تعليقات من أمانة الصندوق

مقدمة

-1 تتضمن هذه الوثيقة تعليقات وتوصيات من أمانة الصندوق عن تقرير مرحلي من اليونيب بشأن الأنشطة التي بذلت حتى 31 ديسمبر 2002 . والتقرير المرحلي مرفق .

حالة التنفيذ

2- أتم اليونيب 67 في المئة (458) من المشروعات المعتمدة (686) كي يتولى تنفيذها خلال 2002 . وأنفق 68 في المئة (44.6 مليون دولار أمريكي) من الموارد التي اعتمدتها اللجنة التنفيذية لليونيب حتى آخر عام 2002 (65.3 مليون دولار أمريكي) . وكان لدى اليونيب رصيد قدره 227,805 دولار أمريكي من أموال غير مستعملة لتحضير المشروعات في نهاية 2002 . وأموال تحضير المشروعات المعتمدة لليونيب هي أموال لوضع خطط لإدارة غازات التبريد.

18 في 2002 ، أتم اليونيب عشرة برامج قطرية ، و15 برنامجاً للمساعدة التقنية ، و18 برنامجاً تدريبياً ، وشرع في 3 مشروعاً جديداً للتعزيز المؤسسى .

التقدم على المستوى القطري

4 يتضمن المرفق الأول تقييماً حسب كل قطر لأنشطة اليونيب خلال 2002. وكان اليونيب قد أزمع صرف أموال في 85 من الأقطار. وقد حقق أكثر من 85 في المئة من مقدار الأموال التي كان يقدر صرفها في 85 من هذه الأقطار. وكان لدى اليونيب صرف سلبي في 85 أقطار ، أي أن " أمواله المنصرفة " قد جرى تصحيحها عند مستوى يقل عن المستوى المبين في تقريره المرحلي عن عام 800.

5- أتم اليونيب جميع المسروعات التي كان يزمع إتمامها في 30 من 92 قطراً كان قد خطط لإتمام مشروعات فيها في 2002 . ووقع هذه الأنشطة يصعب ربطه بالجهود المباشرة للإزالة في الأقطار ، حيث أن اليونيب يقوم بتنفيذ مشروعات غير استثمارية فقط . وتبليغ بيانات البرنامج القطري من جانب جميع بلدان المادة 5 كان من شأنه أن يسمح بتقييم كامل حيث أن هذه البيانات يجب إرسالها في أول مايو من كل عام إلى أمانة الصندوق . ومن مؤشرات اليونيب الدالة على الأداء تحسين تبليغ البيانات ، وهو أمر يركز عليه تركيزاً رئيسياً برنامج اليونيب للمساعدة على الامتثال . أن 60 من 132 قطراً من أقطار المادة 5 المؤهلة للحصول على مساندة من الصندوق المتعدد الأطراف قد أبلغت بيانات تنفيذها لبرنامجها القطري لعام 2002 إلى أمانة الصندوق .

الأنشطة في البلدان التي وجدت في حالة عدم امتثال

6- استعرضت الأمانة أوضاع المشروعات في جميع البلدان التي وجدها الاجتماع الرابع عشر للأطراف في حالة عدم امتثال . وقد اتخذت مقررات تتعلق بعدم الامتثال فيما يتعلق بتبليغ البيانات إعمالاً للمادة 7 ، التي وضعت خطوطاً أساسية وتجميداً للـ CFC .

7- يقوم اليونيب أيضا بالتشجيع على تبليغ البيانات ، من خلال اجتماعات لشبكات الاتصال واتصالات بالمكاتب الإقليمية في إطار برنامج اليونيب للمساعدة على الامتثال ، وفي الحالات التي لدى اليونيب فيها مشروعات ويقوم اليونيب أيضاً بالتشجيع على تبليغ البيانات. وقد ترغب اللجنة التنفيذية في أن تنظر في وضع هدف لنشاط اليونيب في مجال برنامج المساعدة على الامتثال هو القيام بالتبليغ الكامل للبيانات ، تشمل البيانات الناقصة اللازمة لتحديد خطوط أساس الامتثال .

عدم الامتثال لتبليغ البيانات إعمالاً للمادة 7

8- فانواتو هي من البلدان التي جرى تبويبها باعتبارها غير ممتثلة فيما يتعلق بتبليغ البيانات (المقرر 14/XIV) ، وقامت فانواتو بتبليغ بيانات استهلاك عام 2002 التي تقتضيها المادة 7 ، حتى مايو 2002 . وعلى الرغم من أن الكاميرون وبالاو لم يقوما بتبليغ بيانات استهلاك التي تقتضيها المادة 7 ، إعمالاً للمقرر 14/XIV ، إلا أنهما قامتا بتبليغ بيانات استهلاك عام 2002 إلى أمانة الصندوق في سياق بيانات تنفيذ البرنامج القطري . والبلدان الآتية التي وجدت في حالة عدم الامتثال لم تقم بتبليغ البيانات المطلوبة منها : الرأس الأخضر ، جيبوتي ، ليبريا ، ناورو ، رواندا ، سامو تومي وبرنسيبي ، الصومال ، سورينام ، ولايات مكرونيسيا المتحدة .

عدم الامتثال لتبليغ البيانات اللازمة لوضع خطوط الأساس

9- من البلدان التي وجدت في حالة عدم الامتثال فيما يتعلق بوجوب تبليغ البيانات لغرض تحديد خطوط الأساس (المقرر 16/XIV)، قامت كل من كمبوديا وولايات مكرونيسيا المتحدة وبلاو وفانوتو بتبليغ بيانات خط الأساس . وبالإضافة إلى البلدان التي لم تقم بتبليغ بيانات خط الأساس حسب البيانات التي وردت في شهر مايو 2002 . وبالإضافة إلى ذلك فإن كلا من جمهورية الكونغو الدايمقرطية وكوريا الديمقراطية الشعبية وملديف ، ونيجيريا ، وسانت كيتس ونيفيس ، وسيراليون ، لم تكن قد أبلغت بيانات خط الأساس بالنسبة لمواد المرفق ها، فقط .ولم يقم أي بلد من هذه البلدان بتبليغ بيانات خط الأساس عن مواد المرفق ها، في بيانات مايو 2002 التي وردت .

عدم الامتثال لتجميد الـ CFC

10 يقوم اليونيب بتنفيذ أنشطة في 11 من 14 بلداً جرى تبويبها كبلدان غير ممتثلة ، على الرغم من أنه ينبغي أن يلاحظ أن برنامج المساعدة على الامتثال لليونيب يقصد إلى إسداء المساعدة على تحقيق الامتثال لجميع بلدان المادة 5 .

 $^{\circ}$ CFC على أساس البيانات التي أبلغت عن عام 2002 ، يوجد أن 7 من 14 بلداً أصبحت ممتثلة لتجميد ال $^{\circ}$ تشمل بنغلاديش ، بليز ، بوليفيا ، الكاميرون ، أثيويبا ، نيبال ، نيجيريا . ويتناول هذا القسم البلدان التي لم يتم تبليغ بيانات منها عن عام 2002 ، لتحديد ما إذا كانت ممتثلة أم لا .

ألبانيا (القرر 18/XIV)

12 - تقوم اليونيب بتنفيذ مشروع للتعزيز المؤسسي في ألبانيا (ALB/SEV/38/INS/04) اعتمد في نوفمبر 2002. وقد اعتمد هذا المشروع لمدة سنة واحدة قبل إتمام البرنامج القطري ، وفي سبيل تسهيل إعداد ذلك البرنامج . وبعد ذلك تمت الموافقة على البرنامج القطري باعتباره خطة وطنية للإزالة ، تتولى تنفيذها اليونيدو بوصفها الوكالة القائدة ، وتم تمديد مشروع التعزيز المؤسسي في الاجتماع الـ 39 ، كي ينفذه اليونيب . وقال اليونيب أنه بسبب تغير في وحدة الأوزون الوطنية وكذلك في فريق اليونيب ، حدث بط في التنفيذ . وقال اليونيب أن وحدة الأوزون الوطنية أصبحت مزودة الآن بالموظفين وقائمة بالتشغيل ، وضالعة في إعداد تشريع الترخيص الخاص بالاستيراد والتصدير وأنشطة توعية الجمهور .

جزر البهاما (القرر 19/XIV)

13- تقوم اليونيب بتنفيذ مشروع تجديد التعزيز المؤسسي في جزر البهاما (BHA/SEV/31/INS/11) وأتمت أنشطة خطة إدارة غازات التبريد في 2001. وكان اليونيب هو الوكالة المنفذة للتعزيز المؤسسي في جزر البهاما منذ نوفمبر 1993. وقال اليونيب أنه عقد اجتماعين مع جزر البهاما بشأن الامتثال كما قال أن وحدة الأوزون الوطنية هي وحدة نشطة في اجتماعات الشبكة .

البوسنة والهرسك

14- أن اليونيب لا يقوم بتنفيذ أية أنشطة في البوسنة والهرسك . وقال اليونيب أنه قد أبلغ وحدة الأوزون الوطنية ما يترتب من أثار على المقرر الخاص بعدم الامتثال ، فقام البلد بعد ذلك بتقديم المعلومات المطلوبة . وقال اليونيب أنه من غير اللازم اتخاذ أي تدبير آخر في هذا الوقت . غير أن برنامج المساعدة على الامتثال التابع لليونيب قد اعتمد لإسداء المساعدة على الامتثال الجميع بلدان المادة 5 ، وتلقى اليونيب موافقة من الاجتماع الـ 39 على شبكة شرق أوروبا ، التي تشارك البوسنة والهرسك فيها كعضو .

إثيوبيا (القرر 34/XIV)

15 - يقوم اليونيب بتنفيذ مشروع تجديد التعزيز المؤسسي في أثيويبا (ETH/SEV/29/INS/07) وكان هو الوكالة المنفذة لشروع التعزيز المؤسسي في أثيويبا منذ أكتوبر 1996 . ونشاط خطة إداة غازات التبريد في سبيل تدريب أخصائيي التبريد لشروع التعزيز المؤسسي في أثيويبا منذ أكتوبر 1996 . ونشاط خطة إداة غازات التبريد في سبيل تدريب أخصائيي التبريد في المدربين المحليين في تكنولوجيا (ETH/SEV/29/TRA/09) قد أتم المرحلة الأولى ، التي جرى فيها تدريب 28 من المدربين المحليين في تكنولوجيا التبريد .

ليبيا (القرر 25/XIV)

16- لا يقوم اليونيب بتنفيذ أي مشروعات في ليبيا ، غير أن ليبيا هي عضو في الشبكة الإقليمية الإفريقية التي هي جزء من نشاط المساعدة على الامتثال التابع لليونيب . وقد قال اليونيب أن جهوده في الاتصال بوحدة الأوزون الوطنية لم تثمر شيئاً . ولم يتلق اليونيب أي إجابة على دعواته المتكررة إلى المشاركة في اجتماعات الشبكة . وقدمت حكومة ليبيا إلى أمانة الأوزون في 22 مايو 2003 خطة محددة من الناحية الزمنية تتضمن تدابير لإعادة ليبيا إلى حظيرة الامتثال .

ملديف (القرر 26/XIV)

-17 يقوم اليونيب بتنفيذ مشروع لتجديد التعزيز المؤسسي في ملديف (MDV/SEV/37/INS/04) ، وكان هو الوكالة المنفذة لمشروع التعزيز المؤسسي في ملديف منذ مارس 1994 . واليونيب هو أيضاً القائم بتنفيذ خطة إدارة غازات التبريد ، إعمالاً للمقرر 48/31 ، الذي من شأنه تمكين اله ملديف من تحقيق الامتثال في نهاية عام 2007 ، وهو المقرر الذي صدر في نوفمبر 2002 . وقال اليونيب أنه بمساعدة من برنامج المساعدة على الامتثال أرسلت حكومة ملديف رسالة إلى أمانة الأوزون في مايو 2003 تستجيب للمقرر 26/XIV ، وتبين خطة عمل مقسمة على مراحل محددة ، لتحقيق الامتثال والحفاظ عليه .

ناميبيا (المقرر 22/XIV)

18 - أن اليونيب هو الوكالة المنفذة لمشروع تجديد التعزيز المؤسسي في ناميبيا (NAM/SEV/31/INS/07) ، وكان هو الوكالة المنفذة لمشروع التعزيز المؤسسي الأصلي في ناميبيا منذ سبتمبر 1996. وقال اليونيب أنه عقد اجتماعات ثنائية مع المسؤول عن الحكالة المنفذة لمشروع التعزيز المؤسسي الأصلي في عام 2002 ، وأن البلد حصل من اليونيب ومن GTZ الألمانية على مساندة واسعة النطاق ، في أنشطة الإزالة . ويـزمع فريق برنامج المساعدة على الامتثال الإقليمي زيارة البلد في 2003 لمناقشة مختلف أصحاب المصلحة بشأن صحة البيانات التي تم تبليغها .

سانت فنسنت و جزر غرینادین (القرر 24/XIV)

19- كان اليونيب هـو الوكالـــة المـنفــذة لمشـروع الـتعزيــز المؤسسي في سانت فنسـنت وجــزر غريـنادين (STV/SEV/25/INS/04) منذ يوليه 1998. ولم يحـدث تجديد لـتعزيز المؤسسي بينما كان من الفروض أن يحدث تجديد له بعـد مضى ثلاث سنوات على الموافقة الأصلية للمشروع ، لو أن المشروع قد جرى تشغيله على نحو ما كان مزمعاً . وقال اليونيب أنـه لم يتم صـرف أموال في 2002 إلى وحدة الأوزون الوطنية ، لأنه لم يقدم تقرير (سواء أكان مؤقتاً أو مالياً) ، في عام 2002 . وقال اليونيب أنـه قد أبلـغ وحدة الأوزون الوطنية ما يترتب من آثار على عدم الامتثال ، غير أن الحكومة لم تقدم بعد بيانات عـام 2002 لإمكان التحقق من عودتها إلى حظيرة الامتثال . ويقوم اليونيب أيضاً بتنفيذ مشروع للرصد والرقابة في البلد (STV/REF/25/TRA/03) . وقـال اليونيب أن التشريع لم يتم الموافقة عليه في عام 2002 للوائح الـ ODS . وقد أتم اليونيب مشــروع تدريـب أخصــائيي التــبريد الــذي كــان جــزءاً مــن خطــة إدارة غــازات التــبريد في ســانت فنســنت (STV/REF/25/TRA/02) .

المشروعات الفردية

20- يتناول هـذا القسم التأخيرات في التنفيذ ويقدم تعليقات على مشروعات محددة لم يتم تبويبها بعد بوصفها مشروعات فيها تأخيرات في التنفيذ ولكن يبدو أن فيها مصاعب في التنفيذ .

تأخيرات في التنفيذ

-21 هناك 15 مشروعاً فيها تأخيرات في التنفيذ ، بعد مراعاة أية مشروعات حذفت من قائمة تلك المشروعات بموجب مقرر صادر عن اللجنة التنفيذية . ويوجد ثلاث من هذه المشروعات تم تبويبها في العام الماضي باعتبارها مشروعات فيها تأخيرات في التنفيذ . ووفقاً للإجراءات المتعلقة بإلغاء المشروعات (المقرر 2/26) ، سوف يقدم إلى الاجتماع ال41 تقرير عن هذه المشروعات لتحديد ما إذا كان قد حدث أي تقدم نحو إزالة العوائق التي تسبب التأخيرات في التنفيذ .

مشروعات ذات مصاعب في التنفيذ

22- توجد أربع مشروعات يبدو أن فيها مصاعب في التنفيذ ، وذلك على أساس استعراض قامت به الأمانة للتقرير المرحلي المقدم من اليونيب ، بالإضافة إلى المشروعات التي سبق تبينها باعتبارها ذات تأخيرات في التنفيذ ، على الرغم من أن اثنين من هذه المشروعات سوف يضافان إلى قائمة المشروعات ذات التأخيرات في هذا الاجتماع .

النظام العالمي لتقفّي (tracking) الـ dracking

ODS تدل الملاحظات أنه لم يحدث تقدم في وضع أنظمة للتقفّي للـ ODS والمعــــدات الـتي تحــوى ODS والمعـــدات الـتي تحــوى ODS ولكن تاريخ الإتمام المزمع وهو ديسمبر 2002 لم يتغير . وفي تقرير العام الماضي ، قال اليونيب أن بحوثاً جرت بشأن خلفية الموضوع ، ووضعت صلاحيات وتم تبين خبراء استشاريين ، وصدر بيان يقول أن المشروع يمكن إتمامه في الموعد المحدد له . وقال اليونيب أن المشروع قد تعثر بسبب تأخيرات داخلية في اليونيب ، غير أنه من المتوقع إتمام المشروع في 2004 . وينظر إلى هذا المشروع الآن باعتباره مشروعاً فيه تأخير في التنفيذ .

ترجمة منشورات اليونيب

24 لـ حى اليونيب مشروعان لترجمة الوثائق الموجودة . وقد تمت الموافقة على أحدهما في نوفم بر 2002 وسبب التأخير (GLO/SEV/36/TAS/238) في مارس 2002 . وسبب التأخير (GLO/SEV/29/TAS/198) في مارس 2002 . وسبب التأخير في الحصول على الترجمة الفرنسية ، حسب ما قاله اليونيب ، هو مصاعب سياسية في الكوت ديفوار . وقال اليونيب أنه كان من الصعب الاتصال بالبلد وأن جميع الأموال للمشروع كان قد تم الإلتزام بها . غير أنه ليس من الواضح كيف يمكن الربط بين نشاط الترجمة والمصاعب السياسية ، نظراً لتوفر إمكانيات الاتصال على الصعيد العالمي كله تقريباً عن طريق التليفون والانترنت ، وبينما يعمل مكتب الصناعة والبيئة التابع لليونيب في باريس بإمكانيات لا حدود لها في الترجمة إلى الفرنسية . وهذا المشروع يعتبر الآن مشروعاً ذا تأخيرات في التنفيذ .

25- بشأن المسروع الآخر للترجمة ، تلقي اليونيب 93,000 دولار أمريكي في مارس 2002 ، غير أنه قال أن المشروع ينظوى على أكثر من مجرد الترجمة ، حيث أنه ينطوى أيضاً على المراجعة وترتيب النصوص والطبع والنشر. وقال اليونيب أن مشروع الترجمة قد تم توزيعه على الصعيد الإقليمي بدلاً من معالجته في مكتب اليونيب بباريس . وينبغي أن يلاحظ أنه على الرغم من أنه قد يوجد فعلاً مزيد من العمل في ترتيب النصوص المطلوب نشرها ، إلا أن وثائق اجتماعات اللجنة التنفيذية إنما يتم ترجمتها وطبعها ونشرها في بضعة أسابيع فقط . وتوزيع هذا النشاط على الصعيد الإقليمي لم يكن من شأنه تعجيل إتمامه . وقد تم إبلاغ اللجنة التنفيذية بحدوث تأخيرات في مشروعات سابقة للترجمة ، ولكن اللجنة لم تتخذ أي تدبير حيث أن الترجمة قد اعتبرت ضرورية . غير أن اللجنة التنفيذية قد تري أن تنظر في وسائل أسرع لترجمة المنشورات الموجودة لتوفيرها في أقرب وقت ممكن خلال فترة الامتثال ، وإلا أصبحت المعلومات الواردة في الوثائق التي سوف تترجم معلومات قديمة عفا عليها الزمن عندما تبلغ المستعملين المستهدفين منها .

أنشطة الحوار السياسي في الصين

26 صرف في 27,213 دولار أمريكي من 275,000 دولار أمريكي المعتمدة لمشروع التدريب السياسي للسلطات المحلية في الصين (شريحة 2001) (CPR/SEV/34/TRA/377) . وقد تلقى اليونيب فعالاً أموال شريحة عام 2002

(CPR/SEV/37/TRA/392) ، غير أن شيئاً من هذا المبلغ لم يتم صرفه . ولم يقم اليونيب بتبليغ أية أنشطة عن الشريحة الثانية في 2002 ، غير أنه قال أنه حتى الآن قد ووضع مفهوماً وضع شروط صلاحية نهج بها في تدريب على الخط ، يمثل النشاط الأساسي للمرحلة الثانية .

تدريب في تكنولوجيا المواد الهيدروكربونية في أورغواي

27 أن التدريب على تكنولوجيا المواد الهيدروكربونية في قطاع التبريد في أورغواي (18U/REF/34/TAS/36) قد تمت الموافقة عليه في يوليه 2001 وكان من المفروض إتمامه في أغسطس 2002 . غير أن المشروع مزمع الآن إتمامه في مارس 2004 . وقاعدة بيانات التقرير المرحلي الصادر عن اليونيب تبين أن 48,400 دولار أمريكي من الـ 65,000 المعتمدة للمشروع قد تم صرفها ، غير أن الملاحظات في قاعدة البيانات تدل على أن مشروع مذكرة تفاهم قد أرسل إلى الحكومة كي توافق عليه . وقد طلبت الأمانة من اليونيب بياناً عن الصرف ، فأجاب اليونيب أنه لم يتم في الـ 2002 التوقيع على أي اتفاق ، على الرغم من أنه قد تكون هناك إلتزامات لعام 2003 . وهذا المشروع ليس مبوباً باعتباره مشروعاً فيه تأخيرات في التنفيذ ، غير أن اللجنة التنفيذية قد ترغب في أن تنظر في ضم هذا المشروع إلى القائمة المشروعات المطلوب رصدها في الاجتماع الـ 41 .

التعزيز المؤسسى ، وخطط إدارة غازات التبريد ، وإعداد البرامج القطرية ، وأنشطة بروميد الميثيل

28- هذه المشروعات ليست خاضعة للرصد ، من خلال تقارير عن حصول تأخيرات في التنفيذ ، ولذا ليست خاضعة لإجراءات إلغاء المشروعات .

التعزيز المؤسسي

29 أرفق اليونيب بتقريره المرحلي بيانات تفصيلية بشأن التعزيز المؤسسي لكل قطر من الأقطار . تضمنت تلك البيانات التفصيلية حالة التنفيذ والأنشطة المبذولة من جانب وحدات الأوزون الوطنية بشأن اللوائح والتشريعات ، وحالة إعداد نظام التراخيص ، ويوم الأوزون ، وأنشطة التوعية ، وحالة بعض المشروعات التي يجرى تنفيذها .

