

OVERVIEW OF ISSUES IDENTIFIED DURING PROJECT REVIEW

#### Introduction

- 1. This document consists of the following sections:
  - (a) An analysis of the number of projects and activities submitted by bilateral and implementing agencies to the 58<sup>th</sup> Meeting;
  - (b) Policy issues identified during the project review process;
  - (c) Projects and activities submitted for blanket approval;
  - (d) Investment projects for individual consideration; and
  - (e) Activities and projects not required for compliance.

### Projects and activities submitted by bilateral and implementing agencies

2. Bilateral and implementing agencies submitted 82 funding requests including new multi-year agreements, tranches of approved multi-year agreements, as well as projects and activities amounting to US \$41,637,283, including agency support costs where applicable, as submitted. Following the project review process by the Secretariat, 44 projects and activities amounting to US \$7,315,333 are recommended for blanket approval; 33 projects and activities amounting to US \$20,571,483 are being forwarded for consideration by the Executive Committee; and 5 projects and activities amounting to US \$8,024,837 were withdrawn by relevant agencies.

### Policy issues identified during project review

3. During the project review process, the Secretariat identified the following two policy issues: levels of funding for institutional strengthening projects beyond 2010; and confidentiality of HCFC data reported under Article 7.

### Levels of funding for institutional strengthening projects

- The current policy of the Executive Committee allows for continued funding for institutional strengthening support through the renewal of institutional strengthening projects. However, decision 47/49 indicates that possible funding arrangements and levels for institutional strengthening support beyond 2010 should be examined at the end of 2007. Since the adoption of this decision, the Executive Committee has considered several policy papers on this issue, the last being discussed at its 57th Meeting, where no substantive conclusion was reached. During its deliberations, some members of the Committee were of the view that future institutional strengthening funding may need to be considered as part of a package of funding that had to be agreed in the context of HCFC phase-out. As the Committee was unable to reach a conclusion on the matter, it decided, inter alia, to continue to fund requests for the renewal of institutional strengthening projects up to the end of December 2010 at current levels pending final resolution of the matter at its 58th Meeting (decision 57/36 (b)). The policy paper on institutional strengthening beyond 2010 has been resubmitted to the 58th Meeting (document UNEP/OzL.Pro/ExCom/58/48).
- 5. On behalf of 16 governments of Article 5 countries, the implementing agencies have submitted to the 58<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the Executive Committee requests for funding renewals of institutional strengthening projects, for a two-year period. There are no outstanding costs or other policy issues with any of these proposals. Noting decision 57/36, and the fact that funding for the projects was being requested beyond 2010, the Secretariat was unable to recommend blanket approval of these institutional strengthening renewal requests.

6. The Executive Committee may wish to consider approving the institutional strengthening renewals for these countries at the level of funding being requested (i.e., for a two-year period) as well as the observations to be communicated to recipient Governments as contained in relevant work programmes of the implementing agencies, or deferring consideration of the institutional strengthening projects submitted to the 58th Meeting until it has discussed the policy paper on institutional strengthening beyond 2010, and taken a decision on this matter.

### Confidentiality of HCFC data reported under Article 7

- 7. At their 1<sup>st</sup> Meeting, the Parties to the Montreal Protocol decided *inter alia* that the Ozone Secretariat, in preparing ODS data reports, shall aggregate the data from several Parties in such a way as to ensure that data from Parties deemed to be confidential is not disclosed. The Ozone Secretariat shall also publish total data aggregated over all Parties for each individual controlled substance (decision I/11).
- 8. During the phase-out of all ODS excluding HCFCs, aggregation of data by group of ODS was not a major issue, as the two substances most commonly used by Article 5 countries had the same ODP value (i.e., CFC-11 and CFC-12 with an ODP value of 1), and there was also one substance in other groups (i.e., CTC, TCA and methyl bromide). The situation is different concerning HCFCs, as all of them are classified under Annex C, Group I of the Protocol. The most commonly used HCFCs by Article 5 countries, i.e., HCFC-141b, HCFC-142b and HCFC-22, have different ODP values. Therefore, disaggregated data for each HCFC would need to be provided to assess the costs and implementation of HPMPs and phase-out activities.
- 9. The format of the mandatory annual progress report on the implementation of the country programme submitted to the Fund Secretariat no later than 1 May, requires that each Article 5 country report its ODS consumption by substance and by sector(s) where the substance is used. Article 5 countries shall also report on the total amounts of ODS that have been imported, produced and/or exported. Although the data in this report should be similar to that reported under Article 7 of the Montreal Protocol, the Fund Secretariat has not considered this data for determining whether Article 5 Parties are in apparent compliance with their obligations under the Protocol or with their agreements with the Executive Committee for the phase-out of ODSs.
- 10. The Fund Secretariat is currently discussing this issue with the Ozone Secretariat to see if a solution can be found to the data confidentiality problem in respect of the Article 5 country governments that deemed the data reported under Article 7 to be confidential. Consideration is being given to seeking their consent to allow the Ozone Secretariat to send the disaggregated HCFC data to the Fund Secretariat in order to review submitted activities and the performance of relevant phase-out projects and activities against the official ODS reported data.
- 11. In light of the issues on confidentiality, and the fact that the data reported under Article 7 is aggregated by group of ODS, the Executive Committee might wish to consider the data reported under the progress report on the implementation of the country programmes as the data to determine the eligibility of individual sectors in Article 5 countries in regard to phase-out of HCFC consumption on an interim basis, pending a resolution on the confidentiality issue being discussed with the Ozone Secretariat. The Fund Secretariat will report back to the 59<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the Executive Committee on the resolution reached by the Secretariats.

### Projects and activities submitted for blanket approval

12. Annex I to this document, lists 44 projects and activities with a total value of US \$7,315,333, which are recommended for blanket approval. It is to be noted that approval of these projects by the Executive Committee covers relevant conditions or provisions included in the corresponding project evaluation sheets, as well as the following:

- (a) Approval of the agreement between the Government of Haiti and the Executive Committee for the terminal phase-out management plan contained in Annex I to document UNEP/Ozl.Pro/ExCom/58/34 at a total amount in principle of US \$190,000 plus agency support costs of US \$24,700 for UNEP and US \$150,000 plus agency support costs of US \$13,500 for UNDP, and the first tranche for the project at the amount indicated in Annex I to this document; and
- (b) Approval of implementation programmes associated with relevant tranches of multi-year projects.

### **Investment projects for individual consideration**

- 13. A total of 33 projects and activities at a total cost of US \$25,355,643 as submitted, are proposed for individual consideration. The issues associated with non-investment projects are presented in the relevant work programme amendments of the implementing agencies (UNEP/OzL.Pro/ExCom/58/21 for UNDP; UNEP/OzL.Pro/ExCom/58/22 for UNEP; UNEP/OzL.Pro/ExCom/58/23 for UNIDO and UNEP/OzL.Pro/ExCom/58/24 for the World Bank).
- 14. The list of six investment projects submitted for individual consideration, including a brief explanation of the issues to be addressed, is shown in Table 1 below:
