring timely submission of TPMP/NPP was also another regional priority that CAP/ROWA gave attention in 2007 in order to catch up with the 2010 CFC phase-out commitments. Starting up an efficient implementation of TPMP/NPP was considered as well through ensuring the involvement of key stakeholders in the implementation process benefiting of lessons learned from the implementation of RMPs and introducing the sustainability dimension whenever feasible.
- 96. As education remains one of the key elements to ensure sustainability, CAP/ROWA worked with two reputable regional institutions, American University in Beirut (AUB) and Kuwait University (KU), to develop and introduce the first course on the management of ODS for engineering under-graduate programs. The course was offered and completed by two under-graduate groups in the two institutions during the 2007 academic semesters which was considered as pilot for testing the course. The course is planned for review and update based on outcomes of pilot phase and will be introduced to all regional relevant institutions by end of 2008.
- 97. The Green Customs Initiative (GCI) is gaining more and more attention by countries in West Asia region; CAP/ROWA has been requested to assist several member states in promoting and activating the GCI locally and sub-regionally. One national meeting on GCI was conducted in Bahrain and resulted in developing national action plan for activating the initiative in Bahrain. CAP/ROWA started to work with GCC Secretariat to prepare regional plan for the gulf region to incorporate the GCI in the regional institutional setups particularly the GCC Customs Union. The limitation of funds and not-finalizing the training manual didn't help much in expanding the GCI promotion business in other countries requested so like Kuwait, Qatar, Syria and Yemen.

Europe and Central Asia

- 98. The Regional Ozone Network in Europe and Central Asia was created in 2003 with the technical and financial support from the Multilateral Fund, the Czech Republic, Hungary and the Slovak Republic. It is now part of UNEP DTIE's OzonAction Compliance Assistance Programme and includes the following 12 member countries: Albania, Armenia, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Croatia, Georgia, Kyrgyzstan, Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, Moldova, Montenegro, Serbia, Turkey, and Turkmenistan.
- 99. The ECA network is a dynamic group of countries spread over three sub-regions (Caucasus, Balkan, Central Asia). The following Countries with Economies in Transition (CEIT countries) participate in selected network activities as part of their GEF-funded institutional strengthening projects: Azerbaijan, Kazakhstan, Tajikistan, and Uzbekistan.
- 100. Some former ECA network countries have already acceded to the European Union and thus reclassified to Article 2 countries. Candidate countries include Croatia, Macedonia (FYR) and Turkey and potential candidate countries Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Montenegro and Serbia.

- 101. The network is supported by implementing agencies (UNDP, UNIDO, World Bank) and bilateral partners (Austria, Czech Republic, European Commission, Poland, Hungary, Romania, Sweden) as well as the Multilateral Fund and Ozone Secretariats. Additional partners include the World Customs Organisation's Regional Intelligence Liaison Office (RILO CIS), the International Institute of Refrigeration (IIR) as well as industry, TEAP and

 TOC experts.
- 102. Regional networking provides a regular interactive forum for Ozone Officers from the region to exchange experiences, develop skills, and share knowledge and ideas with counterparts from both developing and developed countries in order to meet compliance, the provisions of the Montreal Protocol and its amendments. Through regular network and thematic meetings and on-going dialogues, networking helps ensure that Ozone Officers have the information, skills and contacts required for managing national ODS phase-out activities successfully. Specific compliance assistance is provided to countries with compliance issues.
- 103. The ECA network is coordinated by 2 staff based in Paris. Activities related to institutional strengthening projects and capacity building projects are implemented by the IS/CP/NCAP

 Officer also based in Paris.

ECA highlights

- 104. First regional celebration of 20th anniversary of Montreal Protocol during ECA Network meeting, Ashgabat, Turkmenistan, 26.2.-2.3.2007. H.E. Makhtumkuli Akmuradov, minister of Nature Protection of Turkmenistan opened the ECA Network meeting and the first regional celebration of the 20th anniversary of the Montreal Protocol which included mission statements of the participation organizations, discussions on the future of the protocol and full media coverage.
- 105. ECA Network brochure "solidarity & partnerships 20 years of the Montreal Protocol 4 years of the regional ozone network for Europe & Central Asia a regional contribution to the celebration of the 20th anniversary of the Montreal Protocol to highlight the contributions of all stakeholders and partners to the successful implementation of the Montreal Protocol in the ECA region and to put a face to the main actors on the stage and behind the scene. The brochure is in English/Russian and was launched during MOP 2007 and the Environment for Europe conference.
- 106. Side event of ECA Network during Environment for Europe conference, Belgrade, Serbia, 10-12 October 2007 organized in cooperation with un Economic Commission for Europe and the Government of Serbia on "20th anniversary of the Montreal Protocol: contribution to climate change mitigation and to preventing environmental crime". The side event was facilitated by Mr. Christophe Bouvier, Director of UNEP's Regional Office for Europe.

ECA programmatic assistance

- 107. Armenia received assistance to organise a stakeholder training on MeBr alternatives in the post-harvest sector to sustain compliance with their MeBr plan of action which requires zero MeBr consumption from 2007.
- 108. Montenegro received assistance to initiate the data collection required for the preparation of the Country Programme and the establishment of consumption baselines. The Country Programme preparation and Institutional Strengthening projects have been submitted by UNIDO for consideration by the 51th meeting of the Executive Committee.
- 109. Albania received assistance to facilitate the implementation of their National Phaseout Plan and to enforce their border controls and import / export licensing system.
- 110. Bosnia & Herzegovina received assistance to organise stakeholder consultations in order to sustain compliance with the CFC, MeBr and TCA plans of action which require a reduction of the CFC consumption to 3.0 ODP tons in 2007 and zero in 2008, a zero TCA consumption from 2006 and a zero MeBr consumption from 2007.
- 111. Kyrgyzstan received assistance to develop a software programme to facilitate the exchange of information related to licensing systems and trade in ODS between Customs and Ozone Officers in Central Asian countries.
- 112. Turkmenistan received assistance to organise stakeholder training on MeBr alternatives in the post-harvest sector. The country detected MeBr consumption in 2006 and requested the revision of the MeBr baseline. Background documents for the training will be prepared in Turkmen language.

ECA country-to-country assistance

- 113. Montenegro received assistance for initial data collection and kick-start of the Country Programme preparation, Podgorica, Montenegro, 26-29 Juni 2007 (NOU Macedonia FYR, NOU Montenegro, NOU Serbia, UNIDO, UNEP)
- 114. Armenia received assistance for a national halon stakeholder consultation with support from the UNEP CAP Halon Officer, Yerevan, Armenia, 4-6 July 2007 (UNEP CAP Halon Officer)
- 115. Turkmenistan received assistance for a national halon stakeholder consultion with support from the UNEP CAP Halon Officer, Ashbabat, Turkmenistan, 9-10 July 2007, (UNEP CAP Halon Officer)
- 116. Bosnia & Herzegovina and Croatia received assistance for a 2 day contact group meeting on RMP implementation and compliance issues, Zagreb, Croatia, 25-26 April 2007 (NOU Croatia, NOU Bosnia & Herzegovina)

ECA regional awareness raising

117. RILO CIS compiled a booklet on cases of illegal trade in ODS including seizures, fines at their own costs and presented the findings during the ECA network meeting.