30- لم يحصل صرف أموال في 2002 على المشروعات الآتية للتعزيز المؤسسي ، بسبب عدم ورود تقارير من البلدان المعنية :

- دومنيكا (DMI/SEV/26/INS/04) التي لم يصرف لها مال منذ أغسطس 1999 . وقد أرسل اليونيب
 بعثة في 2003 لإعادة تنشيط المشروع ؛
- جمهورية كوريا الديمقراطية الشعبية (DRK/SEV/32/INS/13) على الرغم من وصول التقارير المبينة في تقرير مرحلي سابق ، إلا أن اليونيب قد بين أن المشروع قد تم تحويله إلى منطقة التنفيذ ، غير أنه لم يتم صرف أية أموال بعد ؛

- كمبوديا (KAM/SEV/36/INS/03) التي تم بشأنها التوقيع على وثيقة المشروع في سبتمبر 2002 ، غير
 أنه لم يتم الإلتزام بالأموال إلا في آواخر 2002 وآوائل 2003.
- غريـنادا (GRN/SEV/30/INS/02) الـتي لم يرد بشأنها تقارير غير أن وحدة الأوزون الوطنية نشطة الآن في اجتماعات الشبكة . وقال اليونيب أن وحدة الأوزون الوطنية هي أيضاً كبير موظفي الطاقة في غرينادا وأنه لا يخصص وقته كله لحماية طبقة الأوزون فقط ؛
- موزمبيق (MOZ/SEV/15/INS/03) التي قال اليونيب بشأنها أن وحدة الأوزون الوطنية قد أعيد تنشيطها على أثر بعثة في عام 2002 ، ولكن لم يبين أي نشاط في 2002 ،
- ميانمار (MYA/SEV/29/INS/02) التي لم يتم فيها صرف أموال منذ نوفمبر 1999 . وقد أرسل اليوئنديبي بعثة في فبراير 2003 لإعطاء بيانات إلى وحدة الأوزون الوطنية بشأن طريقة تجميع البيانات ، وهناك بعثة أخرى مزمعة في يوليه 2003 .
- سانت كيتس ونيفيس (STK/SEV/21/INS/02) التي لم يرد منها تقارير غير أن وحدة الأوزون الوطنية نشطة في الشبكة . وقال اليونيب أن وحدة الأوزون الوطنية تعمل أيضاً بوصفها المدير بالنيابة لشؤون البيئة وأنها لا تخصص كل وقتها لشؤون حماية الأوزون وحده ؟
- زميبيا (ZAM/SEV/30/INS/11) حيث تمت الموافقة على تجديد في 2002 غير أن اليونيب قال أن
 الأموال لن تكون لازمة في 2003 .

31 - بشأن وحدة الأوزون الوطنية في تنزانيا (URT/SEV/20/INS/07) ، تمت الموافقة على هذا المشروع في أكتوبر 1996 ، وتم صرف 2,975 دولار أمريكي من الـ 66,000 دولار أمريكي المعتمدة . وقد أرسل اليونيب ويزمع أن يرسل أفرقة من المندوبين عنه إلى تنزانيا لإعادة تنشيط المشروع ، بينما يقول قسم تنمية الأقطار أن وحدة الأوزون الوطنية قد شاركت في اجتماع للشبكة في عام 2002. وقال اليونيب أنه توصل إلى اتفاق مع وحدة الأوزون الوطنية بشأن الأنشطة المطلوب بذلها .

-32 بعد استعراض التقرير المرحلي المقدم إلى الاجتماع الـ 31، قررت اللجنة التنفيذية أن تطلب تقارير إضافية عن الوضع القائم في مشاريع التعزيز المؤسسي التي يجرى فيها التنفيذ ببطء أو على نحو غير مرض (المقرر 7/31(e)). وقد تمت مواصلة هذه الممارسة بعد تقديم التقرير المرحلي في العام الماضي . وقد ترغب اللجنة التنفيذية في أن تطلب من اليونيب تقديم تقارير إضافية عن الوضع القائم إلى الاجتماع الـ 41 بشأن هذه المشروعات وبشأن أية خطوات اتخذتها كل من اليونيب ووحدة الأوزون الوطنية منذ الاجتماع الـ 40

خطط إدارة غازات التبريد

33 – أن اليونيب هو الوكالة المنفذة لـ 74 نشاطاً في مجال خطط إدارة غازات التبريد ، في ختام عام 2002، تشمل اللوائح والتشريعات والسياسة (14)، والتوعية /الأنشطة البديلة (5)، والتدريب في الممارسات الجيدة في التبريد (21) ، والتدريب الجمركي (26) ومشروعات الرصد (8)

-34 يزمع اليونيب إتمام 9 مشروعات تتعلق باللوائح والتشريعات والسياسة العامة في 2003 ، غير أنه لا يزمع إتمام المشروعات الخمسة المتبقية حتى عام 2005 ، عندما يحدث تخفيض قدره 50 في المئة في البلدان الآتية : جيبوتي ، جورجيا ، غواتيمالا (2) ، غيانا . وإتمام اللوائح هو أحيانا سبب لعدم تنفيذ أنشطة أخرى في مجال خطط إدارة غازات التبريد .

35 - يزمع اليونيب إتمام 15 مشروعاً في تدريب أخصائيي التدريب في 2003 و 4 في 2004 و2 في 2005 (توغو وفيتنام)

36 يزمع اليونيب إتمام 15 مشروعاً في التدريب الجمركي في 2003 و 3 في 2004 و 2 في 2005(بيرو واليمن) و6 في ديسمبر 2007 . والبلدان التي يزمع بالنسبة لها إتمام مشروعات التدريب الجمركي في ديسمبر 2007 هي : غينيا ، الكويت ، قرغيستان ، ملديف ، مالي ، باراغواي . وينبغي أن يلاحظ أن الملديف قد وجدت في حالة عدم امتثال .

مشروعات تدريب أخصائيي التبريد

37 قال اليونيب أن عدة مشروعات متأخرة ريثما تصدر التشريعات الوطنية . وهذا السبب في التأخير كان مرتبطاً من الناحية التاريخية بمشروعات تدريب العاملين في الجمارك ، حيث أنه ينبغي أن يتم وضع أنظمة لإصدار التراخيص لتنظيم استيراد الح ODS قبل تدريب العاملين في الجمارك . بيد أن اليونيب يقول الآن أن تدريب الأخصائيين في التبريد متأخر بسبب التشريع . وهذه هي الحال في المرحلة الثالثة في برنامج تدريب قطاع خدمة التبريد في الأرجنتين (المحلة الثالثة في برنامج تدريب قطاع خدمة التبريد في الأرجنتين وقد تم التوقيع عليها ، وأن إجراءات وفيما يتعلق بالمشروع في الأرجنتين ، ينبغي أن يلاحظ أن مذكرة التفاهم الخاصة بالمشروع قد تم التوقيع عليها ، وأن إجراءات الصرف لا تزال معلقة . " ورداً على هذه المسائل التي أثارتها الأمانة ، قال اليونيب أن المؤسسية التقنية المسؤولة عن تنفيذ هذا المشروع قررت إعطاء الأولوية لمشروع نظام إصدار التراخيص ، حيث أن الأرجنتين معرضة لوجودها في حالة عدم امتثال بالنسبة لمستويات الإنتاج ، كما قررت أن تحدد إجراءات صرف المال للمشروعات الأخرى في تاريخ لاحق ".

38 أن السبب نفسه للتأخير ، ريثما يصدر التشريع ، قد أعطي بالنسبة لمشروع تدريب الأخصائيين في غرينادا (GRN/REF/30/TRA/03) على الرغم من أن المرحلة الأولى من المشروع قد ذكر أنها قد إتمت وذلك في التقرير المرحلي عن العام الماضي . وقال اليونيب أن من العناصر المكونة لمشروع التشريعات عنصر إصدار التراخيص لأخصائيي تكييف الهواء والتبريد . وينبغي أن يلاحظ مع ذلك أن المرحلة الثانية من المشروع مقصود منها تدريب الأخصائيين بينما المرحلة الأولى مقصوداً منها تدريب

المدربين . وليس من الواضح ما إذا كان اليونيب ، بالأموال المحدودة المتبقية في الميزانية يزمع إعادة تدريب المدربين في المرحلة الأولى في هذا الجانب من التشريع الخاص بإصدار التراخيص للأخصائيين .

— في حالة مشروع تدريب أخصائيي التبريد في باراغواي (PAR/REF/32/TRA/07)، قال اليونيب أنه لم يحدث تقدم . وفي العام الماضي قال اليونيب أن مشروع مذكرة تفاهم مع البلد معروض لإبداء تعليقات عليه ثم التوقيع عليه في النصف الأول من عام 2002. وقال اليونيب أنه قرر إعطاء أولوية في 2002 لتوقيع الاتفاق مع الحكومة بالنسبة للمشروعيين الآخرين الخاصيين بخطط إدارة غازات التبريد في باراغواي ، بشأن حوار على مستوى السياسة العامة ومشروع للرصد ، حيث أن البلد قد يكون في حالة عدم امتثال . غير أنه ، بشأن المشروعيين الآخريين ، قال اليونيب أن عقوداً يجرى وضعها ، وذلك في التقارير المرحلية الشائة أنه لم يبين إذا كانت مذكرة التفاهم قد تم التوقيع عليها في 2002 أم لا .

تأخيرات في تنفيذ خطط إدارة غازات التبريد ، بسبب تغيرات في الوحدات الوطنية للأوزون

-40 أن مشروعات خطط إدارة غازات التبريد تتأخر أيضاً بسبب تغيرات تحدث في المسؤول عن وحدة الأوزون الوطنية . وهذه هي الحال بالنسبة للتدريب على الممارسات الجيدة في الإدارة ، في دومنيكا (NER/REF/26/TRA/03) وكذلك في مشروع التدريب الجمركي في النيجر (NER/REF/27/TAS/05) . بيد أن هذين المشروعين قد اعتمدا في آواخر 1998 أو آوائل .

تأخيرات في خطط إدارة غازات التبريد المعتمدة قبل عام 2002 ، بسبب نقل أنشطة اليونيب إلى الأصعدة الإقليمية من خلال برنامج المساعدة على الامتثال

41 — قال اليونيب أيضاً أن نقل عمليات اليونيب إلى الأصعدة الإقليمية قد أدى إلى تأخيرات في بعض المشروعات ، بينما كان المقصود من هذا النقل التعجيل بالتنفيذ . وهذه هي الحال في مشروع الرصد والتشريع الخاص بخطة إدارة غازات التبريد في بنما (PAN/REF/29/TRA/13) ، ومشروع الإفراج الجمركي في بنما (PAN/REF/29/TAS/14) ، ومشروع الإفراج الجمركي في بنما (1999 منامج المساعدة على الامتثال . وبإنشاء نظام برنامج المساعدة على الامتثال ، وبإنشاء نظام لمن تستعمل ولن يستعملوا في الامتثال ، قررت اللجنة التنفيذية أن ميزانية برنامج المساعدة على الامتثال والعاملين في هذا النظام لن تستعمل ولن يستعملوا في تنفيذ المشروعات المعتمدة قبل عام 2002 (المقرر 36/35) .

إعداد البرنامج القطري

42 - يلاحظ اليونيب أنه يزمع أن يضع في صورتها النهائية في عام 2003 البرامج القطرية المتبقية التي يقوم بإعدادها، شاملة برامج كل من جمهورية كوريا الديمقراطية الشعبية وهاييتي وليبريا وساو تومي وسورينام. والبرنامج القطري لكل من هاييتي وساو

تومي قد اعتمد في الاجتماع الـ 39 ، بينما قدم إلى اللجنة التنفيذية في اجتماعها الـ 40 تحديث للبرنامج القطري لجمهورية كوريا الديمقراطية الشعبية .

-43 أن إعداد تحديث للبرنامج القطري لإيران (IRA/SEV/36/CPG/145) كان من المفروض في إتمامه في أبريل -43 2003 غير أنه لم يتم صرف أموال طوال عام 2002 ، وتبين الملاحظات أن اليونيب يسعى إلى إيجاد خبير استشاري . وقال اليونيب أنه منذ عام 2002 جرى تعيين الخبراء الاستشاريين الدوليين والوطنيين كما أرسلت بعثتان وتم تنظيم مشورات مع أصحاب المصلحة . وينوى اليونيب التنسيق مع الوكالة القائدة في إعداد خطة الإزالة لإيران ، وهذه الوكالة هي ألمانيا ، وأن يقدم تحديث البرنامج القطري إلى الاجتماع الـ 41 .

44 أن إعداد البرنامج القطري /خطة إدارة غازات التبريد لليبريا (LIR/SEV/27/CPG/01) تمت الموافقة عليه في مارس 1999. وقال اليونيب أن مصاعب نشأت عن الوضع السياسي في البلد منذ ذلك الوقت هي سبب عدم وضع البرنامج القطري . وقامت الأمانة بإبلاغ اليونيب قبل الاجتماع الـ 39 بأن ألمانيا قالت أنها وضعت خطة لإدارة غازات التبريد ليبريا ، على الرغم من عدم تقديم أموال لألمانيا لإعداد تلك الخطة . وقال اليونيب أنه يقوم بوضع البرنامج القطري، وقد استأجر خدمات خبير استشاري جديد ، وأن وحدة وطنية للأوزون قد تم إنشاؤها ، وأن المشروع جار تنفيذه. ولم تعتمد أية أموال للتعزيز المؤسسي أو لأي مشروع آخر ريثما يتم البرنامج القطري. ولا تزال الصعوبات السياسية موجودة في البلد . وقد ترغب اللجنة التنفيذية في دعوة ألمانيا إلى تقديم خطة لإدارة غازات التبريد بوصفها برنامجاً قطرياً إلى الاجتماع الـ 41 ، وأن تلغي مشروع اليونيب .

-45 لاحظ اليونيب أن تحديث البرنامج القطري في سورينام (SUR/SEV/30/CPG/01) هو مشروع فيه تأخير في التنفيذ بسبب عدم وجود وحدة وطنية للأوزون . غير أن الجزء الخاص بوضع البرنامج القطري في التقرير المرحلي لليونيب يقول أن البرنامج القطري/خطة إدارة غازات التبريد أمر معلق ريثما يوجد استقرار مؤسسي وسياسي في البلد . وينبغي أن يلاحظ أن سورينام وجدت في حالة عدم امتثال، لعدم وفائها لمتقضيات تبليغ البيانات كما سبق أن ذكر . وقال اليونيب أن المشروع سوف يتم في يونيه 2003 ، غير أنه لم يقدم شيئاً إلى الاجتماع الـ 40 في هذا الصدد .

أنشطة بروميد الميثيل

-46 من أهداف الورشة المتعلقة بأنشطة بروميد الميثيل في أفريقيا (AFR/FUM/34/TRA/28) مساعدة البلدان على الوفاء بتجميد عام 2002 ، وكان لهذا المشروع تاريخ إتمام معين هو 12 شهراً ابتداء من موافقة يوليه 2001. وتدل التعليقات على أن التنفيذ أعيد تحديد موعده لعام 2003 بسبب نقل المسؤول الإقليمي عن بروميد الميثيل . وطلبت الأمانة تفسيراً من اليونيب في ضوء المقرر 36/35 ، الآنف الذكر في الفقرة 41 من هذه الوثيقة . فقال اليونيب أن الترتيبات لتنظيم الورشة بدأت في 2002 ، على يد فريق أنشطة الأوزون السابق ، ومنسق الشبكة الإقليمية السابق ، وأن عملية تجميع المعلومات اللازمة بشأن مشروع التدليل قد بدأت في ذلك الوقت ، غير أنها تباطأت بسبب نقل الأنشطة إلى الأصعدة الإقليمية . وقال اليونيب أن منسق الشبكة

الإقليمية لا يزال مسؤولاً عن المشروع , ولكن المسؤول الجديد عن بروميد الميثيل في نطاق برنامج المساعدة على الامتثال سيكون ضالعاً في عملية التدريب .