- 118. UNEP OzonAction produced the ECA brochure "Solidarity & Partnerships" on the achievements of the ECA network with regional highlights focusing on the status of compliance and challenges for the celebrations of the 20th anniversary of the Montreal Protocol during MOP 19 in Montreal, Canada. The brochure is in English and Russian.
- 119. Croatia received financial assistance to produce the Croatian language version of UNEP's education pack.
- 120. Kyrgyzstan received financial assistance to produce a awareness raising video in Russian language (with English sub-titles) based on Kyrgyzstan's experience in the phase-out of ODS.
- 121. Turkmenistan received financial assistance to adapt Kyrgyzstan's handbook for teachers for use in Turkmenistan.
- 122. Kyrgyzstan received financial assistance to produce a Ozone Play of 20 minutes for the celebrations of the 20th anniversary of the Montreal Protocol. The Play has been recorded on CD-ROM with English sub-titles.
- 123. Bosnia & Herzegovina received financial assistance to produce a brochure with 20 questions and answers related to the Montreal Protocol in Bosnian and English to be shared with interested network countries.

Achievements

- 124. Major achievements of the ECA network concern the high level of Article 7 and Country Programme data reporting and the ongoing ratification of the remaining amendments of the Montreal Protocol. All countries have their ODS legislation and licensing systems in place.
- 125. A significant achievement is the participation of four GEF-funded CEIT countries in the network meetings since 2006, which was made possible through a co-funding approach. Experts from ECA network countries also participated in the MeBr training organised in the GEF-supported CEIT countries. We expect to continue this synergetic cooperation in future.
- 126. RILO CIS participates in the ECA network meetings and compiled cases of illegal trade in ODS in their member countries. Cooperation with RILO ECE was also initiated.
- 127. The ECA network also funded the participation of selected experts in international conference focusing on innovation in refrigeration technologies and methyl bromide alternatives.
- 128. Information exchange and the implementation of ECA network activities is supported by the ECA website which receives more than 1000 hits per months. The site provides up-to-date information on network activities as well as meeting documents and presentation (http://fr1.estis.net/sites/ecanetwork/).

129. The evaluation of the ECA network in the context of the CAP evaluation provides an overall positive assessment highlighting that CAP is one of the most important instruments to facilitate compliance; that the ECA network coordinates well with other implementing agencies; that there is good cooperation and mutual assistance between more advanced and less advanced countries; and that the involvement of GEF-supported countries in the ECA network activities is a very positive aspect.

Approach

130. Beside the implementation of the agreed ECA work programme, the following strategic objectives will be pursued:

- Inter-regional cooperation with UNEP Regional Offices e.g. to share information on illegal trade issues (iPIC), CD-ROM / web-based customs training, to review meeting agendas and to recommend resource persons
- Inter-agency cooperation with bilateral partners and implementing agencies i.e. during network, thematic and contact group meetings
- Stakeholder cooperation e.g. with Regional Intelligence Liaison Offices (RILOs) and International Institute of Refrigeration (IIR)
- Thematic & contact group meetings e.g. to review TPMP implementation or MeBr phase-out projects, to support national stakeholder consultations and data collection
- Programmatic assistance e.g. to develop electronic tools for issuing licenses, to comply with plans of action, to up-date legislation, to improve licensing systems and for special compliance initiatives
- Regional awareness focusing on activities with regional scope e.g. videos with subtitles, bilingual booklets, outreach of existing awareness materials and regional conferences
- Country-to-country assistance e.g. to train new Ozone Officers, to verify reliability of data, to share lessons learned from project implementation and to support special compliance initiatives
- High-level missions and letters to ministers in coordination with all stakeholders involved and on a case-by-case basis e.g. to support ratification and signing of project documents
- Information exchange with GEF-assisted CEIT countries and joint activities through co-funding approaches e.g. joint meetings or
- Synergetic cooperation with GEF-supported CEIT countries
- Funding expert participation in international conferences focusing on innovation in refrigeration technology and methyl bromide alternatives
- Green Customs Initiative activities in the ECA network in coordination with RILO CIS and RILO ECE

- Supporting the implementation of UNEP climate neutral strategy e.g. through tree planting, use of electronic conferencing, participation in Billion Tree campaign and Climate Neutral network

The total overall disbursement rate for completed non-investment projects (excluding PRP) is 95% of total funds approved (including adjustments, not including programme support costs), with a ccumulative speed of first disbursement of 8 months after project approval and an average completion time of 32 months.