الشؤون المالية والتضاربات بين البيانات

47 أن هذه القسم من تعليقات الأمانة يعالج المشروعات التي إتمت وبقيت فيها أرصدة ، كما يعالج مقارنة بين بيانات اليونيدو وحسابات الصندوق وقائمة جرد المشروعات المعتمدة .

المشروعات التي إتمت وفيها أرصدة

48- هناك 56 مشروعاً قد أتمت حتى مايو 2002، ولكن لا يزال عليها أرصدة تبلغ 977,865 دولار أمريكي، لم يتم إعادتها إلى الصندوق. وسوف يستمر اليونيب في تقديم تقارير عن هذه المشروعات، إلى أن يتم إعادة الأرصدة أو تسويتها.

حسابات عام 2002 لدى اليونيب ، والبيانات الواردة في التقرير المرحلي

49 أن الشكل المقرر للتبليغ عما يحرز من تقدم يقتضي أن تكون البيانات التي تقدم سنوياً إلى أمينة الخزانة عن حسابات الصندوق أن تكون متمشية مع البيانات التي تقدم سنوياً إلى اللجنة التنفيذية في التقارير المرحلية . وطبقاً للتقارير المرحلية ، تلقى اليونيب مبلغ 72,980,206 دولار أمريكي من الموافقات على المشروعات ومن تكاليف المساندة ، بعد التصحيحات التي تأخذ في الاعتبار الأرصدة والإلغاءات . وصافي المجموع الذي تم صرفه ، شاملاً تكاليف المساندة هو 50,208,139 دولار أمريكي .

50 حتى هـذا التاريخ لم تـتلق أمينة الخزانة الحسابات المراجعة عن عام 2002 من اليونيب . وتبعاً لذلك فإن التوافق بين البيانات لا يمكن تحديده في هـذا الوقـت ، غير أنه سيتم في المقارنة السنوية بين الحسابات ، عند الاجتماع الـ 41 إعمالاً للمقرر 9/38، الفقرة (د).

UNEP PROGRESS AND FINANCIAL REPORT 2002 (1 JANUARY - 31 DECEMBER 2002)

Introduction

UNEP implements capacity building activities (i.e. non-investment projects) and provides compliance assistance services to Article 5 countries to:

- Help countries achieve and sustain compliance with the Montreal Protocol and its Amendments;
- Promote a greater sense of country 'ownership'; and
- Implement the agreed Executive Committee framework for Strategic Planning.

UNEP accomplishes this through the Compliance Assistance Programme (CAP), which was initiated in January 2002 and operates primarily through expert teams based in UNEP's Regional Offices and in DTIE Paris. Overall, in 2002 the CAP provided significant and enhanced advisory and project support assistance to Article 5 countries that resulted in an overall high rate of compliance with the Montreal Protocol and its Amendments by those countries. Details about the specific progress and achievements of the 2002 CAP is provided in Section III, Global and Regional Project Highlights as well as Annexes II, III and IV.

Specific to the approval of the 2002 CAP budget, Executive Committee Decision 35/36 required UNEP to take certain actions during 2002 for which UNEP responded as follows:

- Reported to the 37th and 38th Meetings of the Executive Committee on the progress made in the implementation of the CAP and on the lessons learned during the initial stages of CAP implementation.
- Submitted a preliminary report on the use of programme support costs (UNEP/Ozl.Pro/ExCom/38/22) to the 38th Meeting of the Executive Committee and a detailed report is being submitted to the 40th Meeting.
- Submitted the UNEP 2003 Work Programme, and 2003 Business Plan and 2003 Work Programme Amendments for approval to the 38th and 39th Meetings of the Executive Committee, with consideration of the benefits of developing a unified budget for CAP 2003 to the extent feasible. The Executive Committee approved UNEP's Work Programme (Decisions 38/36), endorsed its Business Plan (Decision 39/8), and approved its first Work Programme Amendment (Decision 39/25).
- Finalised and returned to the Multilateral Fund all funds approved for CAP in 2002 that were not spent for reprogramming. Out of the US\$ 5.3 million approved for the year 2002, UNEP is returning US\$ 1,265,686 plus programme support costs of US\$ 105,255 to the 40th Meeting of the Executive Committee, which corresponds to about 25% of the approved funds.

I. PROJECT APPROVALS AND DISBURSEMENTS

A. ANNUAL SUMMARY DATA

From its inception in June 1991 until the end of December 2002, the Executive Committee of

the Multilateral Fund has approved 686 projects for implementation by UNEP². The total funding approved for UNEP until December 2002 was US\$ 64,092,376 plus US\$ 7,540,006 programme support costs, representing some 5% of the total funding approved by the Multilateral Fund for the four Implementing Agencies³.

During 2002, the Executive Committee approved 72 projects for UNEP to implement. The total value of UNEP's approvals in 2002 was US\$ 10,050,787 not including programme support costs which includes the 2003 CAP approved by the 38th Meeting of the Executive Committee, but not the 2002 CAP approved at the 35th Meeting. *Annex 1:Annual Summary* provides details.

B. INTEREST

The interest accrued during the reporting period was US\$ 632,720. The total accumulated interest until December 2002 was US\$ 3,948,091 broken down by year as follows:

C. SUMMARY DATA BY TYPE

Of the 686 activities implemented by UNEP from June 1991 until December 2002, 167 are time-sensitive Institutional Strengthening (IS) projects and 519 objective-sensitive activities, including 253 technical assistance projects, 143 training projects, 91 Country Programme (CP) preparations and 32 Refrigerant Management Plan (RMP) preparations.

The above data include 72 activities that the Executive Committee approved in 2002 to be implemented by UNEP. Out of those 2002 approvals, 37 are time-sensitive IS projects and 35 objective-sensitive activities including 16 technical assistance projects, 14 training projects, 4 CP preparations and 1 RMP preparation.

During the same period, UNEP reported 74 projects as completed as follows: IS (24), training (19), technical assistance (17), CP preparation (10) and RMP preparations (4). Out of these, 10 have completion dates before 2002.

The overall cumulative completion ratio is 67% and increased compared with that of the previous year (i.e. 62%) and exceeds the approved performance indicator target (i.e. 60%). The cumulative completion ratio by project type is 93% for CP preparations, 81% for RMP

preparations, 75% for technical assistance projects, 56% for training projects and 46% for IS projects. For details of all completion ratios, please see the following *Annex 1: Summary Data by Projects Type*.

II. PROJECT COMPLETIONS SINCE LAST REPORT

A. ODP PHASED OUT SINCE LAST REPORT

The Peru refrigeration training (PER/REF/21/TRA/21) was completed in December 2002 and phased-out 44.8 ODP tons.

The cumulative phase-out achieved as a result of all projects completed by UNEP was 180.9 ODP tons as follows:

Previously completed projects (see section B footnote) contributed an ODP phase-out of 136.1 ODP tons: 23.0 ODP tons in Burkina Faso (BKF/REF/11/TRA/03), 68.3 ODP tons in Guatemala (GUA/REF/21/TRA/13) and 44.8 ODP tons in Argentina (ARG/REF/21/TRA/51).

B. NON-INVESTMENT PROJECT COMPLETIONS SINCE LAST REPORT

During 2002, UNEP reported 74 projects⁴ as completed, the majority of which were IS (24), followed by training (19), technical assistance (17), CP preparation (10) and RMP preparations (4).

The regional distribution of these completed projects is: Africa (22), Latin America & the Caribbean (19), Asia Pacific (15), Global (8), Europe (5) and West Asia (5). The following tables provide details about the completed projects by region.

III. GLOBAL AND REGIONAL PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

A. GLOBAL PROJECTS

1. COMPLIANCE ASSISTANCE PROGRAMME (CAP)

As per Decision 35/36, UNEP reported to the 37th and 38th Meetings of the Executive Committee on the progress made in the implementation of the CAP and on the lessons learned during the initial stages of CAP implementation. The following presents highlights from those reports plus additional developments after the 38th Meeting.

In 2002, the main objectives of the CAP were:

- Initiating the re-orientation: Identify and initiate administrative and operational adjustments required for regionalisation for UNEP's programme under the Montreal Protocol;
- Forming the Regional teams: Initiate and complete the recruitment of Paris-based and regional CAP teams;
- Operating the system: Develop and operationalize a management system that was suited to a regionalized programme implementation.
- Delivering Compliance Assistance Services: Provide direct and indirect policy, technical and information assistance to help Article 5 countries achieve, sustain or return to compliance, with special attention being paid to countries in actual non-compliance or danger of being in non-compliance.
- Improving implementation and measuring performance: Improve the efficiency of implementation of existing projects, and address the causes of delay in project implementation; and

By the end of 2002, UNEP had achieved the following progress towards meeting the above-stated objectives:

Initiating the re-orientation

- Getting CAP running: The start up of CAP took place in broad consultations with National Ozone Officers, Members of the Executive Committee, the Informal Advisory Group, the Multilateral Fund Secretariat, UNEP's Regional Directors, the Regional Network Co-ordinators and existing UNEP staff, as well as DTIE and UNON senior management and external advisors.
- Regionalising: The programme was successfully regionalised by the end of 2002.
 Significant administrative changes and operational adjustments were conducted to facilitate project implementation.
- Communicating CAP: UNEP developed a set of communication tools including a slide presentation, an information leaflet as well as articles in the OzonAction Newsletter and UNEP's website. The CAP was formally presented to high-level officials of the countries through letters and to each of the Regional Networks.

Forming the Regional teams

- Recruiting new staff: The recruitment of CAP staff was done in accordance with UN rules and procedures. As of the end of December 2002, CAP teams in Paris, the Regional Office for Africa and Regional Office for Asia and the Pacific were in place while those of the Regional Office for Latin America and the Caribbean and the Regional Office for West Asia were near completion. In addition to the 12 existing professional staff, UNEP recruited 8 new professional staff. As of 31 December 2002, 3 positions were waiting for the candidates to join, one had to be re-advertised, and one was waiting for selection.
- Transition period: As the new Regional CAP team members were being recruited, key tasks related to CAP implementation in 2002 such as Networking, Information Clearinghouse and Institutional Strengthening were performed by existing staff with support from consultants.
- Training CAP staff: About half of the CAP staff is new to UNEP and require specific

training. The needs and approaches have been elaborated and the trainers contracted.

Operating the system

- Monitoring: The internet-based OzonAction Management Information System (oMIS) was developed, tested and de-bugged. This system serves as an important tool for project monitoring, reporting and management. During the second half of 2002, UNEP used oMIS primarily for project assignment and tracking. It is expected to become functional by early 2003.
- Procedures: Internal procedures and guidelines were revised to facilitate effective CAP implementation including monitoring, reporting and approval procedures, guidelines for compliance assistance, guidelines for the transfer of projects to UNEP's Regional Offices and the corresponding sub-allotment of funds.
- CAP performance indicators: A review of the performance indicators has been undertaken in consultation with the Multilateral Fund Secretariat as set out in UNEP's 2002 Business Plan, with a view to upgrading its existing framework for monitoring project and agency performance. Details about how CAP performed in relation to those proposed revised performance indicators is presented in detail in Annex IV, CAP Priorities as Outlined in UNEP's 2002 Business Plan. With additional resources provided by the Government of Finland, UNEP organised an expert group meeting to review and identify useful performance indicators for non-investment activities, in which the Multilateral Fund Secretariat participated.

Delivering Compliance Assistance Services

- Compliance assistance: Continuous monitoring of the compliance situation of countries in potential or actual non-compliance is the basis of an "early warning system" and allows providing early compliance assistance as required. Details about CAP activities in specific Article 5 countries are presented in Annex II Country Developments by Region.
- Compliance sessions: Compliance sessions for countries in potential or actual non-compliance organised back-to-back with Regional Network meetings. The participation of the relevant Implementing Agencies and Secretariats proved extremely useful in resolving problems related to compliance and data reporting in the short term, and in helping the concerned countries achieve compliance with the 2005 targets.
- Networks: UNEP ensured that Regional Network meetings were held in countries in potential or actual non-compliance to raise awareness of high-level decision-makers in those countries about the urgency of returning to compliance. Additionally, UNEP adjusted the approach and structure of the Network meetings compared to those of previous years. The Networks continued to use regional electronic discussion forums to exchange information and experience between NOUs, implementing agencies and bilateral country members. Annual meetings of the Regional Network Co-ordinators and telephone/video conferencing contributed to the sharing of information and expertise inbetween the regions. All of these measures served to make the Network meetings more effective and focused on specific subject areas of critical importance.
- Ratification: Ratification efforts have been be initiated and supported by the Regional Offices in co-operation with the Ozone Secretariat.

Improving implementation and measuring performance

Expediting project completion: UNEP took considerable efforts to accelerate the

completion of projects approved before 2002 using non-CAP resources for their implementation. In 2002, UNEP reported 74 projects as completed, compared to 66 projects previously reported as completed in 2001 (as per the Inventory of Approved Projects).

- Reducing delays: There was some progress in addressing projects with implementation delays and significant reduction in the backlog of Projects Completion Reports.
- Positive trends in speed of delivery: the average project implementation time has decreased since 1999 from 30 month in 1999 to 21 months in 2002. This is a significant achievement resulting from UNEP's efforts to closely monitor the schedules and to work closely with the regions and the countries. Details are provided in Annex 1: Speed of Delivery.

2. Information Clearinghouse

During 2002, UNEP developed and submitted to the Executive Committee the Global Communication Strategy for Compliance with the Montreal Protocol, a major milestone in promoting national compliance through information, education and communication (IEC) activities. This document will guide UNEP and inform others about how to design action-oriented awareness activities in the current triennium and beyond. Related to the implementation of this strategy, in 2002 UNEP continued to support regional and national efforts to develop awareness projects and conducted outreach at 20 international, regional and national ozone protection events to promote awareness about Multilateral Fund successes and the Montreal Protocol.

The Information Management team provided information and support services to CAP team management and staff to support their work with NOUs by developing, testing and debugging the prototype web-based OzonAction Management Information System (oMIS). UNEP also contributed to the ongoing work to develop performance indicators for the Compliance period for non-investment activities by organising an Expert Group Meeting on Performance Indicators.

During 2002, UNEP provided direct compliance assistance to countries through:

- Query response: Paris responded to 86 queries during the period with an average response time less than 5 days. Regional CAP teams also responded to a large number of queries as part of their direct assistance to countries.
- Document dissemination: dispatched over 42,800 documents in response to requests received from individuals, distribution to workshop participants, and dissemination during outreach events.
- E-news services: Provided the latest ozone protection news to NOUs and other stakeholders via "direct delivery" email news services (OzoNews, 48 issues; RUMBA, 5 issues; CLIO3, 1 issue)

UNEP also provided indirect compliance assistance to countries through:

- Halontrader Web Site: maintained on a monthly basis. The site contained 118 listings of available or sought halon submitted by 110 members. The combined quantities of halon listed during the period were 994 MT halon 1211, 3299 MT halon 1301, and 1770 MT halon 2402.
- OzonAction Web Site: maintained on a weekly basis, and included 208 substantive updates to the site during the period, including addition of 34 publications in PDF format.
- MultiMedia Information Use: obtained, processed, catalogued and used in the

clearinghouse 646 reports/articles and other items, and developed and made available a new on-line, searchable version of the MultiMedia Collection (www.uneptie.org/ozonaction/library/mmc/main.asp).

B. REGIONAL PROJECTS

1. AFRICA NETWORKS

During 2002, the regional CAP team organized 3 Network meetings and one sub-regional workshop on technology transfer. The main issue in all four meetings was compliance with the 1999 freeze and 2005 50% reduction in CFCs and the 2002 freeze for methyl bromide and halons. The CAP team was also involved in preparation of Regional Meetings for Environment Ministers (AMCEN), where the ozone issue was given good attention by African Ministers and experts. Two ozone side events (exhibitions) were successfully organized during one AMCEN meeting (in Kampala) and during the WSSD in Johannesburg. Both exhibitions were run by NOUs of the host countries supported by other NOUs attending the events.

The Africa CAP Team also co-organized the Regional Workshop for African Environmental Journalists during which ozone issues were given the highest attention. A regional journalist Network was created and journalist promised to cooperate with the ODS Officers Networks.

Details about CAP activities in specific African countries are presented in *Annex II Country Developments by Region*.

2. ASIA PACIFIC NETWORKS

The South Asia Network met twice during 2002, and the first two meetings of Ozone officers and customs officers from SEAP countries were organised during 2002. These meetings were successful in enhancing national level co-ordination between the ozone and customs officers. The SEAP Network, which continues to be financially supported by the Government of Sweden, celebrated its 10th Anniversary (Stockholm, October 2002).

To address the increasing illegal trade issues through a regional co-operation approach, an innovative project was initiated in the SEAP region to strengthen customs ozone officers network for better national level co-ordination to tackle the increasing menace of ODS illegal trade. Since the major producers of ODS are in the South Asia region, a complimentary bilateral project "Regional co-operation for monitoring and control of ODS consumption in the SEAP region" was prepared for the South Asia region with assistance from Sweden.

Another innovative project on assisting countries on strategic planning exercise through country consultations was initiated on a pilot basis in Sri Lanka with assistance from Japan. After a series of country consultations with all stakeholders in Sri Lanka, a National Compliance Action Plan was prepared and endorsed by the country. Similar projects for Iran and Mongolia werer prepared and they were approved in the 38th meeting of the Executive Committee. Preliminary discussions with the two countries to finalise the action plan were held.

Compliance assistance on methyl bromide at the regional level was provided as an important output of CAP services through a Regional Workshop on the Use of Methyl Bromide Alternatives (Pattaya, Thailand, September 2002) evaluated under the Multilateral Fund's demonstration projects for Asia and the Pacific.

Raising high-level political awareness on ratification and Montreal Protocol issues was an important initiative taken in the region. Through the implementation of the two methyl bromide phase out assistance projects in China, and two national workshops held with UNEP's assistance

in Beijing and Yuxi City in early September 2002 went a long way in raising awareness on methyl bromide-related issues. These efforts of UNEP and the Multilateral Fund raised stakeholder and high level awareness on understanding the implications of ratification of the Copenhagen Amendment and will help China in future ratification. Similar efforts were made in India to enable national stakeholders understand the implications of ratification of Copenhagen and Beijing Amendments. CAP's efforts in this regard in two of the largest global producers and consumers of ODS is an important initiative taken up in collaboration with the MLFS, Ozone Secretariat and the IAs.

The CAP team also initiated similar efforts to support ratification of the Protocol in LVCs and other countries, i.e. Afghanistan and Bhutan. This effort symbolizes UNEP's efforts for 100% ratification and its commitment to working with the remaining non-Party countries.

Details about CAP activities in specific Asia-Pacific countries are presented in Annex II Country Developments by Region.

3. WEST ASIA NETWORK

The RNC visited Yemen, Oman and Qatar to help them return to compliance. During the main meeting of ODS officers, each country's officer met the RNC and representatives of Ozone Secretariat and Multilateral Fund Secretariat and discussed non-compliance issues. The RNC facilitated the participation of ODS officers of these countries in the 28th meeting of the Implementation Committee. As a result of the above, three countries are aware on the correct procedure to avoid the situation of non-compliance.

As part of the effort to convince Iraq to join the Montreal Protocol and its Amendments, as well as other countries to ratify remaining amendments, a senior Iraqi representative with support provided by the Ozone Secretariat attended the main meeting of ODS officers and promised to convince his ministers to ratify within 2002.

Since the Gulf sub-region countries either received limited financial support (in most cases only ISP and RMP i.e. Bahrain, Kuwait, Qatar and Oman) or other countries did not receive any financial support from the Multilateral Fund (Saudi Arabia and U.A.E), the Network gave special attention to these countries by establishing good contact with the secretariat-general of GCC and organised a very successful workshop on ODS alternatives, which was attended by 80 participants from all GCC countries. The central role of Network in the ODS phase-out in GCC countries was acknowledged and therefore the GCC secretariat decided to invite the RNC in the future to all senior officer meetings that include ozone issues. At the same time the GCC Secretariat will attend all activities of the Network.

The West Asia Network translated, reproduced and disseminated training modules 3 and 4 and 1,200 copies of each were distributed to stakeholders in Arab countries. In addition, awareness materials and press releases about the ozone treaties were translated into Arabic and circulated during 2002.

The agendas of the Network meetings in 2002 were in line with the recommendations of the Network evaluation - the main meeting was dedicated to update the ODS officers on new decisions of the Meeting of the Parties and Executive Committee, and explore the possibility benefits of the Rotterdam Convention in control and monitoring of ODS. The follow-up meeting was organised as an informal meeting to exchange experiences among West Asia countries and was held back-to-back with the regional Halon Management Workshop (to be technical in nature and cover specific issues requested by the Network members).

A regional awareness project was discussed with Network members through the e-forum and it was decided that Syria should implement it.

The RNC followed-up with ODS officers through e-forum, emails, faxes and telephone calls to submit required reports to Ozone Secretariat, Multilateral Fund Secretariat and UNON, and as a result all reports were submitted on time.

Details about CAP activities in specific West Asia countries are presented in *Annex II Country Developments by Region*.

4. LATIN AMERICA & THE CARIBBEAN NETWORKS

Twenty-two projects were completed in the region and progress achieved in the implementation of delayed projects (Argentina licensing system, Venezuela legislation review, Nicaragua Recovery and Recycling and custom training, MOUs cleared with Panama and Paraguay). Starting up of the direct implementation of project management for CAP members reaching MOUs drafted for Guatemala, Chile and Colombia RMPs. 10 countries in potential non-compliance situation were assisted to draft a plan to entry in sustainable compliance. One new Party (Haiti) was assisted with ODS data collection, first submission of IS project to MF, and its CP/RMP was drafted. Peru and St. Lucia have helped colleagues in other countries to adopt successful approaches to by means of experience and/or good planning schemes. Regional public awareness activities have begun including the Ozone Day celebration in Chile by the Latin American and Spanish-speaking Caribbean Network members. Ozone Layer information was included in UNEP/ROLAC's children webpage. The RNC participated in the Latin American and Caribbean Forum of Ministers to raise political awareness.

Details about CAP activities in specific Latin America & Caribbean countries are presented in Annex II Country Developments by Region.

5. EUROPE REGION (EUR)

UNEP was implementing projects in four European/Central Asian A5 countries during 2002: Albania, Croatia, Kyrgystan and Moldova. For Albania, UNEP collaborated with UNIDO to prepare the National Phase Out Plan. Furthermore, UNEP was assisting the country in implementing the Phase I of its institutional strengthening project. For Croatia, UNEP assisted the country with the implementation of its IS project. For Kyrgystan, UNEP assisted the country in implementing its IS project and collaborated with the relevant stakeholders to prepare for customs and refrigeration training. For Moldova, UNEP assisted with the implementation of the IS project and provided policy advise to assist the country in updating its licensing system as a prerequisite to the customs training.
